
## LCSD Water Reporting

As required by County and State regulations, water samples were taken from District wells for analysis by Don Warnow, Safety Officer of OCM BOCES on July 25, 2017. The samples were then sent to Microbac Laboratories in Cortland.

The reports indicate that the water supplies were of a satisfactory, sanitary quality for all locations however, C. Grant Grimshaw school water supplies tested higher than 20mg/l of sodium. Although there is not a set maximum level for sodium, it is recommended by the county that people on severely restricted sodium diets should be made aware.

Therefore for those that may be on severely restricted sodium diet, it is recommended that caution be used when consuming the water from the Grimshaw school.

## From the Desk of the Director of Instruction and Pupil Services

Summer is ideal for completing in-depth, long-term projects. The multiple opportunities and uninterrupted time summer affords staff and administrators to collaborate is tremendous in comparison to the time to be found during a demanding, productive school year.

Kate Jugan, an Academic Intervention Services/Response to Intervention (AIS/RtI) teacher at C. Grant Grimshaw Elementary, facilitated professional development regarding the Eureka Math Modules for PreK-6th grade teachers. During the first session, educators explored and analyzed the curriculum to understand how lesson components built toward a comprehensive and in-depth understanding of mathematics. The second day focused on fluency, which helps students develop the speed and accuracy required to solve complex problems efficiently. On the last day, educators learned a step-by-step process to customize lessons. Additionally, the 7th and 8th grade mathematics teachers updated their curriculum maps and developed common summative assessments that will be used to monitor not only student progress, but evaluate the mathematics curriculum.

After delving deeply into mathematics, teachers met the following week with Jessica Whisher-Hehl, Director of Innovative Teaching & Learning at OCM BOCES, to discuss science. The focus of the three sessions was on: The Framework for Science Education, the New York State Science Learning Standards, the Instructional Shifts: A focus on explaining phenomena or designing solutions to problems; three-dimensional learning: disciplinary core ideas, science and engineering practices, crosscutting concepts; and coherent learning progression: conceptual change over time NOT layering "schooled knowledge" over naive understanding; and science for ALL students. Teachers also started developing the Science Curriculum

Once science was finished, teachers switched their focus to English Language Arts. Teachers of writing familiarized themselves with the Units of Study in Opinion/ Argument, Information, and Narrative Writing by Lucy Calkins and Colleagues. The Units of Study provided the foundation for revamping the entire writing curriculum. Additionally, Lyn Seres returned to support teachers' further understanding of how to develop students' phonemic awareness, the ability to hear, identify, and manipulate phonemes, the smallest units of sound that can differentiate meaning; as well as the transition to phonics, the connections between sounds and letter symbols.

Denise Pawlewicz and Lisa Schelgel, instructional specialists at OCM BOCES, assisted teachers in reviewing the curriculum maps for Social Studies. Teachers

examined existing units to ensure alignment of the framework, instructional shifts, and inquiries by reviewing the Social Studies Standards and utilizing the Understanding by Design framework by Jay McTighe and Grant Wiggins. Teachers also spent time discussing and developing summative assessments, which included the role of writing in Social Studies.

The Art, Culture, Language, Family and Consumer Science, Health, Music, Physical Education, and Technology teachers rounded out the work in July. The goal for each department was to revise curriculum maps and develop common summative assessments that will be used to monitor not only student progress, but evaluate the curriculum for each encore content area.


In addition to all the curriculum work completed, other committees, such as Mental Health, Academic Intervention Services/Response to Intervention (AIS/RtI), Special Education, and Mentor/Mentee and Professional Development groups met to revise and update plans pertinent to the running of the district. The Mental Health committee focused on the District Guidance plan and streamlining processes for assisting students with their socio-emotional well-being. The AIS/RtI committee developed infographics in order to provide visuals of the AIS/RtI process as well as checklists for staff. All were added to the manual, which will be shared during Opening Day. All staff were afforded opportunities to receive further training with AIM-Sweb - ELA and Math (PreK-6) and STAR - ELA and Math (7-12), universal screeners used for the AIS/Rtl process. The Special Education department reviewed caseloads and participated in professional development on legal requirements and guidelines to ensure compliance and streamline procedures. The Mentor/Mentee and Professional Development committee reviewed data, updated the plan, and outlined professional development for the 2017-2018 school year.

