## FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

Now that the voters have approved the Capital Project, it is time to move into the schematic design phase. This means we will be putting details to the approved work. In some areas, such as the renovations to the current LGI, detail work has already been discussed with some teacher/parent/community input. This process will continue and will go on through April, 2014. At that time, documents will be sent to the Board of Education for approval, and then to the State Education Department for review.

Building committees will be formed with key stakeholders including administrators, parents, students, and teachers. These committees will meet to discuss the design development and make suggestions within the scope of the project. If you would like to be a part of a committee, please contact me or one of the building principals at your convenience.

It is our goal to award bids in January of 2015, that's a little more than one year from now. Construction will occur in such a manner as to have little or no impact to the instructional program. As always, the great majority of construction will occur over the summer months.

Once again, thank you for your continued support. We, as a school district, have much to be proud of.

On a sad note, we recently learned of the passing of Malcolm Knapp. For more than half of his 83 years he was the LaFayette Town Judge. He will certainly be missed in the community.

## EURRICULUM CONVERSATIONS

'Depth not Breadth' is a theme threading through the Common Core. Instead of a little bit of a lot, we are asked to teach a lot of a little bit. The belief was that education was, "A mile wide and an inch deep." To rectify the situation we were given Common Core "SHIFTS". In brief, for ELA they are: 1) Balancing Informational and Literary texts; 2) Knowledge in the Disciplines; 3) Staircase of Complexity; 4) Text-based Answers; 5) Writing from Sources; and, 6) Academic Vocabulary. For Math: 1) Focus; 2) Coherence; 3) Fluency: 4) Deep Understanding: 5) Application: and, 6) Dual Intensity.

Having been a Jeopardy fan for years, I have always been impressed by the breadth of knowledge contestants exhibit. In the course of one program, answers can range from 'ionization, to sotto voce, to DaGama, to gamete, to William Styron, to physiology, to Red Sea, to pork barrel, to Ground Hog's Day to Archimedes.' The categories span the disciplines, some general knowledge, but the majority of the answers reflect a depth of understanding.

So how did these successful contestants become experts who exhibit both depth and breadth? The answers is obvious-their teachers. Whether it is the passion for a subject or a talent shared by a parent, a guardian, a coach, or a teacher, someone in their life has lit the fire. We must be steadfast in our commitment, igniting this passion to learn, to go deeper. While the 'SHIFTS' provide the base, we provide the inspiration, the guidance, the curiosity, and the encouragement. We teach.

#### **Capital Project**

On October 25, 2013, the Capital Improvement Project proposal was approved by voters with 275 YES votes and 229 NO votes. We would like to thank those who have participated in public presentations, as well as everyone who came out to vote. Your continued input will be welcome as we take the next steps to finalize architectural drawings and designs to submit to the State Education Department. From there, we anticipate

several months of design review at the State level before the District will receive approval for funding from the State. Our hope is that the project will go to bid by the Spring of 2015.

## SCHOOL BOARD PRESIDENT INPUT

Hello LaFayette Residents,

We have just finished a tremendous exercise in democracy. The vote on a Public School Referendum is the one place that we as Americans can see that our vote counts. As a district, we voted to make a bold move into the future by providing a strong education for our children that has the flexibility to meet the needs of a broad base of children. As technology becomes more pervasive in our society and information becomes easier to procure, the way we teach our children must continually evolve. Change is never comfortable and it is never easy. I have found that when I have been in the throws of the agitation caused by change, trying to discover why the change is necessary is my only consolation.

In LaFayette, we have a unique opportunity over the next two school years to determine how we can meld two different approaches to teaching our children. The time between the bond vote and the beginning of actual construction will provide us time to heal the wounds we have experienced during this most recent democratic decision-making process. To begin actual construction on a project like ours in New York State, we must go through a very large number of processes that take significant time to complete. For that reason the actual construction cannot begin until February 2015, with a target completion date of September 2015. That time will provide us the opportunity to examine our schools' needs to become a school that is recognized as a place that people want their children to attend because of its excellent approach to education. We all know that people learn in different ways and they learn at different speeds. For this reason, our educational process must be flexible enough to meet the needs of high performing and mid-range performing students, as well as the students who must overcome many challenges in the learning process. We have learned that by providing different approaches to teaching students who might not be as successful in the traditional classroom, we can reach these students' inner drive to learn and unlock the doors that have blocked their ability to learn. Our challenge is to make these two learning processes fit together in such a way that they can operate effectively without interfering

with each other's learning styles or operational procedures.

