FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

THANK YOU

This will be my last Greensheet article as your Superintendent of Schools. It has truly been an honor to work with such a wonderfully talented group of students and adults. When reflecting on the past six years, I can honestly say that I've loved every minute. People in this community are passionate about their school, that's exactly the way it should be. I was fortunate to work with Board of Education Members who honestly put students first in every decision. A Board that managed to keep the tax levy increases at or below 2% every single year. A Board suited to lead the district into the future.

Together, we have weathered the deepest cuts to public school funding in LaFayette's history. We, along with New York State, have raised expectations for student success; and our students are rising to the expectations. The building leadership team of Principals Blossey, Bump, Ellsworth, and Osborn are among the finest in the state. With their leadership we have: maintained and increased the number of college courses; expanded enrichment opportunities at the elementary level; increased our pre-kindergarten programs; and, offered alternatives to students struggling with school. We watched our graduation rate climb to 90% and stay there. None of these are easy accomplishments, but we did it.

Two years ago, in a Greensheet article, I wrote the following: "Through a series of recent conversations, I have been challenged to examine my core values, especially in the area of diversity. The scope of programs and choices we have at the high school level, for example, addresses one aspect of diversity that has recently been a topic of conversation. The idea of supporting two approaches to the same goal, high school success and graduation, has been the source of a great deal of conversation inside and outside the school walls. A LaFayette student could attend a highly successful "traditional" high school or attend a highly successful "alternative" high school at Big Picture. I am aware that there are proponents of both approaches, and I understand all of the arguments for both. The defining characteristic of supporting diversity is, in LaFayette, you do have the choice. It's not about pitting one against the other, as a parent or student you decide what's best for you and we support it."

We are a diverse community, but together we are LaFayette. We are the Lancers.

I am pleased that Laura Lavine will be the Interim Superintendent. She brings a wealth of knowledge and ability to the position, she understands the district, and, as our current Director of Special Education, she knows many families. She inherits an office staff I will miss deeply. I wish her all the best.

Again, thank you for your support over the years.

LaFavette School District Security

The main focus of the LaFayette School Board is to maintain and improve the safety and security of our students and our staff while providing the very highest quality learning environment. We continually review our processes and procedures in this regard, and are making security enhancements district wide.

In the Junior Senior High School and Grimshaw Elementary, we will be improving the security at all points of access to the buildings. We will also be upgrading the video capability aspects of the security systems for the interior and exterior of the buildings and also the grounds. The main entrances to both buildings will be improved to increase security and at the same time ease the frustration of those visiting the buildings. As the Big Picture program will be relocating to the high school as the capital project advances, these students and staff will benefit from the security measures added to the high school building, as well.

We will be retaining Gary Oelkers as our student Resource Officer in the High School, Grimshaw Elementary and the Big Picture School. He will be performing the same duties on our school grounds as he did in the past when he served us as a uniformed state trooper. A few of his many duties include being a liaison to local law enforcement agencies and assisting in providing important information regarding the security of the schools to provide a safe learning environment for our students. He is also very instrumental in providing a role model to the students, providing them with the resources to make wise decisions regarding avoiding negative behavior, bullying, and drug and alcohol situations, while also investigating incidents that may arise. Mr. Oelkers will not be in an SRO position at the Onondaga Nation School but will be available as needed for information and safety presentations when requested. We are very honored that Mr. Oelkers has decided to stay with us in this position.

The Onondaga Nation School is also working diligently to maintain and improve their safety and security. Onondaga Nation Security Personnel are stationed on the school grounds 24/7, both inside and outside of the building. There is an electronic security system in place for the entrances with a request in to the State Education Department for updates. The Onondaga Nation School also has an emergency plan in place with the Onondaga Nation Fire Department, the Onondaga County Sheriffs and the Onondaga Nation Council.

We appreciate your support as we move forward with these increased measures to achieve our goal of providing the safest and most secure campus for our students and staff to allow an optimal environment for learning.

SCHOOL BOARD PRESIDENT INPUT

Hello LaFayette,

This month, I would like to discuss what the Board of Education has been doing to plan and prepare for the future. There are strong indicators that the State of New York will release 50% of the Gap Elimination Adjustment for the 2015-2016 school year. That will allow us to begin to rebuild some of the programs and support that we have lost over the last five years, when the GEA has taken almost six million dollars from our budget.

