From the Desk of the SUPERINTENDENT

After four years in the LaFayette Central School District, three as superintendent, I will retire on June 30. Concluding forty years in public education, I say with all sincerity that some of the finest educators and non-instructional employees whom I have known are right here in LaFayette. With their effort and collaboration, we have increased our graduation and literacy rates, vastly improved our fiscal position including being removed from the Fiscal Stress List, developed much-needed curricula, implemented new programs and systems such as RTI and literacy

interventions, introduced online courses, had two of our buildings recognized by the New York State Education Department as “Reward Schools”, made significant improvements to our safety and security, enhanced communication, negotiated several contracts and, most important, hired truly outstanding new employees. In addition, we just had the highest passing rate of any budget vote in twenty years, possibly in our district’s history, and it was among the highest in Central New York.

These and our other accomplishments would not have happened without the tireless effort and support of our Board of Education, administrators, faculty, staff, students, families and the community at large. With gratitude to all and best wishes, I am pleased to pass the torch of the superintendency to Mr. Jeremy Belfield who will lead the district with vision and dedication to even greater achievement.

EXCELSIOR SCHOLARSHIP

The Excelsior Scholarship begins in Fall 2017. The first-in-the-nation plan will be phased in over three years, beginning for New Yorkers making up to \$100,000 annually in the fall of 2017, increasing to \$110,000 in 2018, and reaching \$125,000 in 2019.

Students must:

- Be residents of New York State
- Enroll in a SUNY or CUNY two- or four-year degree program
- Take 30 credits per calendar year
- Plan to live and work in New York following graduation for the length of time they participate in the scholarship program

The program goes into effect immediately, and is available for students whose families earn up to \$100,000 annually beginning in the fall of 2017. It will extend to families making up to \$125,000 annually by 2019.

The application will be available starting June 7th. To receive an electronic notification when the application is live, we encourage you to enter your email in the Excelsior Alert Form on the HESC website: www.hesc.ny.gov/excelsior.

Wow! Here we are again at the end of another school year. I have a few reminders to pass along to you for next year.

1) All students entering PK, K, 2nd and 4th grades and any new students to the district will need a physical. Forms were sent home with students before the Memorial Day break for your convenience. Dentist visits are also now requested the same years as required physicals. If your child visits the dentist please have them write a note or fill out a form of their choice stating date of visit+results of check-up and return it to school. Students entering 7th grade will also require a physical. We are having 6th Grade Physicals at Grimshaw on Wednesday, June 7th at 12:30 for those who wish to have a school exam. Watch for physical forms to come home the week before Memorial Day. Forms must be signed and returned to school by Tuesday, June 6th if you want an exam done here. If your 7th grader has a physical over the summer please forward it to the Jr./Sr. H.S. nurse.

2) All new entrants, including PK and Kindergarten students must have their immunization record on file in my office before school starts in September. All 6th graders who have turned 11 when school starts will need to show proof of having the Tdap vaccine as well as 2 doses of Varicella vaccine or proof of varicella disease. As you know there have

been many changes regarding immunization requirements at all grade levels the past few years. As soon as I know of any new changes I'll pass them along to you. Printed in this newsletter is the current NYS Immunization Requirements for School Attendance/Entrance Chart you can refer to for 2017-18. Please check with your doctor to be sure your child is up to date with current requirements. Please call me if you have any questions regarding vaccination requirements.

3) All medications require new physician orders in September for the new school year. They don't carry over from last year. Please pick up any meds your child has here before the last day of school or they will be discarded.

4) If any student is restricted from PE at the end of the school year that will carry over to the new school year and they will need a release note before they'll be allowed to participate in PE.

5) Please be sure to send a change of clothes for your primary grade child to have available if needed.

6) Please remember to notify me if your child is absent for any reason or if any emergency #'s change. You may call, e-mail, send a written note or leave a voicemail at any time.

Thank-you all for your support throughout the year and as always feel free to call with any question or concerns. I hope you all have a safe and happy summer!

Science + Art = Community

Students at ONS not only provided wonderful food additions for the ONS Spring dinner, but they also made beautiful ceramic pieces that were the centerpieces on the tables. It all began with Mrs. Harris (Science) and Mrs. Capella (ART) joining forces to integrate Science 7's lessons on physical and chemical change, with the skill of making slip molds.

Mrs. Capella taught that there are several ways to make pottery: wheel throwing, hand building, coil method, pinch pots and slip casting. Slip, which is wet clay, is poured into a plaster mold, and the clay's moisture is absorbed by the plaster mold creating a physical change. After some time, the slip has dried enough to be released from the mold. The clay is then ready to be fired. Firing is a chemical change. Kiln heat will reach temperatures of 1000°C.

The Mission Field Trip



The seventh and eighth graders recently took a field trip to The Mission restaurant in downtown Syracuse. The building, which currently houses the restaurant, is an historic building that played key roles in both the Underground Railroad and the women's rights movement.

While at the restaurant, the owner taught the students the history of the building and the roles it played historically. The students were also allowed to go into the basement to see the hidden door and tunnel that were used to hide run-away slaves.

The students were able to learn a lot about local history, as well as have a delicious meal.
