Message from the Superintendent



The month of March is an exciting time of year for our school community. While March in Central New York never quite feels like spring, the spring equinox occurs on March 20th and it does give us hope that warmer weather may be around the corner. During the month of March, our students will perform "The Music Man," attend the college fair at OCC, and host Rockfest. March also ushers in the beginning of our spring sports. Be sure to check out our new school website and fill your calendar with all the important events happening in our school

community.

Throughout this school year, we have been working on a new district mission statement, vision statement, set of core beliefs, and tagline with the ultimate goal of unifying our school district behind a common theme and purpose. We hope to unveil these new ideas some time during the month of March. Be sure to check out my weekly blog, posted on the school website, as we finalize our new mission, vision, set of core beliefs, and tagline.

March is also when we finalize our school district budget for the 2018-2019 school year. The anticipated adoption by the LaFayette Board of Education is March 29, 2018. The school district budget vote will occur on May 15, 2018. You can read the most recent news regarding the budget process by visiting our website. During our community budget meetings, we received great ideas on how to better support our students, clarify our use of resources, and more clearly communicate the various opportunities for students. We are excited to offer more ways for high school students to earn college credits and to also continue the other great programs that we offer to our students.

To preserve these opportunities for current and future students, we need your support and the support of our elected officials in state government. LaFayette Central Schools relies heavily on revenues from New York State. When Governor Cuomo unveiled his executive budget proposal in January, LaFayette was underfunded by \$537,235 in foundation aid. Foundation aid was enacted in 2007 to help address inadequate funding for schools; however, New York State has yet to fulfill the promise of adequate and equitable funding for schools. Based on an analysis from the Statewide School Finance Consortium, wealthier school districts stand to see the largest increases in state funding; while small districts with higher populations of economically disadvantaged students, like LaFayette, continue to be underfunded by New York State.

Throughout the months of February and March, I have been reaching out to our state legislators to express my concerns about the need for adequate school funding. It would also help if our elected officials heard from parents, students, and community members. Let your elected officials know that our students deserve to have adequate state support. Remind our state legislators and Governor Andrew Cuomo that the New York State Constitution lays out the promise of a sound, basic education. It is the job of our elected officials to make adequate and equitable school funding a priority. Our outstanding graduation results reflect that money spent on LaFayette students results in success. There is no better investment in the future than our students. Thank you for supporting our students not just with your tax dollars, but also with your continued attendance at school and community events.

School Board Nominating Petitions

LaFayette is looking for honorable community members who are looking to serve the greater good of our community as members of the school board. As a school board member, you will have the opportunity to make major policy and financial decisions that positively impact the lives of hundreds of students.

If you are interested in learning more about serving on the board, you can stop by the district office to meet with Jeremy Belfield, Superintendent of Schools on Monday, March 12, at 4pm or Tuesday, March 13, at 4pm.

Three terms of office on the La-Fayette Central School District Board of Education will expire on June 30, 2018. Two candidates will be elected for three year terms from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2021; and one candidate will be elected for a two year term from July 1, 2018 through June 30, 2020 at the annual school district election to be held on May 15, 2018.

Candidates may be nominated only by petition. Each nominating petition must be filed with the School District Clerk, LaFayette Central School District Office, 5955 US Route 20, LaFayette, New York 13084 no later than 5:00 pm on April 16, 2018. Each nominating petition must state the name and residence of the candidate and be signed by at least 25 qualified voters of the school district. Each person signing must also state his or her residence. It is good practice to obtain more than 25 signatures from qualified voters.

Under the law a qualified voter is one who is entitled to vote at a school district election. To be entitled to vote a person must meet these three qualifications:

- A citizen of the United States
- At least 18 years of age
- A resident of the school district for a period of at least 30 days prior to the election.

Transportation News - Private Transportation Request Due by April 1st

New York State Education Law Section 3635(2) requires that a written request be made to the Board of Education of a School District when transportation of a student to a non-public, private or parochial school is required. This written request must be made annually and be received by the school district no later than April 1st for transportation for the next school year. Most non-public schools have a form available to make this request and can be contacted for assistance. What advice do you have for younger


students? Well, my sisters are all younger than me, and I always want to be a good role model for them. So, be kind to others because it'll show, and younger kids are looking up to you.