The 2014-2015 Budget has had a number of opportunities that have saved programs and jobs. Two months ago, we had a \$600,000 shortfall between 2014-2015 revenues verses expenses. Once again, our fiscal problems coincided with decisions being made by valued members of our staff. Mary Raye Casper, Lisa Cuddy, Nancy Donaldson, Kathy Gosh, Tom Turner, Paula Cowling and Peter Tigh have made the decision to retire from their positions with the LaFayette Central School District. We wish to thank them all for their dedication to the children of our community and to wish them the best in their future endeavors. In addition to these retirements, the legislature released \$230,000 of our Gap Elimination Adjustment. The combination of these funds went a very long way in making up the \$600,000 shortfall.

A decision made by the Board and the Administration at the end of the 2012-2013 school year led to another piece of good fortune for our educational community. In the fall of 2013, the District hired a per diem Director of Special Education to help the department reorganize their operations to better meet the needs of our students requiring special education services. The person hired was Ms. Laura Lavine. Ms. Lavine was re-entering the work force following an early retirement that she had taken to care for an ailing family member. Ms. Lavine had retired from the Clarkstown Central School District in Rockland County, where she had been the Assistant Superintendent for Pupil Services/Director of Personnel. Ms. Lavine brought with her a wealth of knowledge and experience and unparalleled dedication to educating young people.

When Peter Tigh made his intentions to retire known, the Board began to look deeper into Ms. Lavine's credentials. Ms. Lavine's curriculum vita (resume') is six pages long and contains a list of references that include four superintendents of schools, board members, teachers and parents of students from districts where Ms. Lavine has previously worked. Ms. Lavine is currently finishing her Doctoral studies in Teaching and Curriculum at Syracuse University. She completed her Superintendent development Program at SUNY Oswego in 2004. Ms. Lavine received her Certificate of Advanced Studies - Educational Administration at Syracuse University in 2005. She received a Master of Science in Speech-Language Pathology from Ithaca College in 1982 and her Bachelor of Science in Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology from Ithaca College in 1977. Ms. Lavine has held leadership and/or administrative positions in the Liverpool, Onondaga Central, Fabius-Pompey and East

Syracuse-Minoa Central School Districts. The accomplishments that Ms. Lavine lists in her CV match many of the challenges we have in the LaFayette Central School District.

The Board approached Ms. Lavine to ask if she would be interested in coming into our District as the Interim Superintendent of Schools when Peter Tigh retired. After careful consideration, Ms. Lavine agreed and an interview with the Board of Education was scheduled. At the interview, Ms. Lavine presented us with a plan of what she would pursue as acting Superintendent to learn about our school district. The plan involves the parents, students, teachers and administrators who would make up the team responsible for the delivery of an improvement in student achievement and test scores. The plan also provided a track that she will follow to improve communication and focus on the positive aspects of our educational community. Ms. Lavine also included plans that she would use to manage the budget in a way that maximizes the use of every dollar to improve our students' success.

The Board of Education formally appointed Ms. Lavine as the Interim Superintendent at the April 24, 2014 Board meeting with a starting date of July 1, 2014. They hired Ms. Lavine for the sum of \$30,000 per year. She will be an interim superintendent for six months with a review of her accomplishments coming from the Board of Education after three months in the position. If Ms. Lavine meets the expectations of the Board, they have the option to offer her a full-time position any time after the three-month review. At that point, Ms. Lavine's contract has the potential to be extended for four years, which includes her six months as interim, at the rate of \$30,000 per year. To compliment her salary, Ms. Lavine requested that the District provide her and her husband with lifetime health insurance. Tiffany Nesbitt, our Business Manager, utilized an actuary to calculate the risk to the District given the circumstances of Ms. Lavine and her husband. The calculation indicated the cost to the District would be about \$269,000 to provide Ms. Lavine and her husband with this benefit. The District is saving about \$135,000 a year in salary and retirement benefits by employing Ms. Lavine as our Superintendent of Schools. After two years of service as the Superintendent, Ms. Lavine will have saved the district an equivalent of the cost of the insurance. This contract will save the District approximately \$540,000 over the four years of Ms. Lavine's contract while at the same time providing the District with world class professional leadership.

