LaFayette Students Visit Onondaga Lake to

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Research its History and Clean Up

The 8th Grade students at LaFayette Jr./ Sr. High School started their annual Onondaga Lake Research Project this year with a day-long Kick Off Event. Students spent the day traveling to different sites and listening to a number of speakers along the way.

The day started with a trip to Honeywell's Visitor Center for their Onondaga Lake Clean Up activities. Mr. John

McAuliffe and Mr. Craig Milburn from Honeywell talked to the students about the history of the pollution in the lake and outlined the ongoing clean-up efforts. Students also traveled to a region of Geddes Brook that was rehabilitated by Honeywell as part of the project. Mark Arrigo and Natalia Cagida spoke about how the wetlands were polluted with mercury and had transformed into a field filled with Phragmites – an invasive species of reed. The present conditions are very different, featuring a meandering stream and deep water wetland that supports a variety of habitats and has attracted many species to the area.

Next, the class traveled to the Onondaga Historical Museum for a tour and a presentation by Mr. Dennis Connors about how Onondaga Lake's Waterfront has changed through

the vears. Students learned about the early development of the salt industry and how the area developed into Svracuse's industrial zone. dominated by the Solvay Process Company (later Allied

EURRICULUM CONVERSATIONS Paula Cowling, Director of Curriculum and Instruction

Close reading—What is it? How do we do it?

Hopefully, your child received a stack of great books this holiday season. Fantastic! However, if you opted to purchase the new coat or the bike instead, we can help. The School Library as well as the LaFayette Public Library has mountains of books on hundreds, probably thousands, maybe millions of topics, just waiting to be 'checked out'! Now, about 'close reading'---.

In last month's newsletter we talked about the Six Shifts in English Language Arts: 1. Balancing Informational and Literary Texts; 2. Knowledge of the Disciplines; 3. Staircase of Complexity; 4. Text-based Answers; 5. Writing from Sources; and, 6. Academic Vocabulary. Close reading pertains to these shifts and is defined as a process through which students slowly and carefully make meaning of complex text by examining it from multiple angles. In her book, Common Core Unit by Unit, Cheryl Dobbertin breaks it down into three parts: "First, students learn about whatever they are reading about, the content or story the text contains. Second, students learn about vocabulary and syntax, and, with enough close reading, integrate new words and structures into their own writing and thinking. Third, they learn about the text itself-how it is written, the specific structures the author employed, the words the author chose, the impact the author was trying to make, and the strength of the author's argument." In some capacity, close reading (in the early grades, 'close listening') occurs in all standards in all grade levels in all subjects. It is critical to a depth of understanding of any topic.

Close reading can be fostered by parents as well as teachers. Step 1 - Encourage your child to select both fiction and non-fiction texts, preferably appealing to their interests, baseball to bugs. Step 2-Read it yourself first. This will enable you to discuss the content and anticipate any vocabulary challenges. Step 3-If you own the book, you may want to let the reader use a highlighter as they slowly and carefully read to understand the content as well as the author's purpose and process. Step 4-- Enjoy! Sharing the book with your child is the best of all!

Budget Update

Planning for the 2014-2015 school budget began over this summer and is well under way. The Budget Calendar was adopted at the October 10th School Board of Education Meeting and the first budget update will be at the January 23, 2014, Board of Education Meeting.

The Governor is anticipated to release his preliminary state budget on January 21, 2014, or the third Tuesday in January following the first Monday. We will use those revenue figures until the final State budget agreement between the Governor and the Legislature that is due April 1, 2014.

The District is anticipating a small increase in State Aid over last school year and will continue to use a conservative approach to budgeting in the upcoming school year. As you may know, the two largest areas for revenue sources in our District are State Aid and Real Property Taxes. The tax levy limit (tax cap) will still be in effect for the 2014-2015 school budget year. This means that the tax levy increase is limited to the lesser of 2 percent or the change in the Consumer Price Index (CPI). Trends are showing that the CPI will be less than 2 percent.

The District will continue to seek out options for maximizing its revenues and will carefully analyze potential savings through attrition. Below is a list of important board meeting dates for the budget process:

Again, this is an opportunity for students to demonstrate their abilities to be successful and responsible for their own learning.

dominated the shoreline, students also took a tour of the museum.

The group returned to Honeywell's Visitor Center for a presentation by Dr. David Matthews from the Upstate Freshwater Institute. He was involved in a research investigation that studied increasing nitrate levels at the lake bottom and decreased the levels of mercury present in the water column. Dr. Matthews outlined the steps of the Scientific Method the researchers followed as they develop their plan, conducted their experiments and reported their findings.

Finally, the class returned to school and listened to a special presentation by Tadodaho Sid Hill who explained why Onondaga Lake holds such a special significance for the Onondaga Nation. He provided a brief history of the Nation and the development of the Haudenosaunee Confederation. Additionally, Ms. Sarah Wraight from the Onondaga Environmental Institute helped outline some of the issues that the Onondaga Nation have concerning the current clean-up of the lake.

