

LaFayette Competes in Junior High Science Olympiad Regional Competition

On March 4th, LaFayette sent a group of talented students to compete against other local students in the Midstate Regional Competition held at North Syracuse Jr High School. This year's squad was composed of 9th graders Collin Dix, Jack Caughey, Noah Brothers, Ryan Zajac and 8th graders Arianna Shenandoah, Colton Keane, Evelyn Ryan, Hanna Pierce, Hunter Martorella, Kendra Doupe, Luke Wanlass, Rebekah Reyburn, and Amelia Shenandoah, with Mr. Amidon, Mr. Zehner and Mrs. Harris coaching the team.

The Science Olympiad program is one of the premier STEM-related scholastic competitions in the nation. Students compete in more than 20 events that focus on scientific and engineering principles. Many events require students to build devices ahead of time, others determine how students can successfully complete a lab-based scenario, while others are content-based and students are assessed on their overall knowledge in that particular area.

LaFayette earned medals this year in Herpetology, Wind Power, Reach for the Stars, Rocks & Minerals, Ecology, Hovercraft, Road Scholar, and Write It- Do It. Great job, Lancers!



National Technical Honor Society Induction

Congratulations to senior Taylor Cook who was inducted into the National Technical Honor Society on Thursday, March 16, 2017. The goal of the National Technical Honor Society is to "recognize deserving students who have chosen technical education pathways to a successful future." Students inducted are nominated by their teachers and exemplars of the eight core attributes: Knowledge, Skill, Honesty, Service, Responsibility, Scholarship, Citizenship and Leadership.

This school year Taylor has participated in a rigorous Physical Therapy Occupations program through New Visions. An OCM BOCES program, New Visions is "an exciting approach to program delivery for eligible high school seniors. It provides an in-depth overview of a chosen professional field by placing the student in an actual work environment outside of school. New Visions provides a sense of relevance to senior year and a directed transition to the next step of professional development."

Board Petitions Available

Any qualified LaFayette Central School District resident interested in running for a seat on the Board of Education is reminded that the deadline for filing a petition for the post is Monday, April 17, 2017 at 4:00p.m. in the District Office. Three 3-year terms and one 1-year term will be available. Currently held by Mark Johnson, Michael LaCava, Janine LeBlanc, and Tom Scofield, these terms will expire as of June 30, 2017.

To qualify for membership on the school board, an individual:

- Must be able to read and write.
- Must be a qualified voter of the district, that is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age, or older, and not adjudged to be incompetent.
- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election.
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year.
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family.
- May not be a current employee of the school board.
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office.

LaFayette CSD Residents to Vote on \$5.4M Capital Project

In May, LaFayette Central School District residents will have the opportunity to vote on a capital project that addresses improvements and safety and security upgrades at three of the district's facilities.

The proposed project focuses on LaFayette Junior/Senior High School, Grimshaw Elementary School, and the District Office/Bus Garage/Maintenance buildings. Its scope is based on an extensive evaluation recently performed by the district's architects and engineers. New York State requires all public school districts to complete the evaluation, called a building condition survey (BCS), every five years.

The district plans to pay for the \$5,432,950 project through a combination of State Aid funding and expiring debt. **It will have no new impact on taxpayers.**

Capital Project At-A-Glance

Grimshaw Elementary School (\$1,163,000)

- Repoint brick, repair and repaint interior plaster in 1965 wing.
- Repoint chimney masonry.
- Replace interior non-rated, wood classroom doors in 1939 and 1951 wings.
- Repair exterior concrete stairs behind gymnasium, including railings.
- Renovate kitchen, including floors, walls, and ceilings. Replace all mechanical, electrical and plumbing equipment - including piping, conduit, circuitry and accessories in their entirety - and outdated food service equipment.
- Enhance existing security system.

LaFayette Junior/Senior High School (\$4,222,450)

- Replace softball field's backstops and baseline fencing.
- Refurbish track.
- Repoint chimney masonry and re-caulk control joints.
- Replace outdated glass skylights in toilet rooms and stairwells with high-performing insulated system.
- Renovate gym lobby to accommodate serving and cafeteria entry expansion, including expanding existing toilets for ADA compliance.

