Primary Strategy: *Monitoring*

The ability for a child to notice a discrepancy in their reading is called monitoring. Here is some language to reinforce and/or promote monitoring behaviors in children.

"Make it match."

"Point to each word."

"Can you find ... (a known or new word)?"

"Look at the picture."

"I liked the way you did that."

"Where was the tricky part?"

"Was that okay?"

"Why did you stop?"

"What did you notice?"

"I liked the way you tried to work that out."

"Read that again and say the first part."

"What do you expect to see at the beginning?"

"What do you expect to see at the end?"

"Were you right? How did you know?"

"Try that again."

"It could be ... and look at"

"Check it. Does it look right and sound right to you?"

Intermediate Strategy: Inferring: Reading Between the Lines Inferring lets readers make their own discoveries without the direct comment of the author. When readers infer, they:

- Draw conclusions based on clues in the text;
- Make predictions before, during, and after reading;
- Use unspoken information from the text to create meaning during reading; and
- Use pictures to help gain meaning.

Secondary Strategy: Making an Inference

- 1. Read the entire text.
- Make a list of important evidence used to support the central idea of the text.
- Identify and connect the most important and relevant evidence.
- 4. Apply your own reasoning (analyze, evaluate, and predict) to the connections based on the evidence. Make an informed judgment (inference) based on your own reasoning.
- Ask: What decisions can I make based on the evidence (in the text) and my own reasoning (in my head)?

Onondaga Nation School Serves Up Annual Spring Dinner



Onondaga Nation School recently celebrated the beginning of spring by opening its doors and inviting community members in for a home-cooked meal.

Held on April 22, ONS' Annual Spring Dinner hosted more than 475 guests, including La-Fayette Central School District students, staff and community members. With help from school staff, prekindergarten through

eighth-grade students prepared the menu, which included turkey, vegetables, salads, casseroles, soups and traditional Onondaga Nation favorites like hot frybread, or "scoons," and corn-based "mush."



The dinner was served by a rotating staff of eighth-graders, who not only described the various offerings to guests traveling through the line, but also helped escort them to the gymnasium, where tables, chairs and spring décor had transformed the space into an open dining center. Another crew of students monitored the gymnasium, clearing abandoned trays and assisting guests.

In addition to the Spring Dinner, ONS hosts a Harvest Dinner in November. Both events are open to the school community and are designed to bring families, students and staff members together. The money generated by admission is used to offset dinner costs.

ONS Health Class

Students in the 7th grade health class are actively exploring the anatomy of the heart. Though larger than a human heart, the class is using a cow's heart to examine the chambers, ventricles, muscles, and the exterior of this organ.

Bacteria has been collected and bagged using plain gelatin as "host". Within a few hours to one week, students will be able to watch these samples grow. Bacteria samples were taken from the drinking fountain, desks, musical instruments, handrails, etc.

Wow! Here we are again at the end of another school year. I have a few reminders to pass along to you for next year.

- 1) All students entering PK, K, 2nd and 4th grades as well as any new students to the district will need a physical. Forms were sent home with students before the Memorial Day break for your convenience. There is also a Dental Health Certificate attached as these are now requested the same years as required physicals. If your child visits the dentist, please have the form filled out and return it to school. Students entering 7th grade will also require a physical. We are having physicals at Grimshaw on Tuesday, June 7th at 8:30 for those who wish to have a school exam. Watch for physical forms to come home the week before Memorial Day. Forms must be signed and returned to school by Monday, June 6th if you want an exam done here. If your 7th grader has a physical over the summer please forward it to the Jr./Sr. H.S. nurse.
- 2) All new entrants, including PK and Kindergarten students must have their immunization record on file in my office before school starts in September. Also, all 6th graders who have turned 11 when school starts will need to show proof of having the Tdap vaccine as well as 2 doses of Varicella vaccine or proof of varicella disease. As you know there have been many changes regarding immunization requirements at all grade levels the past few years. As soon as I know of any new changes I'll pass them along to you. Available on our website is the current NYS Immunization Requirements for School Attendance/Entrance Chart you can refer to. Please check with your doctor to be sure your child is up to date with current requirements. Please call me if you have any questions regarding vaccination requirements.
- 3) All medications require new physician orders in September for the new school year. They don't carry over from last year. Please pick up any meds your child has here before the last day of school or they will be discarded.
- 4) If any student is restricted from PE @ the end of the school year that will carry over to the new school year and they will need a release note before they'll be allowed to participate in PE.
- 5) Please be sure to send a change of clothes for your primary grade child to have available if needed.
- 6) Please remember to notify me if your child is absent for any reason or if any emergency #'s change. You may call, e-mail, send a written note or leave a voicemail at any time.

Thank you all for your support throughout the year and as always feel free to call with any question or concerns. I hope you all have a safe and happy summer!

Varsity Baseball Team Raising Funds for Spring Training

Members of LaFayette Central School District's varsity baseball team are excited to reinstate an annual tradition, as may other area schools do, by traveling south for spring training, enabling them to be more competi-

For the past two years, the start of LaFayette's baseball season has been delayed due to inclement weather. To ensure that the team does not lose practice time during the 2017 season, team members are raising money to participate in South Carolina's Ripken Experience baseball program next spring.

Located in Myrtle Beach, the program's facility features lighted turf fields, 17 batting cages, 12 bullpen mounds, and additional practice fields.

The team is currently fundraising for the trip which would take place when LaFayette Junior/Senior High School is closed for spring recess.

The team hopes to raise \$13,000 to help offset lodging and facility use (\$9,000), travel costs (\$1,000) and meals (\$3,000).