We hold Kindergarten screening each year in the Spring here at Grimshaw. This year screenings are being held from Monday, May 21st through Friday, May 25th. You may call the main office (315-677-3152) to make an appointment for your child if he/she will be starting school in September. Please bring a copy of your child's immunizations with you to their appointment. I have put a copy of current NY state immunization requirements on the website for you to review and compare to your child's record. Your child will also need a physical (done after 1/1/2018) before starting school. You may mail or fax (315-677-3154) it in or drop it off at school anytime between now and September. If your child will require medication at school or has a medical condition I should be aware of, please contact me before school starts in the fall to discuss it. At the time of the screening I will be doing a hearing screen and a very basic vision screen. The children (almost) always have a great time.

As most of you are aware last month we had many children sick with a stomach bug and viral illness with a fever as well as some confirmed flu cases, strep throat and the usual array of upper respiratory infections we see this time of year. Please continue to notify me if your child has a specific contagious disease such as strep-throat or conjunctivitis. It is very important to keep children home 24 hours after they vomit or start on antibiotics. They should also be fever free for 24 hours, without the aid of medication, following any illness before returning to school. Please call or send a note in whenever your child is sick so they will receive a legal absence. It would be best to call me directly or email me. If you email the teacher regarding an absence, please copy it to me as well. You may leave a message on my voicemail the night before as well as in the morning. Please notify me, along with the teacher, if your child will be out of town.

All children who are entering 6th grade and have turned 11 will need to have a Tdap vaccine before starting school in September. Fifth graders will be bringing home a letter several times during the year with detailed information regarding this immunization. They should have had one in their backpack before the winter break. The letter includes information on the new Meningitis requirement and the chickenpox vaccine. Please discuss these requirements with your physician and plan to have them done on schedule.

We're making progress on the required physicals (PK/K,2,4 and new students) but some still need to send in the required paperwork. If you're child has an appointment scheduled please notify me of the date and please turn the paperwork in to me as soon as they're done. For your planning purposes I have been notified New York State is changing the required physical years to PK or K,1,3,5,7,9 and 11 beginning with the 2018-19 school year. Also beginning with the 2019-20 school year only the NYS Physical form will be accepted for your child's school physical.

All children at Grimshaw have their vision/hearing checked each year and I will notify you if I have any concerns after your child's testing. We had a new program for vision screening this year sponsored by the Lion's Club called "Lion's See". Check out their website at www.lionsseeny.org for more information. They did a great job and you'll be receiving the results of the screening if it is recommended your child be seen by an eye care professional. If you have any concerns/ questions about your child's vision/hearing please call me.

Please keep updating emergency information and be sure to have extra clothes available at school for your child in case they need them.

Nomination as a Player

The nominee, must be an alumnus of LaFayette School District and must have graduated at least five years ago.

- 1. An Athlete: Any person who distinguished themselves in the field of athletics while a student at LaFayette High School. Criteria should include:
- a. School, league, state or national records; or,
- b. League, state or national recognition; such as All-Conference Team, All-District

Team, or individual championship; or, c. Individual statistics for a given athlete.

2. An athlete not honored for their high school athletic achievements but who participates in college and gains honors at this level may be considered by the Hall of Fame Selection Committee. An athlete not honored for their high school athletic achievements but who participates at the Professional Sports Level may be considered by the Hall of Fame Selection Committee.

Nomination as a Coach

A coach with at least five (5) years of service at LaFayette High School or is an LCS Alumni, who has at least 10 years of coaching experience, may be considered for the Hall of Fame. Consideration should be based on accomplishments that merit significant contributions of the Alumnus. The nominee, must have retired / departed as a Coach from the LaFayette School District at least five years ago.

Contributor

An individual who has made outstanding contributions to the interscholastic athletic programs at LaFayette High School other than coaching or playing.

Team Selection

The Hall of Fame Selection Committee may choose to select a LaFayette School District *team (s)* for induction into the Hall of Fame. To be inducted into the Hall of Fame, the team (s) must have distinguished themselves above and beyond normal standards. These may include:

- 1. Undefeated seasons; and / or,
- 2. League, sectional, district, regional or state championship; and / or
- 3. State appearances.

The nominated Team (s), must have graduated at least five years ago.

<u>Posthumous Candidates</u>

This is open to deceased athletes, coaches or contributors that have met eligibility criteria.

