20th Annual Academic Galleria

Onondaga Nation School held its 20th Academic Galleria on Wednesday, May 16. The Academic Galleria serves to promote educational standards through research and challenging academic expectations for the students while also meeting and exceeding educational benchmarks set forth by the New York State Education Department.

There is plenty of evidence in the school as well as at home that the month of April and May is dedicated to Academic Galleria research. During the weeks leading up to the Academic Galleria one could walk through the hallways of ONS and hear the sound of

tapping Chromebook keyboards, the continuous motion of copy machines printing, and the footsteps of children who are proudly holding the latest models they designed to enhance their projects.

The 2018 Academic Galleria had nearly 130 student projects exhibited this year which represents each student in the Pre-Kindergarten through the Eighth Grade at the Onondaga Nation School.

The Academic Galleria student projects are evaluated by arbiters who carefully listen to the student's oral presentation for criterion indicators. These indicators demonstrate the presenter's knowledge of subject matter, use of materials, and the fluency of the oral presentation. The quality of project appearance is vital as each student must incorporate: Project Title, use of color, neatness, spelling, and grammar, along with a statistical graph of pertinent data, a model for demonstration, and a recognition of resources or works cited for their Academic Galleria project.

The Arbiters for the Academic Galleria include community professionals, school district administrators, and university graduates & professors - all of whom are committed to the educational success of oral presentations through comprehensive

research for the students of the Onondaga Nation School.

This year over 30 volunteer arbiters actively participated for the 20th Anniversary of the Onondaga Nation School's Academic Galleria 2018. Project themes by Grade:

Singing Cicadas

You may have seen some of our Native students coming in with bags of bugs to cook and share. Please understand the history behind this. This is a celebration of survival for your students.

Our word for President is Hanadagá•yas. It means "Town Destroyer." During the American Revolution some of our people sided with colonists, some sided with British, but many remained neutral considering this to be a fight between father and son. Because of the actions of those that sided with the British, George Washington declared that the Haudenosaunee be destroyed.

All communities were targeted and Onondaga was no different, especially since it
was -as it still is- the capital of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy. (Ever wonder why the
Onondaga Nation is so small when we were
once regarded as a powerhouse in east and
the capital of the Haudenosaunee Confederacy?) The military hanged many of our people
and our villages, crops, and supplies were
destroyed. Those who were not killed outright
starved to death that winter. The spring came,
and the survivors were greeted with the 17
year locusts. The locusts were the food that
allowed people to survive. They are considered such a gift to our community.

Some people eat it raw-tastes like seafood without seasoning. Most people saute them with a little butter and salt until crisp. The fried cicadas taste like popcorn. Usually you get them in the morning before they eat and fill up.

I understand that it may seem weird (although eating insects is quite common around the world-and really what is an insect if it isn't a crustacean that lives on land?), but I wanted to give a big Nyawenha -thank youto you all for being supportive of our students willing to come to school and share their history with you.



bearing the items made especially for Community Give Day. These words of thanks, written by Virgil Brave Rock, provide a sense of the feelings created by the day. "Words cannot express my gratitude and thankfulness to all of you for helping to pull off another year of Community Give. It was a successful and fun time for everyone and we have created memories for our ONS students that will remain with them forever".

Students and teachers are preparing for 8th grade graduation. Graduation will be held at the Field House, on Thursday, June 21, and it will include many of the traditions that have been handed down over the years, including the presentation of skits by the younger students and the presentation of scrolls to family members and teachers. All students entering PK, K, 1st, 3rd and 5th grades, as well as new students, need a physical. (Please note the required years have changed for next year.) Dentist visits are also now requested the same years as required physicals. If your child visits the dentist please have them write a note or fill out a form of their choice stating date of visit and results of check-up.

All new entrants, including PK and Kindergarten students must have their immunization record on file in my office before school starts in September. All 6th graders who have turned 11 when school starts will need to show proof of having the Tdap vaccine as well as 2 doses of Varicella vaccine or proof of varicella disease. As you know there have been many changes regarding immunization requirements at all grade levels the past few years. As soon as I know of any new changes I'll pass them along to you. The current NYS Immunization Requirements for School Attendance/Entrance Chart is posted on our website. Please check with your doctor to be sure your child is up to date with current requirements. Please call me if you have any questions regarding vaccination requirements.

All medications require new physician orders in September for the new school year. They don't carry over from last year. Please pick up any meds your child has here before the last day of school or they will be discarded.

If any student is restricted from PE the end of the school year that will carry over to the new school year and they will need a release note before they'll be allowed to participate in PE.

And one more thing-as many of you already know I'm retiring in June so this will be my last newsletter to you all. It has been my great pleasure to watch your children grow and help keep them healthy and happy over the last 25 years. I plan on subbing for the new nurse so you'll probably still see me around. Thank you all for your support throughout the years and as always feel free to call with any questions or concerns before the end of the year. I hope you all have a safe and happy summer and a great school year next year!
