LaFayette Educator Joins NASA Ambassador Program

LaFayette Central School District now has a direct connection to the stars.

LaFayette Junior/Senior High School science teacher David Amidon was recently named a 2017 Solar System Ambassador (SSA) by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA). The SSA program is a volunteer public engagement program managed by NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

As an ambassador, Mr. Amidon will lead public speaking events that inform community members about current space missions, including briefings from project scientists and engineers who are working on the missions.

In 2016, the program had about 700 ambassadors from the United States, Puerto Rico, US Virgin Islands and Guam, according to the organization's website.

"Ideal candidates are ambitious people who are enthusiastic about space exploration and active in their communities," said Kay Ferrari, national coordinator for the Solar System Ambassador program based at NASA's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

To be considered for the program, candidates must complete an application process. Once accepted, members are required to run four SSA events during their one-year term, report on their events, and listen to briefings on current space projects.

HALO Class Creates Positive Environment for Students

HALO (Helping and Leading Others) is a group of students ranging from grades 10 to 12 that provides a safe environment for younger students to have the ability to express their feelings without being judged. This year, we created a program (StressLess) focused on helping the seventh grade students learn how to manage their time, and more importantly, relieve stress. The students of HALO did this by collecting answers from a survey given to the Junior High students, and created activities, scenarios, and a skit to help engage the students in the topics we were teaching them.

At the beginning of the year, students in the class broke up into groups to create a few icebreakers to get to know the Junior High students better. We chose two ice breakers that helped the participants of HALO and the seventh grade students become comfortable with each other. After the survey was evaluated following the icebreakers, we created a three day program. Each of the HALO students led these activities at least once throughout the program. LaFayette CSD is No Longer on the State Comptroller's Fiscal Stress List

LaFayette Central School District is no longer deemed "susceptible to fiscal stress", according to a report recently released by the New York State Comptroller's office.

On January 20, New York State Comptroller Thomas P. DiNapoli's office released its Fiscal Stress Monitoring Report for 2016 which, based on financial and environmental indicators, purports to identify local governments and school districts that are moving towards – or are already in – fiscal stress.

The system creates an overall stress score by measuring a variety of factors including year-end fund balance, short-term debt issuances, cash position and patterns of operating deficits. The score is based on the fiscal year ending on June 30, and reflects financial information taken from each district's annual financial statements.

The district was classified as being in "moderate" fiscal stress for the 2012-2013 year when the statewide evaluation system was implemented. For the past two years, the Comptroller's annual report classified LaFayette CSD with an upgraded "susceptible" designation, which is the mildest label included in DiNapoli's Fiscal Stress Monitoring System.

According to the recently released 2016 report, LaFayette CSD's fiscal health continued to improve to the point that it is no longer designated as a fiscallystressed or even susceptible to fiscal stress.

Why was LaFayette CSD on the list?

In June 2011, LaFayette CSD's year-end financials reflected a deficit of \$2 million dollars due to outstanding receivables which negatively impacted the district's cash position. The monitoring system uses a cash ratio as a way to determine whether a district has enough money to pay its obligations on time.

Throughout the following two years, the district eliminated its deficit - an improvement, said Laura Lavine who became superintendent in July, 2014, but far from the district's goal of funding a 4 percent fundbalance, which is the maximum retainable amount permitted by law.

Complicating the situation is that SED gives revenue to LaFayette CSD to operate its Onondaga Nation School, but - even though it is also a state entity - refuses to provide the funds prior to each operating

year. Instead, SED requires the district to borrow the money in advance then reimburses the district, including interest, the following school year, according to Superintendent Lavine. In turn, she avers that Comptroller DiNapoli's office essentially punishes the district for complying with SED.

"Comptroller DiNapoli knows that SED requires us to borrow money upfront to operate ONS, yet he will not make an accommodation for it," she said. "I won't say that 'one hand doesn't know what the other is doing' because the Comptroller's office is aware of this situation. Instead, it appears that his office doesn't care as evidenced by his continuing to assign six points against us for doing what we are forced to do." She also finds it inexplicable that the state would rather pay the interest on the amount borrowed than provide the money in advance to run the school. "That seems like a waste of state funding," she said.

Despite these challenges, Superintendent Lavine said she and Assistant Superintendent Tiffany Turner continued to focus on improving the district's cash flow. In 2014, the district's fiscal outlook improved through the Comptroller's report and the district was downgraded from "moderate" to "susceptible." In 2015, the district's year-end fund balance increased from 1.55 to 2.4 percent and its cash position improved.

Their continued efforts resulted in LaFayette CSD's 2016 year-end fund balance reaching four percent.

"We accomplished these improvements through contract negotiations, by deploying staff more judiciously, finding cost efficiencies and avoidances, generating additional revenue and properly seeking transportation aid and Medicaid reimbursements," said Lavine.