Please take the time to welcome Laura into our community. If you have the time to give, I am sure that she can find a way to utilize your talents to support our children. We, on the Board of Education, are looking forward to working with Laura Lavine as the Superintendent of Schools at LaFayette.

CURRICULUM CONVERSATIONS Director of Curriculum and Instruction

How would you like your Elementary Student to investigate claims companies make about their products and business practices being environmentally friendly, prove or disprove the claim, and present their findings at a pseudo Senate hearing? How would you like your Middle School student, as a time traveler, to create a plan to keep Europe out of religious wars and then report back to a panel of 'judges' (social studies teachers /administrators) as to their findings and suggestions? How would you like your High School student to research a current job in today's society knowing that the future expectations of this job could possibly change by the time they are entering the workforce, and then create a new job from this existing profession? These are all examples of Project Based Learning (PBL) inherent in the Big Picture program, but also finding its way to all the buildings in the district.

What is PBL? Our BOCES PBL trainers have defined it as, "...a systematic teaching method that engages students in learning important knowledge and 21st Century skills through an extended, student-influenced inquiry process structured around complex, authentic questions and carefully designed products and learning tasks." The BOCES trainers offer the following as the essentials elements of PBL:

- Significant Content—Knowledge and skills derived from standards/key concepts at the heart of academic subject areas.
- 21st Century Skills—Critical thinking, problem solving, collaboration, communication.

- In-depth Inquiry—Students are engaged in a rigorous process of asking questions, using resources, developing answers.
- **Driving Question**—Open ended.
- **Need to Know**—An entry event that generates interest and inquiry.
- Voice and Choice—Students are able to make teacher guided choices
- Revision and Reflection-Students use feedback to consider additions or changes
- Public Audience—Students present to others beyond their classmates and teachers.

Why PBL? It is engaging, relevant, rigorous, and responsive to our changing world. More and more LaFayette teachers are attending PBL workshops and returning with some fantastic ideas to share with our students. More to come!

On another note, please permit me to thank our school community for a wonderful 15 years. It has been a pleasure to be a part of such important changes in the District such as, but not limited to, the flying of the Haudenosaunee flag, Regalia at Graduation, a credit recovery program, expansion of college credit-bearing courses, character education, driver education and overall excellent academic progress. You are fortunate to have wonderful teachers devoted to your children, supportive parents, generous taxpayers, a significant cultural asset in the Onondaga Nation, and fabulous students. May this always be true.

A Friendly Farewell to a Friend and Colleague: Paula Cowling

Paula, I must admit I'm still in a bit of shock, or maybe just denial (it ain't just a river in Egypt), that you've decided to retire. I am certain that the decision was a tough one, but that, ultimately, was the right one: I understand that all of your grandchildren will be living in Central New York for the first time. Having watched my parents with my son Jacob, I know that if that's not a huge retirement incentive, I'm not sure what is.

No one in LaFayette can appreciate what you brought to this school in the fall of 2000, or what it is missing out on fourteen years later, more than I can. You and I have a unique history: one that includes handshakes at National Honor Society and graduation when I was your student, my hiring in the summer of 2008 as a colleague, but also a few instances where I needed the book thrown at me so I could learn a valuable lesson... as a student and a colleague. (I'd appreciate the details of the necessary lessons from my formative years remaining confidential.)

Paula, we've shared hugs. We've even shared tears. I can recall my senior year of high school being one of the toughest anyone could imagine. 9/11 rocked our lives that fall, and the loss of three dear friends rocked our lives in the spring. Despite that being your first year in charge of a school building, I believe that you handled it like a seasoned pro: even more so now that I can reflect on it as an adult and a fellow educator. When it was clear I needed it, I received a gentle hug and some warm words that induced a flow of tears: despite it being needed from a student who had clearly been a pain in the neck in the past. In that moment, even as a teenager, I knew that you had never passed any judgment over me due to any of my petty (if not a little funny to laugh about now) juvenile actions.

