Second Grade Slurps Science



Who ever thought that science could taste so good? In January, our second grade students found out just how good science could taste. After learning about the different states of matter, the students moved on to physical and chemical reactions while making root beer floats.

Students identified the state of matter for ice cream and root beer soda. The classes discussed what might happen when the solid ice cream and the liquid soda were combined. They were excited to see if a chemical reaction would occur.

Each student got his/her own cup to see up close what would happen. Students recorded their observations of what happened during the chemical reaction.

The classes concluded that when they mixed their solid and liquid together, it made a gas (foam), and that since it could not be returned to its original state that it was a chemical reaction and not a physical reaction.

Neighboring School Districts Partner to Educate Community on Drug Abuse

A forum designed to educate community members about the dangers of substance abuse will be held at 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, March 8, in the auditorium of LaFayette Junior/Senior High School.

Organized by members of the school-based Alcohol Drug Abuse Prevention Education Program (ADAPEP) who are counselors in the LaFayette, Tully, Onondaga, and Fabius-Pompey school districts, the Community Forum on Drugs will feature a panel discussion focusing on emerging substance abuse trends such as the growing abuse of opioids including heroin and narcotic pain medications, and how they are affecting students locally.

Guest speakers will include local law enforcement members, a clinical toxicologist from Upstate Medical University, representatives from the Prevention Network and Crouse Chemical Dependency Treatment organizations, and individuals whose lives have been affected by addiction.

Representatives from local services and community groups will also be on hand before and after the presentation to answer questions and provide information.

The event is free and open to the public.

Board of Education Approves Cold War Veterans' Tax Exemption

During its January 26 meeting, the LaFayette Central School District Board of Education approved a property tax exemption for district residents who are Cold War veterans.

Authorized by Governor Andrew Cuomo in August, the tax exemption is offered to veterans who served in active duty (excluding active duty training) in the United States Armed Forces between September 2, 1945, and December 26, 1991, and were discharged or released under honorable conditions.

The exemption will take effect for the 2017-18 school tax year and will remain in effect for subsequent school tax years. It applies only to residential property (or the residential portion of a property) that is the primary residence of the Cold War veteran, or the surviving spouse of the Cold War veteran (who has not remarried), unless either is absent from the property due to medical reasons or institutionalization.

The qualifying property is exempt from taxation to the extent of 10 percent of its assessed value, provided the exemption does not exceed the lesser of \$36,000, or \$36,000 multiplied by the latest state equalization rate for the applicable town within LaFavette Central School District.

An additional benefit is available to disabled veterans equal to 50 percent of their service-connected disability, up to \$20,000.

There is a 10-year time limit for the exemption, although no time limit is imposed for the additional benefit due to disability.

The Cold War veteran's exemption is not automatic. Eligible veterans should verify that an application is on file with the town assessor or complete the required application form and submit it to the assessor by the March 1 deadline. Application forms are available from the assessor's office and on the New York State Department of Taxation and Finance website.

In 2015, the LaFayette Board of Education authorized an Alternative Veterans' Tax Exemption for veterans who served during a period of war, veterans who served in a combat zone, disabled veterans and Gold Star Parents.

An individual is not eligible to participate in a Cold War Veterans' Exemption and an Alternative Veterans' Exemption simultaneously, but can switch from one to another, if appli-

From the Director of Instruction and **Pupil Services**

As you are aware, the New York State Education Department (NYSED) requires school districts to administer assessments to students in grades 3-8 for English Language Arts and Mathematics. In addition to determining how students perform in terms of learning standards, the data are used to determine whether or not districts and/or schools need additional support. During the 2015-2016 school year, LaFayette Central School District was designated as a Focus District for the 2016-2017 school year because some student populations scored well below the state-determined point for identification in Math.


As a result of the identification, a District Comprehensive Improvement Plan (DCIP) was developed, presented to the Board of Education, and posted on the District's website. The DCIP is compartmentalized into six tenets with aligned SMART (Specific, Measurable, Ambitious, Results-Oriented, and Timely) Goals.

Tenet 2 focuses on School Leader Practices and Decisions. The SMART Goal for Tenet 2 is:

By June 2017, the district will have established and disseminated a clear mission and vision as evidenced by 70% of all stakeholders demonstrating knowledge of the mission and vision components.

Beginning February 7th, a group of community and district representatives met to revise the District's mission statement as well as create a vision statement. Those statements will be presented to the Board of Education on Thursday, March 16th.

From the Desk of the JSHS PRINCIPAL

With spring quickly approaching, so are the New York State 3-8 assessments. Our 7th and 8th grade students will be taking the ELA exams starting on the mornings of Tuesday, March 28th and running through Thursday, March 30th. New York State is no longer timing these exams. This means that your child has as much time as he/she needs to complete the test within the confines of the school day. Following the ELA assessments, the New York State assessments in Mathematics will be given. These exams will begin on Tuesday, May 2nd and run through Thursday, May 4th.