- Repair high school gymnasium wall flashing.
- Renovate kitchen, including floors, walls, and ceilings and update serving area. Replace all mechanical, electrical and plumbing equipment - including piping, conduit, circuitry and accessories in their entirety - and replace all outdated food service equipment, including server line.
- Renovate cafeteria, including exposed ceiling, acoustic treatment, and variable seating options.
- Renovate basement, including updating Wellness Center, constructing a new corridor, creating new team rooms and reconfiguring athletic storage.
- Renovate second floor classrooms and hallway. Includes replacing carpeting with resilient flooring and replacing ceilings and lighting (LED).
- Repair loading dock by resetting metal stairs, edge angles and add dock bumpers.
- Replace interior electrical panels and transformers at first floor janitor's closet.
- Replace public address (P/A) notification system.
- Replace domestic water pressure booster system.
- Upgrade emergency lighting, including adding an emergency panel and transfer.
- Replace athletic field scoreboard.
- Enhance existing security system.

District Office/Bus Garage/Maintenance (\$47,500)

- Replace overhead door at maintenance.
- Replace rusted frame at bus garage and in-fill unused louver.
- Replace steel windows at maintenance area.
- Renovate toilet rooms at maintenance area.

District residents will have the opportunity to vote on the project during the annual school budget vote on Tuesday, May 16, 2017.

District News ♦ District News ♦ District News**Ongoing Enrollment for Free and Reduced School Meal Program**

LaFayette Central School District accepts applications for free and reduced-price school meals throughout the school year.

Under the National School Lunch Program, all LaFayette CSD students in households receiving benefits from SNAP, the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations, or TANF can get free meals regardless of family income. Students could also qualify for free meals if their household's gross income is within the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines' free limits (see chart below).

To apply for the free and reduced-price program, parents/guardians should submit a Direct Certification letter received from the NYS Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance, or return a completed application to school. Applications are available on the Food Services section of the district's website, www.lafayetteschools.org.

A new application must be completed each school year. Applicants will be notified of eligibility status in writing.

This chart lists income levels according to household size and income levels. Income is listed in the following formats: annual, monthly, twice per month, every two weeks and weekly. If your household income is the same or less than the amounts on the chart below, your children can get reduced price meals and may be eligible to receive free meals.

NCAA – ATTENTION JUNIORS

Now is the time for college-bound student-athletes in the

junior class to register with the NCAA Eligibility Center if they plan on participating in college athletics. Early registration promotes positive planning and involvement, bypasses the last-minute rush and helps college-bound student-athletes avoid issues that may delay their academic and amateur certifications. The registration process is easy and can be done by logging on to the Eligibility Center's new website at www.eligibilitycenter.org.

College-bound student-athletes need to apply to the college or university they are interested in attending in their senior year. Some student-athletes think that because they are being recruited or because they have registered with the Eligibility Center, they do not need to apply for admission. Athletics eligibility and admission to a college or university are two separate processes and both need to be completed.

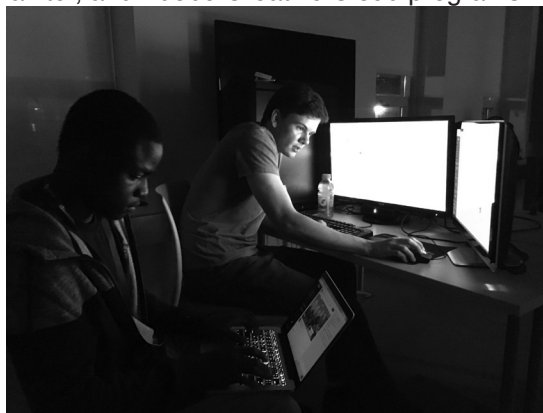
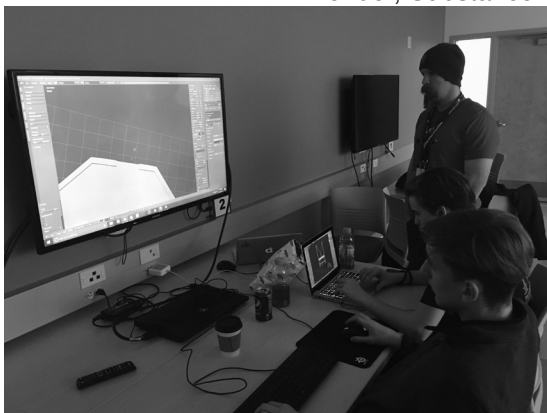