One of the BOE's goals for this year is to have everyone in the district pulling in the same direction. That means that every decision that we make must answer the following question: "Is it going to improve our children's ability to prepare to have a successful life?" The 275 to 229 vote on October 25th that approved the district's ability to bond \$12,477,222.00 indicates that the voters in the district are in favor of moving forward with the full scope of the project. Although the margin in this vote is greater than the margin on our last Capital Improvement project, there is much to be done to better understand the opportunities we have as a district as we move through the 21st Century. We, as a district, need to come together and focus on how we can get behind this project to make sure we get the greatest value for each dollar to improve our educational process to meet the needs of all of the students in LaFayette.

There were a number of issues that surfaced during the weeks before the vote. Many of them were not relevant to the scope of the project, but still played into the voter's decision process. Some of those issues were: test scores, communication styles, administration, cost of the project and its relevance to the tax levy, lack of enrichment for high performing students, lack of electives, and lack of trade-related courses. These, as well as other concerns, will be addressed via discussion held in community-based groups.

We on the BOE want to thank all of you who took part in the decision-making process. What may have seemed on the surface to be an insurmountable obstacle became an opportunity for us to get the architects to provide us with visuals that showed just how the seemingly undoable can be done. We have a good school district with dedicated teachers, administrators and staff. With a voter number of 504, it is obvious that we have a lot of community members who are interested in what is going on in the schools. We need everyone's help to move forward in our quest to have our school district recognized as a "School of Distinction".

Let us all work together to build what we have into a shining example of what "great" looks like. Be positive and remember to smile each day and to look for the good in everything and everyone vou see.

What is your favorite subject? English. I just like to read and write.


Who inspires you to do your best? My dad, because in hockey he pushes me harder. He can get a little more out of me even if I'm pretty tired.

#### District Meal Charge Policy

Students in Grades K-8 may charge a reimbursable breakfast and/or lunch.

However, if a student owes five dollars (\$5.00) or more, they will not be allowed to charge. A student with a charge balance of \$5.00 or more will be offered a peanut butter and jelly sandwich and milk for lunch and fruit, graham crackers and milk for breakfast at no charge.

At no time will a student with a \$5.00 or more charge balance be allowed to charge ala carte items.

A negative balance letter will be sent home for students who have charged a negative balance of \$5.00 or more. If the charges are not addressed once a letter has been sent home, the food service manager will ask the school principal to become involved in the collection of funds.

\*Please Note: High School students, Grades 9-12, are not allowed to charge meals at all. If a student does not have money, they will be offered a peanut butter and jelly sandwich and milk for lunch and fruit, graham crackers and milk for breakfast at no charge.

\*\*Students who have peanut allergies will have an alternative lunch option of a cheese sandwich.

## **NHS Blood Drive**


The National Senior Honor Society held a blood drive for the Red Cross on Tuesday, October 22<sup>nd</sup>. NHS members

All seniors began the common application in September. Most four-year colleges will accept the common application.

#### **JUNIORS**

Juniors will receive their PSAT results in late December/ early January. We will begin the college search process once we review their scores.

Additionally, the 11th grade class went on Naviance in September. This web-based planning and advising system allows parents to have access to critical information about their child's interests and post-high school plans. Juniors created a resume in 9th grade and each year they are encouraged to update it. They will begin a college search in February using this system. ## **Project Lead The Way Classes and** Big Picture School Visit Welch Allyn

Students in the Project Lead the Way classes at the Junior/Senior High School together with students from the Big Picture School were invited to attend Welch Allyn's Manufacturing Career Day on Friday, October 4th. The field trip was an opportunity for students to visit the local engineering firm, which specializes in designing and building equipment for the medical profession.

Students toured the facility in small groups to learn the history of Welch Allyn, understand how the design process comes to life in industry, and get a first-hand glance at the management processes. The groups were invited onto the manufacturing floor where students learned how engineers and technicians interpret design drawings to assemble and produce medical equipment.

The event also included a track for educators and business leaders to have a dialogue regarding ways to boost manufacturing in the region. According to the Manufacturing Alliance of Central New York, one of the event sponsors, manufacturing jobs in Central New York have been on the decline. Manufacturers like Welch Allyn have trouble filling jobs that require technical skills. Superintendent Peter Tigh participated in a panel discussion aimed at better understanding what skills manufacturers are looking for and what career opportunities are available for our students here in Central New York.