Students are using the information gathered to complete an interdisciplinary project based on how industrialization and urbanization negatively impacted Onondaga Lake, the current clean-up efforts being completed by Honeywell and Onondaga County, and the possibilities of a cleaner lake in the future. In addition to the speakers and presentations, students will conduct internet research and email a professional, scientist or professor to ask them specific questions. In addition, students are defining words and answering curricular questions for their science and social studies classes, as well as completing a Document Based Question (DBQ) essay about the Lake.

Finally, students will distill all of their learning and research into a persuasive essay for their ELA class that discusses what they think about the current work being done and what they think could be done in the future.

Trip to Cornell University

First, I'd like to thank Paula Cowling for presenting me with the information I needed for this trip to even happen.

On November 20th, my HSTY 201 (college US History) students planned a trip to Cornell University to view one of only five known copies of the Gettysburg Address in Lincoln's own handwriting. To make the trip even better, Mrs. Cowling suggested that Nancy Hummel's AP Biology students come along, and that part of the day be spent at the Cornell Ornithology Laboratory at Sapsucker Woods. There was still room for people on the bus, so April Palmer, the Social Studies teacher from Big Picture, brought some of her US

Dear Parents,

I hope everyone has a wonderful holiday break! Welcome to winter! Please be sure your child is dressed for the cold weather with hats, gloves and boots as well as a warm jacket.

As for illnesses, we've mainly been seeing a variety of upper respiratory infections (colds/bronchitis/pneumonia/ croup) and a stomach virus here at school (as of press time anyway!). No doubt flu season will be here soon, and may be here by the time you read this. Please notify me if your child is absent for any reason and please keep them home for 24 hours after a fever, vomiting or starting on antibiotics. It would be best if you call me directly (677-5501) even if you let the teacher/office know. You may leave a message on my voice-mail if I'm not available, or send me an e-mail.

A relatively new immunization requirement for 6th graders is the Tdap vaccine which is given after the student's 11th birthday. A detailed letter about the Tdap requirement will be sent home with students with their report cards in February. If your child will be in 6th grade next year, please discuss this vaccination with his/her physician so your child can have this done and on record before school starts in September.

Every year, each student at Grimshaw has a vision and hearing screening done. You will be notified if I feel that your child needs further evaluation. Please don't hesitate to call me if you have any concerns regarding your child's vision or hearing. If your child has a professional exam, please send a copy in to me for their record.

Physicals are required in grades Pre-K, K, 2 and 4 and if you are new to the district. At this time, there are about 30 students with outstanding physicals, so we're in good shape thanks to all your cooperation! If you're one of the last 30 please notify me of the date your child's exam is scheduled and send in a copy of your child's exam as soon as it's completed.

Remember to keep updating those emergency phone numbers and be sure extra clothes are available for your little ones.

Another reminder regarding medications: a note from a physician, as well as a parent, is required to give any meds at school. This includes over-the-counter meds as well.

One last reminder: if a doctor writes your child out of gym class, he/she must have a doctor's note before they can resume gym or other physical activity.

English Notes

The students in both grades 7 & 8 are working hard on their novel units. 8th grade continues with *Forgotten Fire* and 7th grade with *Milkweed*. These novels both provide rich, grade appropriate literature practice as well as important historical settings and knowledge.

It is important that students remember to keep up with their outside reading assignments. Students should be spending about 20-30 minutes each day reading at home. Students should find a quiet, comfortable place that they can use to do this reading. They can choose any books they wish for outside reading as long as the books are on their reading level.

Math Matters

I am so incredibly proud of my 7th and 8th graders!! They are growing by leaps and bounds. My expectations for my students are high, and we are reaching and sometimes exceeding those goals. The work is challenging, but the students are beginning to believe in themselves.

In seventh grade we have finished Module 1 of the Common Core Learning Standards. We will be learning operations of integers. You can help by sharing real world examples of negative numbers and how they are used in our lives. (for example: temperatures below zero, when they don't have enough money to buy a desired item, etc.)

In eighth grade, we have finished Module 1 and Module 2! We will be exploring tessellations for the Academic Fair as well as moving into Module 3 which covers similarity. Our first topic in this module will be on dilations.

I have enjoyed getting to know your children! They are all special in their own unique way. It is a pleasure to have them in my class.

Science All Around Us


Science 8 is studying *Interactions Among Living Things*. They are aware that there is a living environment interwoven into an abiotic system, but now Science 8 will study how that living environment interacts with other living organisms. How do they compete? Do they prey? Do they hide and blend? The 3 types of symbiosis will also be discussed. Science 7 will continue learning how to measure matter. In the next 3 weeks they will measure mass, length and volume – all in metric units of course! Measuring tools will include a kg scale, triple-beam balance, metric rulers, meter sticks and graduated cylinders.

What's Up with Social Studies?

7th grade has been working on a research project titled "Famous American Companies." Each student chose a company that was founded in America, most in the 1800s, which still exist today. They have researched information such as the founder, the original products and product changes and additions. The students will present this information in the form of a short paper as well as three-sided presentation boards. We are inviting parents and family members to come view the projects and presentations and to help be a part of celebrating the students' hard work!

Academic Fair

This year the academic fair is January 2nd and 3rd. Seventh graders are completing their projects in social studies and eighth graders are completing theirs in math. The students will need to work hard and keep up with the steps in order to finish in time. We encourage all family members to come out to the school to see the finished products!