Worldwide Global Game Jam

STEP students participated in this year's Worldwide Global Game Jam event at Morrisville State College. Students from the LaFayette Central School District were tasked to create a video game in 48 hours. They joined over 30,000 artists, coders, and game makers across the world. Students Abe Stanton, Nicholas Park, Jaheal Smith, Zaire Smith, and Dan Conover spent 48 hours collaborating, designing, coding, and creating a video game based on the theme "Waves". Students used the game-making software Unreal 4 Engine to develop a game character that uses echolocation to satisfy the "Waves" theme. Students prepared for the event by learning the Unreal Engine, 3D Modeling Blender, Substance Painter, and Adobe Creative Cloud programs. Students worked closely together,

teaching one another, and developed a playable game. There was not much sleep, but a lot of productivity. This was the fifth year students have participated in this event and STEP has become the most reliable team for Morrisville State College. ONS Debuts the LaFayette Science Olympiad Team

Arianna Shenandoah (8th grade) joined the LaFayette Science Olympiad Team in this year's competition, which was held at North Syracuse Junior High School on March 4, 2017. Arianna, along with Ashyah Lyons (ONS) designed and constructed a wood tower for the Tower Competition.

The Tower had to meet specific parameters set by competition rules. The base had to be 20cm by 20cm and its height had to be a minimum of 50 cm tall. It had to be constructed of low density wood. Arianna and Asyah constructed the tower with basswood, pine, and balsa wood. All wood was attached with a super glue. For competition, it was placed on a table and then a block and chain would be placed on top of the tower. A 5 gallon bucket is then attached to the chain. Sand was placed in the bucket by Arianna to see if the tower would hold the weight of 15.1 kg of sand. Arianna poured in the sand and Noah Brothers, her partner from the JSHS, stabilized the bucket with stabilization sticks. The tower held and did not break. Arianna also competed in the "Reach For The Stars" event. She had to identify constellations, explain stellar evolution, identify spectral classification of stars and much more.

Other ONS students who helped with the tower were Maddy Homer, Kylee Hemlock, and Grace Abrams. Theresa Balaguer, Rioux Johnson, and Annie Rossi researched specific invasive species to assist the JSHS team competing in this event. Their research was added to the invasive species binder. The students enjoyed their various participations and contributions. Next year, the LaFayette Olympiad team hopes to form two teams with ten ONS students participating in the competition.

Arianna Shenandoah, 8th grade, at ONS, recently participated in the 18th Annual Holocaust Art and Writing Contest sponsored by Chapman University. Arianna listened to the testimony from survivor Ralph Fischer, then created an art piece that was inspired by his story. While Arianna did not win, her piece was well received by the judges. The contest was entered by students from over 100 schools in 29 states and eight different countries. Nice work, Arianna!

Welcome to Spring!

I know we're all anxious to get some fresh air, sunshine and warm weather!

Hopefully, the fresh air both inside and out will help everyone get healthy again.

In March we had URI's, a few strep throats, a little stomach virus, and a virus with a fever and body aches. Please continue to keep your child home when they would clearly be contagious to others (productive cough, discharge from the nose/eyes, vomiting, rash of unknown origin, fever). A child with a fever should stay home until their temperature returns to normal without the aid of medication for 24 hours. Children should also stay home 24 hours after vomiting or being diagnosed with a bacterial infection treated with antibiotics (ie. strep throat/conjunctivitis). Please notify me directly when your child is absent for any reason (illness, injury, surgery, vacation, etc.). You may leave a voicemail or send an e-mail if that is more convenient for you or school's not open.

Speaking of fresh air and sunshine, the bees and the pollen will also be here soon. If your child has asthma/allergies requiring an inhaler or Epipen/Benadryl please be sure we have the medication at school to care for your child in an emergency. All medicines require a doctor's note and should be brought in by the parent for safety reasons.

All children in grades PreK-6 have their vision and hearing checked every year and I will notify you if I have any concerns. If I sent home a vision referral I would appreciate a follow up report from the doctor when your child is examined. Please call me if you have any questions or concerns regarding these screenings.

I will also be screening 5th/6th grade students for scoliosis (curvature of the spine) during April/May unless they've had a physical this year on file at school as the doctor would've already screened him/her. If your child is being followed for this condition, please send in a copy of their annual check-up.

If your child is one of the few students still needing a required physical this year please send that paperwork to me as soon as possible. Please keep in mind sixth graders will need a physical entering seventh grade. Also required to enter seventh grade in September 2017 is the meningitis vaccine. Parents of students entering sixth grade need to schedule your child's required Tdap vaccine before September if they've turned 11 by then. All sixth graders will need two doses of the Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. Most students have two already but some do not so please check your child's record.