Lastly, there is a State Assessment in the area of Science that only pertains to our 8th grade students. The New York State Science Exam consists of two parts: a written exam that will take place on Monday, June 5th, and a performance test with a flexible date, that will vary based the group to which your child is assigned. The performance test is comprised of small groups that progress through a series of different lab activities. As a result of the smaller setting, the performance test will occur over several days, but each 8th grade student will perfrom in only one session. OCC Initial Placement Testing

Twenty-two LaFayette seniors completed their initial placement testing for OCC on January 27 in the high school instead of taking the exam at OCC. This opportunity was offered to schools that have a significant number of students applying to OCC. The goal is to simplify the admission and enrollment process for potential OCC students.

Testing sessions required 2 hours to complete. They consist of initial assessments in English, Reading Comprehension and Mathematics. The placement testing was computerized; students took this in the computer lab.

Seniors will be able to register for fall courses in the guidance office in April and May. A representative from OCC will register students. Parents are encouraged to attend.

NCAA - ATTENTION JUNIORS

Now is the time for college-bound student-athletes in the junior class to register with the NCAA Eligibility Center if they plan on participating in college athletics. Early registration promotes positive planning and involvement, bypasses the last-minute rush and helps college-bound student-athletes avoid issues that may delay their academic and amateur certifications. The registration process is easy and can be done by logging on to the Eligibility Center's new website at www. eligibilitycenter.org.

College-bound student-athletes need to apply to the college or university they are interested in attending in their senior year. Some student-athletes think that because they are being recruited or because they have registered with the Eligibility Center, they do not need to apply for admission. Athletics eligibility and admission to a college or university are two separate processes and both need to be completed.

On January 27, LaFayette held its annual College & Career Fair. Students in grades 9-11 attended presentations given by twenty-six colleges. The colleges discussed a specific

LaFayette Science Class Students Participate in International **Student Carbon Footprint Challenge**

LaFayette students joined with students around the world to participate in the latest round of the International Carbon Footprint Challenge. Participants included BIO 1 classes and the entire 8th grade.

Students shared a questionnaire with their families and entered their answers into the Carbon Footprint Calculator and received a value based on their estimated energy usage, travel, food choices and shopping habits. After uploading the class data set to the website, the average was shared on their world map alongside other locations.

The next phase allowed the students to participate in a controlled social media environment. To support ISTE Standard 5 - the classes had a discussion about using the platform for academic purposes as an introduction into Digital Citizenship. Students then wrote responses to various prompts - such as "Sustainable City" or "Reuse and Repurpose," and shared their thoughts through the portal. They were also given an opportunity to respond to other students' thoughts from around the world.

This endeavor is a product of the Inquiry to Student Environmental Action (I2SEA) project: "a collaboration between research groups at two marine stations and their home institutions:

- The Sven Lovén Centre for Marine Sciences —Kristineberg of the University of Gothenburg, Sweden. Hopkins Marine Station of Stanford University, in Pacific Grove, CA USA.
- · The I2SEA project has a dual set of goals: to provide engaging resources to teach students about climate change and ocean acidifications, and to empower them to take action to address these growing, worldwide challenges."

The students had a great time and an eye opening experience. On average, our LaFayette students' release 19027 kg -or almost 21 tons- of CO2 every year!

The LaFayette Big Picture School is located at 3122 Rt. 11 North (South Corner of H.S.)

Is the BIG PICTURE SCHOOL Right For You?

We believe that students learn best when they are doing something about which they are passionate. In the Big Picture School, students are encouraged to explore interests and to work on subjects that meet that goal. One of the basic structures in a Big Picture school is that students will spend two days a week out of the building at an internship site. By Learning Through Internship (LTI), the students will learn math, science, reading, writing, and many more 21st century skills that they need to be successful. At the LTI, students will learn the skills needed to go on to college and beyond.

Each student in a Big Picture school has an individual learning plan. The learning team (the student, parent, mentor, and advisor) work together to create a challenging and exciting plan. These meetings will be held three/four times a year and will exhibit his or her work. Each student will have an advisor who knows him/her well and helps him/her work toward individual learning plan goals. Families play an important, perhaps the most important, role in a student's education. From helping the students plan his/her learning plan to participating in events, we rely on parents as an integral part of our community.

Things you should know:

- We have the capacity to enroll 15 new freshmen and a possibility of students in grade 10, 11, 12.
- Students will be graduating with a New York State Regents Diploma.
- You will also have the opportunity to ask questions of our advisors, staff, students, and parents during the Open House.
- Even if you have a child who is not interested in enrolling, we encourage you to still attend and learn more about our school.
- LaFayette students are encouraged to submit applications early as open enrollment for out of district students will begin in the spring. We fill our spots with LaFayette students first.

PRINCIPAL INPUT

We are excited to begin the registration process for incoming Kindergarten students (must turn 5 by December 1, 2017) and our half-day Pre-K program (must turn 4 years old by December 1, 2017). Please contact the Grimshaw Main Office with your child's name, date of birth, parent name and district address. After we receive this information, we will contact you in the near future to set up a screening appointment. Screening dates are Monday, May 8th, through Friday, May 12th, and the appointment takes approximately one and a half hours.