The summer ended with New Employee Orientation. All new employees participated in two days of training to acclimate themselves to the district.

I will end this year's opening remarks as I did last year. Consistency is at the heart of everything we do here at LaFayette Central School District. We are continually striving for a guaranteed, viable curriculum along with procedures to help support this realization so that LaFayette students graduate with the skills and strategies to tackle the future with confidence and success. I appreciate the efforts of everyone who is working to reach that goal.

## **SCHOOL BUS ROUTES 2017-18**



All private and parochial students will be picked up by their respective buses for the school they are attending. In the afternoon, students will ride their respective bus home or meet an activity run bus at the LaFayette Jr./Sr. High School to ride an activity bus home, depending on the time.

Be sure to carefully check to see which route and bus your child(ren) have been assigned to. There are slight adjustments in a few routes for this year. If you have any questions on any of the routes, or if it is not clear what bus your child should ride, please contact Ron Cooper in the Transportation Office at 677-9700. You are welcome to call this number whenever you have a concern, comment or suggestion. The following pages list the morning bus routes for the upcoming school year.

Bus #132 A.M. Route - (ONS & LCS) – From Bus Garage proceed north on Route 11 towards Nedrow to Quarry Rd. turning right onto Old Route 11. Proceed to Frontage Rd. Then Continue down the hill to the first left onto Maybee Lane. Return to bridge then left on Hemlock up to turnaround point. Return to Hemlock to Webster turning left on Webster up to turnaround point. Return to Hemlock proceeding to Martins Lane then continue to upper Martins Lane and turn around back down Martins Lane to Route 11A to Nation School. Return on Route 11A north to Route 11 shuttling students to High School. Return to Bus Garage.

Bus #163 A.M. Route – From Bus Garage, bus will turn right on Route 20 picking up students on north side of Route 20 as bus proceeds onto Ortloff Rd. From Ortloff Rd., bus will turn left onto Route 11A continuing to Nichols Rd. Turn Right onto Nichols Rd., right on Tully Farms Rd., and then right onto Webster Rd. to turnaround point. Return to Webster Rd., turning right onto Tully Farms Rd., and then left onto Bear Mountain Rd. to turnaround point. Turn left off of Bear Mountain onto Tully Farms Rd. and then left onto Route 20 west to turnaround. Return to Route 20, turning left onto Tully Farms Extension to Route 11A north. Turnaround Route 11A, head to Rowland Rd., and then back to Route 20. Proceed to LaFayette High School and then to Grimshaw.

**Bus #138 A.M.** Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed north on Route 11 to Kennedy Rd. picking up students on Route 11, north of McClary Rd.. Turn right from Route 11 to Kennedy Rd. to Sentinel Heights. Turn right on Sentinel Heights to Graham Rd. Left on Graham, beginning pickups at this point to LaFayette Rd. Left on LaFayette Rd. to Forestry turnaround. Back on LaFayette Rd. to left turn onto Barker Hill Rd. to turnaround. Barker Hill Rd. to right turn on Brevity Lane, then left turn back onto LaFayette Rd. to Cove Rd. turnaround. Proceed to High School and then to Grimshaw.

Bus #139 A.M. Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed left on Route 20 to LaFavette Rd. Turn left on LaFayette Rd. to Reidy Hill Rd. Turn right on Reidy Hill then right onto Persse Rd. Turn around on Persse, turn right on Reidy Hill, and then right on Eager Rd. to Apulia Rd. Turn left on Apulia Rd. to turn around and then proceed on Apulia to Route 20. Left on Route 20, left on Dodge Rd., and then to Apulia Rd. and turn right. Proceed to Colton Rd. Turn right on Colton to O'Connell Rd. Turn right on O'Connell and then right on Route 20 proceed to the High School and then to Grimshaw.