Kindergarten screening will be held May 8th through May 12th here at Grimshaw. Please call the main office to schedule an appointment for your child if you haven't already done so. We look forward to meeting all our new students. Please bring a copy of your child's immunizations to date as well as any physical done after 1/1/17. If your child has any serious medical issues or will require medication at school please call me or stop in to see me.

If anyone is doing spring cleaning we could use sweatpants at school. Please keep extra clothes for your little one in their lockers/cubbies at all times.

Keep updating any emergency information and have a great Spring Break. Feel free to call me with any questions/concerns and thanks for your cooperation on all of the above.

Individual athletes, teams, and individuals who have made significant contributions may be nominated by using the following criteria and candidate form.

Criteria for Selecting an Induction Class: Individuals may be nominated from the five separate categories. Individuals cannot nominate themselves. Nominees must exemplify the highest standards of sportsmanship, ethical conduct, and moral character.

Nomination as a Player: The nominee, must be an alumnus of LaFayette School District and must have graduated at least five years ago.

1. An Athlete: Any person who distinguished themselves in the field of athletics while a student at LaFayette High School. Criteria should include:
 - a. School, league, state or national records; or,
 - b. League, state or national recognition; such as All Conference Team, All-District Team, or individual championship; or,
 - c. Individual statistics for a given athlete.
2. An athlete not honored for their high school athletic achievements but who participates in college and gains honors at this level may be considered by the Hall of Fame Selection Committee.
3. An athlete not honored for their high school athletic achievements but who participates at the Professional Sports Level may be considered by the Hall of Fame Selection Committee.

Nomination as a Coach: A coach with at least five (5) years of service at LaFayette High School or is an LCS Alumni, who has at least 10 years of coaching experience,

may be considered for the Hall of Fame. Consideration should be based on accomplishments that merit significant contributions of the Alumnus. The nominee, must have retired / departed as a Coach from the LaFayette School District at least five years ago.

Contributor: An individual who has made outstanding contributions to the interscholastic athletic programs at LaFayette High School other than coaching or playing.

Team Selection: The Hall of Fame Selection Committee may choose to select a LaFayette School District team (s) for induction into the Hall of Fame. To be inducted into the Hall of Fame, the team (s) must have distinguished themselves above and beyond normal standards. These may include:

1. Undefeated seasons; and / or,
2. League, sectional, district, regional or state championship; and / or
3. State appearances.

The nominated Team (s), must have graduated at least five years ago.

Posthumous Candidates: This is open to deceased athletes, coaches or contributors that have met eligibility criteria.

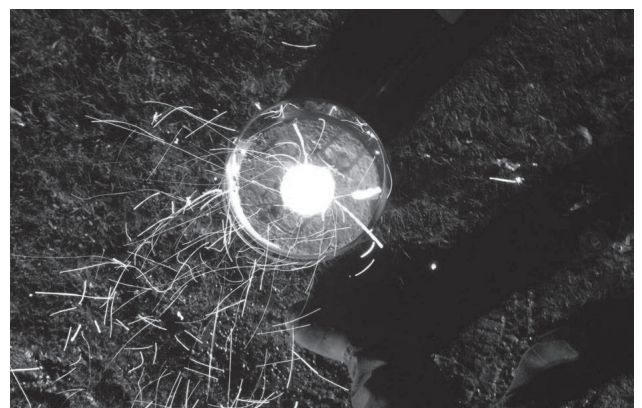
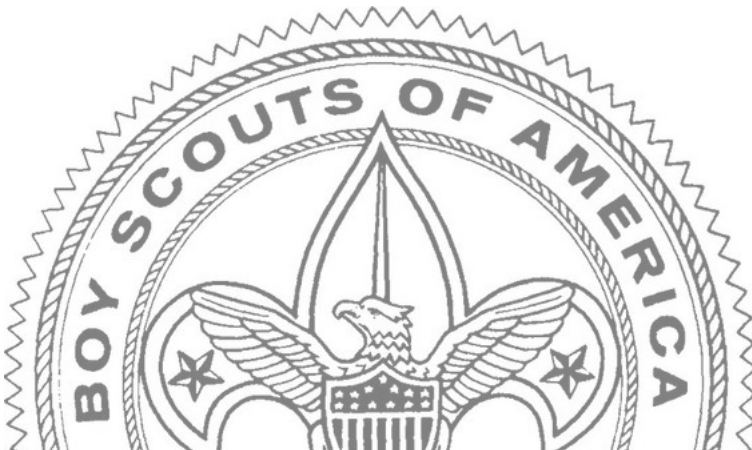