I can recall my hiring process being professionally challenging: more so than any other school in which I was interviewed. In later conversations with you, you let me know that you stepped up the pressure on me because you had great expectations for me. I can't imagine my career having taken the same path had you not had those expectations. When my career had a very bumpy path for a short time, you were an irreplaceable mentor and guide. When my son was born, no one outside Chris and my families could have been more excited than you. When we recently announced that we were expecting another child, you were again one of the most excited. This list could go on and on and on...

We've also shared some arguments, and some pretty spirited head-butting. However, never once did I ever feel disrespected or unfairly treated with you, because you are the ultimate professional. In fact, I feel that I've learned just as much from those instances as I have from my most positive experiences. No one could ask to have worked with a more respectful, responsible, reasonable, and caring person.

I wish you the happiest retirement, because you deserve it more than anyone I've ever known.

COLLEGE VISITS

As summer arrives and Juniors are thinking of what college they will attend after high school, some students have been to visit colleges and others are making plans to visit. We encourage parents to individualize the visitation process by attending these college visits with your children. Students may express the wish to attend alone with their friends, but a quality visit to colleges should involve parents going with their children. If possible, leave younger siblings at home. The college visit should focus on the student applying to college. This is a chance to spend quality time together. To arrange these visits, call the individual college's Admissions Office.



Dear Parents,

Wow! Here we are again at the end of another school year! I have a few reminders to pass along to you for next

- 1) All students entering PK, K, 2nd and 4th Grades, as well as any new students to the district, will need a physical. Forms were sent home with students before the Memorial Day break for your convenience. There is also a Dental Health Certificate attached as these are now requested the same years as required physicals. If your child visits the dentist, please have the form filled out and return it to school. Students entering 7th Grade will also require a physical. We are having Physicals at GS on Thursday, June 5th, at 8:30 a.m. for those who wish to have a school exam. If your 7th grader has a physical over the summer please forward it to the Jr./Sr. H.S. nurse.
- 2) All new entrants, including PK and Kindergarten students, must have their immunization record on file in my office before school starts in September. Also, all 6th graders who have turned 11 when school starts will need to show proof of having the Tdap vaccine, as well as 2 doses of Varicella vaccine or proof of Varicella disease. As noted in last month's newsletter, there are many changes regarding immunization requirements at all grade levels Pre-K through 6th. You will find a chart below summarizing those changes. Please check

with your doctor to be sure your child is up to date with the new requirements. Please call me if you have any guestions regarding vaccination requirements.

- 3) All medications require new physician orders in September for the new school year. They don't carry over from last year. Please pick up any meds your child has here before the last day of school or they will be discarded.
- 4) If any student is restricted from PE at the end of the school year, that will carry over to the new school year and they will need a release note before they'll be allowed to participate in PE.
- 5) Please be sure to send a change of clothes for your primary grade child to have available if needed.
- 6) Please remember to notify me if your child is absent for any reason, or if any emergency contact numbers change. You may call, e-mail, send a written note or leave a voicemail at any time.

Thank-you all for your support throughout the year, and as always feel free to call with any question or concerns. I hope you all have a safe and happy summer!

1.000 Pets in a Second Grade Classroom?



Revised New York State Department of Health (NYSDOH) Immunization Requirements for the 2014-2015 School

General Info

The new immunization requirements for school entrance/ attendance go into effect July 1, 2014. Note: July 1, 2014 is the beginning of the 2014-15 school year.

Vaccine Specific Info

- Students in grades K and 6th will need 2 varicella vaccines, and may need an additional dose of IPV. (Students in grades 1-5 and 7-12 are not required to have additional doses of these vaccines).
- Students no longer need 2 doses of MMR to enter kindergarten unless they are 7 years of age or older. Per NYS-DOH regulations and ACIP Guidelines, a 2nd dose of MMR is required by age 7.

- Students in grades pre-K-6th may need additional doses of DTP/ DTaP if under age 7, or Tdap/Td if 7 years of age and older.
- There are no changes for grades 7-12.
- Serologic evidence is now acceptable for Polio as well as MMR, Hep B and Varicella.
- For Polio, antibodies must include all three serotypes to be accepted as proof of immunity.
- Medical exemptions to immunizations must be reissued annually; and must specify the immunization exempted, sufficient information to identify the medical contraindication to the specific immunization, and specify the length of time the immunization is medically contraindicated.