Bus #145 A.M. Route - (ONS & LCS) – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed right on Route 20 to Everingham Rd. then back to Tully Farms Rd. Extension to Route 11A. Turn left on Route 11A beginning pickups just over Reservation Line. Continue on Route 11A to Gibson Rd. Turn left on Gibson to Route 80. Continue right onto Route 80 to Commis-

sary Rd. Turn left on Commissary and continue up to turnaround point. Return on Commissary to Route 80 to Gibson to Route 11A. Turn left on Route 11A picking up students as bus proceeds to turnaround point. Go to the Onondaga Nation School. Then proceed to Grimshaw.

Bus #148 A.M. Route - (ONS) - From Bus Garage proceed left on Route 20 then left on Route 11 north. Continue on Route. 11 to the arena and start pickups. Continue to the Bus Loop then to West Conklin Ave. Proceed South on Route 11A to Hemlock. Turn right to Long House and turn around. Proceed back to 11A to the Nation School. Wait at Nation School until students are allowed in building then return to Bus Garage.

**Bus #150 A.M.** Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed north on Route 11 beginning pickups just north of the High School. Continue on Route 11 to McClary Rd. Proceed onto McClary, then Kennedy, and then to Sentinel Heights. Continue on Sentinel Heights to Mercun Drive. Turn right on Mercun to turnaround point. Back to Sentinel Heights turning right on Sentinel Heights and continue entire length of road to Route 11. Turn right on Route 11 to the High School then proceed to Grimshaw.

**Bus #151 A.M.** Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed right on Route 20 to Naughton Rd. Turn right on Naughton to turn around and back to Route 20. Proceed on Route 20 to Webb Rd. and turn right. Turn left onto Amidon Rd. up to turn around on Summer Ridge. Back on Amidon to Webb. Turn left on Webb and continue picking up students as bus proceeds to Shute Rd. Turn left on Shute Rd. up to turnaround. Return to Webb Rd., turn left, and proceed to Route 11. Turn right on Route 11 to Mondore Dr. Right on Sentinel Heights and right on Winacre Dr. picking up all students on Winacre. Proceed to High School then to Grimshaw.

Bus #154 A.M. Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed left on Route 20 to LaFayette Rd. Turn left on LaFayette Rd. beginning pickups on both sides of LaFayette Rd. from Rte. 20 to Coye Rd. Turnaround at Coye and Old Coye Rd. and continue on LaFayette Rd to Bull Hill Rd. Turn Right on Bull Hill Rd. picking up students on Bull Hill as bus proceeds to McClary Rd. Left on McClary to Route 11. Left on Route 11 then left on Norman Dr. Pick up students on Norman Dr., Pioneer Rd., and then Bella Vista Dr. Right on Mondore and proceed to High School then to Grimshaw.

**Bus #158 A.M.** Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed left on Route 20 to LaFavette Rd. Turn left on La-Fayette Rd. to Reidy Hill Rd. Turn right on Reidy Hill to Eager Rd. Turn left on Eager Rd. beginning pickups at this point.

Proceed down Eager to Coye Rd to turnaround. Proceed back on Coye Rd. to LaFayette Rd. Turn left on LaFayette Road proceeding to Commane Rd. Turn right on Commane Rd picking up students on Commane as bus proceeds to Route 11. Turn left on Route 11 pick up students on the West side of Route 11 (stopping at Apple Ridge Apartments) to the Dollar General Store turn around and then pick up students on East side of Route 11. Continue to High School then to Grimshaw.

Bus #159 A.M. Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed left on Route 20 picking up students on south side of Route 20 to Berry Road. Right on Berry Road to Newell Hill Road. Right onto Newell Hill Road to Clark Hollow. Left on Clark Hollow to turnaround. Clark Hollow to Route 20. Left off Route 20 onto Palmer Road. Turn around on Palmer Road and back to Route 20. Left on Route 20, then left onto Apulia Road picking up students on west side to turnaround point then picking up students on east side. Left on Route 20 and then left on Applewood. Turnaround and back to Route 20 to Festival Gardens. Proceed to Willow Wood Apartments then to High School. From High School proceed to Grimshaw.

