
TGIF from Lenny

We also attended the college fair at OCC and registered on College Board in preparation for future placement exams. There has also been a push towards completing Health and PIG requirements as 301s have been making significant progress in Gradpoint and writing their public policy papers. Most of my time this week was spent grading argumentative essays for our school and developing writing goals for each of our students. I have completed grading all of the essays then created a list of common writing problems that I would like to improve. I've gathered a good amount of data and am hoping to develop some lessons and writing prompts that advisors can use to improve students' abilities for the next argumentative essay.

This week's highlights:

Jamus is interested in prop making, and this week I worked with him on making a batarang out of aluminum. I have worked with aluminum in the past, but this was a tricky project because of many curves and sharp lines. We experimented with a combination of cutting, filing and sanding techniques and managed to get a rough draft made up. Next week, we are hoping to clean it up and polish it.

I helped Evan work on a diorama this week for an advisory project. He is interested in D-day, and wanted to make a diorama of Normandy beach. I have some model making experience, so I showed him some basic diorama making techniques and



helped him plan things out. We completed the foundation this week, and next week, we are hoping to paint everything and add the final details.

Jamus and RJ are interested in learning basic outdoor survival skills as part of their LTI projects, so I worked with them to make a primitive structure outdoors. They did some research of different types of structures, lashing techniques and types of materials to use, and then set off to make a prototype. It took most of the day, but they ended up making a structure that was very solid and dry. This was a fun project outdoor project, and they

both learned much from this experience.
