### **New York State Education Commissioner visits LaFayette CSD**



To discuss the current state of education and observe firsthand the learning taking place at Onondaga Nation School, New York State Education Department Commissioner MaryEllen Elia recently visited LaFayette Central School District.

"I first met Commissioner Elia last year at which time we discussed the idea of her paying us a visit," LaFayette CSD Superintendent Laura Lavine said. "Her reputation for being committed to her school districts is certainly well-earned as evidenced by her following up on that conversation and traveling to see us."

During her October visit, Commissioner Elia and her delegation participated in a roundtable discussion with Superintendent Lavine, Assistant Superintendent for Business Tiffany Turner, and Director of Instruction and Pupil Services Karen Ocque. She then toured Onondaga Nation School where she

visited classrooms and participated in a forum focusing on Native American students to learn more about how the New York State Education Department (NYSED) can help to support

Addressing forum participants including Superintendent Lavine, ONS Principal Diane Ellsworth, Tadadaho Sid Hill and Onondaga Nation Chiefs, Clan Mothers, Faithkeepers and other Onondaga Nation community members, Commissioner Elia indicated strong support for continuing Onondaga language instruction as an integral part of the instructional program. She had high praise for the language and culture programs, and the other teaching that she observed in the classrooms.

Elia discussed the changes to teacher evaluations and state education standards. In September, NYSED announced that approximately 60% of the Common Core English standards and 55% of the mathematics standards underwent some type of change based upon more than 750,000 pieces of feedback from teachers, administrators and parents. She explained that the results of the NYS 3-8 assessments are no longer tied to teacher evaluation, and shared that the assessments have been shortened in length with the ability for students to take as long as needed to complete them.

As a token of their appreciation, during a small ceremony in the school's Cultural Center, ONS students and staff presented Commissioner Elia with a hand-beaded replica of the Hiawatha Belt, which is symbolic to ONS and the Haudenosaunee culture, along with a plaque commemorating her visit, both of which were created just for her.

"As far as we know, this is the first time that a NYSED Commissioner has visited LaFavette," Superintendent Lavine said. "She and her team have our gratitude for giving us their time, and for lending their expertise and support during this historic event."

#### NJHS College Visit

The National Junior Honor Society Chapter has an established tradition of visiting a local college campus. The students get a chance to see what the campuses are like, talk to current students and tour guides, and learn about what they need to accomplish in high school to make their college dreams a reality.

This year's Junior Honor Society annual college visit was a combined trip to SUNY ESF and Syracuse University. The day began with a tour of the ESF campus. The group got to see all of the lab rooms and where college

students have their classes. We also learned about the ways green infrastructure is built into the campus environment. After the tour, the group listened to a lecture from a PhD candidate about the nationwide discussion of GMO's, followed by an activity analyzing quotes taken from people speaking at public meetings that addressed GMO labeling.

Later, we walked over to the SU Admissions Office. There the group participated in an informational talk and Q & A session presented by an Admissions Counselor/ Native American Liaison. We then split into groups for guided tours of the campus. We had a lot of fun. We learned about college life and classes and what it takes to get into college.

#### From the Desk of the SUPERINTENDENT

For the second time, we administered the YouthTruth survey to our secondary students. The purpose of the survey is to provide a vehicle for students' voices to be heard anonymously, and to assure them that their opinions matter and are given due consideration. We asked for their thoughts about Academic Rigor, College and Career Readiness, School Culture, Relationships with Teachers, Student Engagement, and Safety. The survey also provided space for written comments that would allow the students to address topics that might not have been in the survey questions or given them enough opportunity to share their feelings.

The participation rate of 93% was outstanding, according to the YouthTruth organization so a big "Thank you" goes to all of the students who answered the questions and wrote hundreds of comments. all of which are being read.

Some students are very satisfied with their education at LaFayette, some are in the middle, and others are less than satisfied. What seems clear is that we are doing better than two years ago in some areas but not in others. I am pleased that in the area of safety, there is a noticeable increase in students' perceptions but, as with most things in life, there is room for improvement in all areas.

Every comment that students wrote is important. That is not to say that every complaint can or will be addressed but I want the students to know that we take their opinions very seriously so, to the student who wrote, "This survey doesn't even matter. The chances of someone actually reading this are slim considering no one cares about one student's opinion", I give assurance that the survey results do matter, we are reading all of the comments and, most important, we do care about your opinion. I also assure you that we will continue to strive for excellence in our practice so that all of our students will feel the way that many students do, some of whom wrote,

"All of the teachers in our school are very helpful and strive for the excellence of the students. The teachers all work to assist any students that need it and push for students to do their very best and try their hardest in their schoolwork. They offer extra help and answer questions to the best of their abilities. If a student still doesn't understand, they don't give up on trying to teach it to them and keep trying."

"Teachers are always willing to help you understand something." They all also want to see us succeed."

"I find support from all the teachers here and will help us in anything in school or out of school. The teachers know what they are teaching so I know I'm getting a very good education and if I need the help they would be happy to help me.'

"I chose this answer because the teachers do care about personal problems going on outside of school. They want to help as much as possible."

Thanks again to our students for giving us their valuable feedback. Their opinions are important to us and will guide us as we continue to work to make LaFayette Central School District the best in every way.



We had a fairly healthy November here at school but we did see some respiratory viral illnesses and some cases of strep throat, conjunctivitis and croup. Please continue to keep your children home after any illness until they are feverfree for a period of 24 hours without the aid of medication. Following this rule of thumb helps tremendously in containing the spread of viral illnesses. The 24 hour rule should also be followed after vomiting or starting on antibiotics. I appreciate all of your cooperation as we try to keep our school healthy. I know many of your children have received flu shots which will also help to keep us all healthy. Please consider getting your child a flu shot if you haven't already done so as well as vourself.

Please remember to call the school if your child will be absent for any reason. Please try to call by 8:30 am if possible. You may also leave a message before school or the night before or send an email if that's more convenient for you. Even if you notify the teacher please notify me as well.

Most 2nd and 4th grade and new students have now had their physicals and handed in the paperwork – thank you. We have some students scheduled for private exams who still need to have their exam and/or hand in the paperwork. Please get this information to me as soon as possible after your child has had their exam. If your child has an appointment scheduled please notify me of the date if you haven't already done so.

All 6th grade students are required to have a Tdap vaccine when entering 6th grade or when they turn 11 years old. If your child was not 11 when school started they will need to have the vaccine as soon as possible after turning 11. Please notify me of the date your child is scheduled to have the vaccine and turn in the documentation as soon as completed. Parents of 5th graders should keep in mind the Tdap vaccination will be required for their child next year and plan ahead for this. It can be given as soon as your child turns 11. Most students have received 2 Varicella (chicken pox) vaccines before 6th grade but if they haven't they will need a 2nd one for 6th grade under the new regulations.

Please remember all medicine given at school must have a prescription or written note from a physician. This includes all over-the-counter medications such as Motrin, Tylenol, cough syrup, antacids, and even cough drops. If your child needs a rescue inhaler or Benadryl or Epipen at school please be sure we have them available here.

Please continue to update emergency information and be sure your child is dressed warmly for the winter weather as most classes do play outside daily(weather permitting). Please remember to have extra clothes available for your K-2 students for an"emergency".