**Bus #160 A.M.** Route – From Bus Garage, bus will proceed south on Route 11 to Feather Dr. looping through to Sturgen back to Route 11. Turn right on Route 11 to Meeker Hill Rd. Turn left on Meeker up to turnaround. Back on Meeker Hill Rd, turning right onto Sky High Rd. to turnaround. Back to Meeker to Holcomb to Meadowlark Circle; back to Holcomb turning left to Deer Run. Right on Deer Run to turnaround and back on Deer Run to opposite end and return to Holcomb to Meeker Hill to Route 11. Left on Route 11 to the AT&T Towers then proceed to Maple Grove Dr. to Sugar Bush Dr. then proceed back to North Rd., turning left on Scammell Rd. Left on Route 11 to turn around on the South end of Route 11, then proceed to High School then to Grimshaw.

We are making the most of the quickly passing summer as we prepare for next school year. The Big Picture staff will gather this summer for professional development as we set our academic goals for the 2017-2018 school year. We are eager to continue our growth with READ 180 and STAR Math.

The aquaponics projects that were developed from our Agricultural Entrepreneurship and Engineering Workshop are complete and we have a self sustaining aquaponic grow system. The system includes a rain barrel/water shed for harvesting rainwater, a 100-gallon fish tank stocked with Tilapia to provide nutrients for the plants, and an aquaponic grow bed to filter the fish waste and circulate the water. All we have to do now is feed the fish and watch the plants grow. We are currently growing basil, parsley and kale to start with, and are looking to make upgrades next year. This was a fairly large and intense project, however we managed to get everything done in the limited amount of time we had. Walt's advisory was very active in this project and donated \$250 to purchase the final supplies we needed. We hope you will be able to purchase organically grown herbs with your Big Picture Scholarship Garlic at next year's Apple Fest.

### **Notice of Asbestos Management Plans**

As provided under the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act, (AHERA - EPA 40 CFR 763), LaFayette Central School District hereby makes known the steps it has undertaken to comply with AHERA and the availability of asbestos management plans.

- 1. Beginning in 1989, all district owned facilities were inspected for asbestos and management plans were developed for each building according to the requirements of AHERA. Triennial reinspections are conducted every three years. Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES of Syracuse, NY completed the 2016 AHERA Triennial inspection and update to the asbestos management plans.
- 2. Periodic Surveillance of asbestos containing building materials is conducted every six months.
- 3. All custodial and maintenance staff have undergone 2-hour Asbestos Awareness Training.
- 4. All response actions taken are within federal and state guidelines.

### **District Traffic Safety Reminders**

Speed and carelessness injure kids!


Are you aware that the speed limit in front of the Grimshaw School on Route 20 is 20 mph while school is in session? Please adhere to the speed limit to protect our elementary students...besides, it's the law, and you will be ticketed if caught driving beyond the posted speed in any School Zone.

The School Zone in front of the Jr./Sr. High School is 35 mph. Again, it's the law that this speed be enforced.

Also, it is law that vehicles not pass school buses in ANY school driveways or parking areas when school buses have their red lights flashing. Vehicles are to remain stopped while buses have red lights flashing regardless of where the buses are stopped, as red lights are indicators that students are boarding or discharging from the bus.

If you are behind or approaching any school bus with red flashing lights you must STOP. That means you cannot go around any bus on any side either!

You must remain stopped until the bus driver turns out the red signal lights, or a law enforcement officer signals you that it is okay for you to proceed.

### Initial notification to persons in parental relation and staff pursuant to Section 409-h of the State Education Law.\*

Dear Parent, Guardian, and School Staff:

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The LaFayette Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72-hours following an application;
- anti-microbial products;
- nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- silica gels and other nonvolatile ready-to-use pastes, foams, or gels in areas inaccessible to children;
- boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- ◆ the application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- the application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- the use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals

from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasps, and hornets.

In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on the 48-hour prior notification list.