Superintendent Lavine is pleased that the financial improvements were made within a relatively short period of time – all while literacy rates increased, more learning opportunities have been provided to students, and safety and security have been improved.

"The district has not been in fiscal difficulty these past few years but we are happy to have our financial acumen and efforts recognized in the form of being removed from the list," Superintendent Lavine said.

The inspections were conducted by Don Warnow, Safety Officer for OCM BOCES, Connie Wallis, NYSIR (Insurance) representative and Jim Kesler, Director of Facilities for the District.

Once again, the inspections went very well. Mr. Warnow, Mrs. Wallis, and Mr. Kesler were pleased with the conditions. As with most inspections, some minor violations were detected. Examples of the violations were extension cord use, untreated curtains, fire doors not completely latching, and breaker boxes not properly labeled. All items have been corrected.

Reports were completed then approved by the Superintendent. On Tuesday, January 3, 2017, the forms were electronically sent to SED. On Wednesday, January 4, 2017, SED approved and awarded Certificates of Occupancy whichhave been posted in each building. Copies of the reports and certificates are also on file in the Director of Facilities office.

Mr. Kesler wants to thank all Building Principals, staff, as well as the entire custodial and maintenance staff for all their cooperation. Without their continued support these inspections would not have the results that they do.

STUDENT SCHEDULING

The scheduling process has changed. On Friday, February, 3, we will hold assemblies for grades 8, 9, 10, 11 regarding the scheduling process. The following Monday, February 6, students will receive a triplicate scheduling form in their period 1 class. The students will have the form signed by their teachers for next year's courses (English, social studies, math, science, LOTE) as they go through the day. The period 8 teacher collects all forms and returns them to guidance. The students keep the bottom page of the triplicate form to get signed by their parent/guardian.

On either Thursday, February 9th or Thursday, February 16, students register on schooltool. Schooltool will be opened up on the morning of both days for students to register in their English class. Individual appointments with their school counselor will follow in April. Students will sign up for electives at this point.

The course guide is available online on the guidance webpage. If you do not have computer access at home, your child can pick up a printed copy in the guidance office.

Parents of 8th and 11th grade students are invited to sign up for scheduling meetings with their school counselor. This is the time to plan and learn about high school and graduation requirements for your student and we encourage you to attend. Mrs. Cool will be meeting with 8th grade families and Mr. O'Leary will be meeting with 11th grade families from 2:30 PM to 7:30 PM on Thursday, March 2nd. I hope you all enjoyed the winter weather in January with your children and stayed healthy, too. Even when temperatures are unseasonably warm, please dress your children for outdoor play as classes will go outside whenever possible. Please be sure all primary grade students have extra clothes in their backpacks/cubbies/lockers in case they need them.

In January, after we returned from Christmas break, we had many children at all grade levels sick with a stomach virus as well as a variety of upper respiratory infections including some flu cases and flu-like illnesses with fever. As always, we ask that you keep children home for 24 hours after having a fever of 100 or greater, vomiting or starting on antibiotics for a bacterial infection. These measures help immensely in decreasing the spread of infectious diseases at school and I appreciate your cooperation on following the "24 hour rule". Please remember to notify me directly (677-5501you can leave a voicemail anytime or email me at pbush@ lafayetteschools.org) whenever your child is out of school for any reason.

A few more 2nd and 4th grade physicals came in this month- only 12 more to go! Please send or fax the paperwork in as soon as your child's is done. Thanks to everyone for your cooperation in getting these physicals completed. If your child is new to the school, he/she will also require a physical along with their immunizations.

If your child is restricted from gym by a physician I must have a note from a physician to release them to play again.

This issue comes up from time to time so hopefully this clarifies it for you.

Another reminder regarding medications- I must have a physician's note or prescription as well as parent permission to give your child any medicine at school. This would include any OTC meds, as well as, prescription meds. All meds must be in the original container and should be delivered by a parent. I can't give your child any meds sent in an envelope or other container or with a parent note only. These measures are for your child's safety and must be adhered to.

As mentioned last month, the Tdap vaccine is now required for students entering 6th grade as soon after they turn 11 as possible. Fifth Grade parents should receive a letter around report card time with a detailed explanation of this requirement. If your child is 11 when school starts in September, they should have had this vaccine to comply with N.Y. state education law. If your child has had only 1 chickenpox vaccine, they will need a 2nd one to enter 6th grade as well. Please discuss these changes with your child's doctor to be sure they're up to date before school starts next fall. As was detailed in last month's newsletter the meningitis vaccine will be required to enter 7th grade.

Please keep updating any emergency numbers and contacts so I can reach you quickly. As always feel free to call me with any questions or concerns regarding your child's health.


