#### TGIF from Greg






building a fursuit costume since the beginning of the year, and this week we made digistilts for it. These stilts add height, but also give the impression of a more animalistic

Wyatt was busy in the workshop this week creating mini hockey sticks for the youngsters that will attend his STP hockey clinic. I think the