Any persons from the above categories who are nominated, but not selected to the Hall of Fame during the years, will have their nomination form kept on file to be reviewed yearly for possible consideration up to (5) five years after the original submission.

Nomination Instructions

The person(s) nominating an individual or team should supply the LaFayette School District Sports Hall of Fame Executive Committee with the information on the Candidate Recommendation Form. A detailed explanation should be provided as to why you believe this individual or team should be inducted into the LaFayette School District Sports Hall of Fame. Your explanation should reference all sports played or coached and any awards, records, or recognitions garnered while a student, coach, special contributor, or team at LaFayette Central School. Please include any relevant post high school athletic or coaching activity of your nominee's candidacy. Be as accurate and specific as possible.

McKinney-Vento Quick Tip Series

TIPS FOR PARENTS AND GUARDIANS

If you are living in temporary housing, **YOU HAVE RIGHTS** regarding the education of your children under the **McKinney-Vento Homeless Education Act**.

Know Your Rights

- **School Choice:** If you move into temporary housing, your children have 3 school choices! They can stay in the same school they went to when you had a permanent address, OR stay in their most recent school, OR transfer to the school for where you are staying now. This includes public preschool programs.
- Immediate Enrollment: You can enroll your children in school without the usually required documents. The school must enroll your children within 1 day even without immunization forms, guardianship papers, birth certificates, or proof of address. After your children are enrolled, the school can help you get any needed records.
- **Transportation**: If your children stay in their same school, they can get free transportation to/from that school. If you move from temporary to permanent housing during the school year, your children will still get transportation for at least the rest of the school year, and maybe one more year, if it's their last year in the building. This includes pre-school aged students.
- Free Meals and Title I Services: Your children can get free meals at school. You do not need to fill out any forms about your family's finances. Students in temporary housing can also get Title I services, including emergency supplies, counseling, tutoring, etc.
- **Help from McKinney-Vento Liaison**: Every school district has a McKinney-Vento liaison. The liaison is a staff person who will help you enroll your child in school and connect you and your family with services. If you don't know who your district's liaison is, call us at 800-388-2014 and we can tell you.

Ask the Right Questions

- Can I talk with the McKinney-Vento liaison?
- What transportation is available for my child?
- Who can help set up free meals for my child?
- What if my child needs special education or English Language Learning (ELL) services?

Keep Track of Important Documents

You have the right to enroll your children without documents or records. But, it will be helpful if you do have things like immunization records, birth certificates, or academic records.


Tuesday Tea

YOUTH PROGRAMS

Basketball: The basketball program for girls and boys in grades K-2 and grades 3 & 4 will begin Saturday, March 3 and run through March 31. ADULT PROGRAMS

Daytime/Senior Exercise: Classes are held Tuesdays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays, 8:30 – 9:30 a.m., at the LaFayette Community Center. The current session runs through March 22. The next session runs March 27 – May 3. The cost for the regular 6-week session is \$36. Walk-in fee is \$4 per class.

Yoga: Classes are held Mondays and Wednesdays, 6:30-7:45 p.m. at the Grimshaw Elementary School. The current session runs through June 20, 2018; costs for this session are \$75 (approximately \$3/class) if attending classes one night per week, and \$140 if attending classes two days per week. Walk in fee is \$4 per class.

WERQ® (This class replaces Zumba and Tabata): WERQ® is a dance fitness class that tightens and tones the entire body through athletic moves and dance steps choreographed to dance, pop and hip-hop music. Classes are held Mondays and Thursdays, 6:30-7:30 p.m. in the Grimshaw Elementary School cafeteria. The current session runs through April 19, 2018; costs for this session are \$42 if attending class one evening per week, Monday or Thursday, and \$80 if attending classes both Monday and Thursday evenings per week. Walk in fee is \$4 per class.

Tai Chi: Beginner and advanced classes are held at the LaFayette Community Center on Monday mornings 8:30-11

a.m. Call instructor Lynn Perrine at 315-677-8114 for details.

Men's Basketball: Monday evenings, 7-9 p.m. in the Grimshaw Elementary School gymnasium. Program runs through March 2018. Participants must sign a waiver, which are available online or at each session. The cost for this program is \$20 for the entire session or \$5 per week walk-in fee.