## Health Office News

Dear Parents.

I hope everyone had a wonderful and healthy Thanksgiving holiday break!

We had a fairly healthy November here at school seeing mainly respiratory viral illnesses with a few cases of strep throat and croup. We also had a stomach bug that hit guite a few students and staff. Please continue to keep your children home after any illness until they are fever-free for a period of 24 hours without the aid of medication. Following this rule of thumb helps tremendously in containing the spread of viral illnesses. The 24 hour rule should also be followed after vomiting or starting on antibiotics. I appreciate all of your cooperation as we try to keep our school healthy. I know many of your children have received flu shots which will also help to keep us all healthy. Please consider getting your child a flu shot if you haven't already done so, as well as yourself!

Please remember to call the school if your child will be absent for any reason. Please try to call by 8:30 a.m. if possible. You may also leave a message before school or the night before, or send an e-mail if that's more convenient for you.

Most 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> grade and new students have now had their physicals and handed in the paperwork - thank-you! We have some students scheduled for private exams who still need to have their exam and/or hand in the paperwork. Please get this information in to me as soon as possible after your child has had their exam. If your child has an appointment scheduled, please notify me of the date if you

haven't already done so.

All 6th grade students are required to have a Tdap vaccine when entering 6th grade or when they turn 11 years old. If your child was not 11 when school started, they will need to have the vaccine as soon as possible after turning 11. Please notify me of the date your child is scheduled to have the vaccine and turn in the documentation as soon as completed. Parents of 5th graders should keep in mind the Tdap vaccination will be required for their child next year and plan ahead for this. It can be given as soon as your child turns 11.

Please remember all medicine given at school must have a prescription or written note from a physician. This includes all over-the-counter meds also such as Motrin, Tylenol, cough syrup, antacids and even cough drops. If your child needs a rescue inhaler or Benadryl or Epipen at school, please be sure we have them available here.

Please continue to update emergency information and be sure your child is dressed warmly for the winter weather as most classes do play outside daily(weather permitting). Please remember to have extra clothes available for your K-2 students for an "emergency".

As always, don't hesitate to call if you have any questions or concerns. I wish you all a very Happy Holiday season with your family and friends!

Plastic fire hats and packets were given to students and adults in the room. What a great learning experience for all.



#### A Whacky Looking Bus Visits O.N.S.

O.N.S. students in Grades Pre-K to 8, took part in the LaFayette School District's bus safety presentation. The "wacky" looking bus was loaned to LaFayette from the Phoenix School District. The design of this particular bus allows children to actually practice escaping from the hatch and back door. The front half of this unique vehicle is like all buses but the back half is built to simulate a bus on its side.

Miss Tammy and Miss Dottie instructed students on bus safety and ways to escape in case of an accident. Students were shown where blind spots on the bus are, how to cross the street using the driver's hand signals, and behavior on the bus.



After the basic bus safety talk, students were then shown the emergency radio and brake. Each child was given an opportunity to look through the roof escape hatch and then to practice getting out using the second half of the bus. After doing these, students were able to slide out the back door.



B.o.b. (by own bus) was a stuffed dummy that students were able to watch as "he" demonstrated dangerous situations and their possible results. B.o.b. was carried out by seventh graders as Tammy and Dottie timed the escape. All ten students, including B.o.b., were out of the bus in 33 seconds.

The demonstration and instruction served to remind everyone that knowing and practicing bus safety is important for all.

#### **ONS JUGGLES: Juggling Skills** vs. Academics

Recent research is correlating juggling to improved



academics. School districts that include this skill in their curriculum find students improve their coordination, academic performance and behavior. Classroom teachers report improvement in students' academic work and focus after starting juggling. Because students use both sides of the brain while juggling, participants enhance their concentration. eve-hand coordination. improve behavior, gain self-confidence, and a physical workout.

Another benefit for participants is the level everyone starts at. Since most

students have never juggled before, everyone starts at the very beginning. Those students, who normally do not excel in other areas of athletics, can juggle. This "sport" can be done without a coach, expensive equipment, and on an individual basis.

This individual activity has many benefits in the educational world. Teachers have noticed students who have trouble learning juggling, also have trouble learning to read. With extra practice juggling, reading abilities improve. Team work and better concentration all become side benefits of this skill.

There will be Entertainment, Native foods, Sweets, Stews, Coffee, and Sassafras tea.

The show is free but donations will be accepted. Parking is free and more parking will be available at the Onondaga Nation Health Center.


