I started working with the 201s this week to help them with grammar and writing. I will be doing a series of mini workshops to help them improve on these skills. The 401's are anxiously awaiting news regarding college acceptances, or they are putting finishing touches to their applications. The concept of



Typically, we have our advisory sessions, workshops and exploratory on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. Leaving Tuesdays and Thursdays for internships, service learning and project work. It's also an important time to have one on one meetings with students to touch base. With both snow days last week landing in internship days, it made for a busier week than usual.

In Living Environment, we began to investigate the Galapagos Islands and its unique flora, fauna and terrain. Next we will utilize a design-thinking model to create 'beaks' for picking up seeds. This will be a precursor to the Beaks of Finches State Lab that focuses on the variety of finches on the archipelago.


In ER, we are well under way with an exciting project. We have begun to grow plants using a couple hydroponic systems. Rick, an expert in the field, has been guiding us and teaching us throughout the process. Last week, Rick joined us for ER and we checked pH levels, looked at ppm in the water, and evaluated the health of the plants. We have a bucket system and a tray system, each with a couple of variables. We are also growing some plants with synthetic nutrients and some with organic. Rick shared his mission to develop a system that uses the minimal amount of resources (light, water, space, nutrients) for the maximum yield. The ER students are genuinely interested in this mission. We are also monitoring the pH daily, making adjustments, and will be designing a system to filter water for the system.

As an added bonus, I took the opportunity to get my two groups of Living Environment students involved with the pH monitoring and reinforcing our understanding of photosynthesis and the plant's life cycle. I am excited about all the learning opportunities this experience will provide. And I am especially excited about enjoying the food that we will eventually harvest.

Our recent focus in 301 Advisory has been to prepare for January Regents Exams, develop our new learning plans, commit to Health and PIG requirements and find internship opportunities. I'm looking forward to a full 5-day week to build some positive momentum. Have a great week!