Also happening this month, students in grades 3-6 take the State English Language Arts (ELA) test each spring. These assessments measure the students' understanding of Common Core Learning Standards (CCLS). The ELA test is an untimed test that contains several different types of questions. Students answer multiple choice questions based on short passages they read, and write responses to open-ended questions based on stories, articles, or poems they listen to or read. The teachers at Grimshaw use student test results to identify areas where the student needs extra help or more challenging material. Educators also examine school-wide results to identify broad instructional areas that require improvement.

I hope everyone enjoyed February break with their families. By the time you read this we may be seeing signs of Spring! As you may know we hold Kindergarten screening each year in the Spring here at Grimshaw. This year it's going to be held from Tuesday, May 8th, through Wednesday, May 12th. You may call the main office (677-3152) to make an appointment for your child if he/she will be starting school in September. Please bring a copy of your child's immunizations with you to their appointment. I have put a copy of current NY state immunization requirements on our website for you to review and compare to your child's record. Your child will also need a physical (done after 1/1/2017) before starting school. You may mail or fax (677-3154) it or drop it off at school anytime between now and September. If your child will require medication at school or has a medical condition I should be aware of please contact me before school starts in the fall to discuss. At the time of the K-screening I will be doing a hearing screen and a very basic vision screen. The children (almost) always have a great time!

As most of you are aware last month we had many children sick with a stomach bug and viral illness with a fever as well as some confirmed flu cases, strep throat and the usual array of URI's we see this time of year. Please continue to notify me if your child has a specific contagious disease such as strep-throat or conjunctivitis. It is very important to keep children home 24 hours after they vomit or start on antibiotics. They should also be fever free for 24 hours, without the aid of medication, following any illness before returning to school.

Please call or send a note in whenever your child is sick so they will receive a legal absence. It would be best to call me directly or e-mail me. You may leave a message on my voicemail the night before as well as in the morning. Please notify along with the teacher if your child will be out of town


All children entering 6th grade and have turned 11 will need to have a Tdap vaccine before starting school in September. Fifth graders will be bringing home a letter several times during the year with detailed information regarding this immunization. They should have had one in their backpack on the Friday report cards went home. The letter also includes information on the new Meningitis requirement as well as the chickenpox vaccine. Please discuss these requirements with your physician and plan to have them done on schedule. Call me if you have any questions regarding this.

As I'm sure you're all aware from the news we've had reported cases of some vaccine preventable diseases across the country including Pertussis(Whooping cough), Mumps and Measles. This would be a good time to review your child's immunization record with your physician to be sure they are up to date on all their vaccinations.

We're making progress on the required physicals- only 10 left. Please turn the paperwork into me as soon as they're



Olympiad; PreK-3 celebrated the 100th day of school, and starting at the end of February we will begin the composting project along with recycling milk cartons in the cafeteria.

We just completed the winter benchmark assessments for Literacy and Math. I am pleased to say all of the students improved their skills in these respective academic areas. Kudos to the students, teachers and staff for working to improve student achievement.

In September we developed four goals to strive for this school year.

- 1. Onondaga Language: Increase the number of written words on display in the school and increase dialogue.
 - When you enter the school you will see an increase in posters and written words throughout the school in the hallways, cafeteria, rooms and library.
 - Onondaga to English Dictionaries were distributed throughout the building for students and staff to utilize.
 - Speech lessons, book productions, student dictionaries, audio and visual clips to promote language learning are being developed.
 - Pre-Kindergarten students have take-home color and shapes booklets.
 - Three (3) language teachers and one (1) culture teacher are now employed at ONS to teach the students.
- 2. School Citizenship: Enhance character strengths to see and appreciate the good in others.
 - The Positivity Project has been implemented in classrooms from PreK-8. Parents are encouraged to go on the Positivity Project website to see what character education is being emphasized with the students.
 - We hosted the Boxout Bullying Prevention Group which was well received by students, parents and staff alike. Teachers used the information learned in this assembly to have wonderful, positive conversations with students which continues today.
- 3. **Literacy**: Read and Write at Grade Level.
 - Using the AIMSWEB and Reading Inventory Assessment the teachers are able to monitor the students' Literacy Progress. The Winter Assessments were administered and the results are very positive. Similar to last year's results we are seeing that many of our students are exceeding the rate of growth that had been set for them and that all of our students have improved their reading skills.
- 4. Math: Increase accuracy of math facts for use in mathematical operations.
 - All classroom teachers are practicing math facts in their classrooms with flashcards and other supplemental materials.
 - The NYS Math Modules are used at all the grade levels to provide vertical alignment as well as the use of common math language.
 - Teachers are using the STAR MATH Assessment to determine areas the students are strong in and areas that need improvement.

Upcoming activities for the remainder of the school year are: Academic Fair, Grade 8 Elder's Project, Spring Dinner, Spring Concert, Jamesville Beach Day and 8th Grade Graduation.

On behalf of the students, teachers and staff, we would like to thank the parents and the community for all of their support and commitment to ONS.
