

## LaFayette Student Attends Tribal Youth Gathering at White House



LaFayette Central School District student Kyla Smoke can now check-off from her bucket list visiting Washington, D.C.

She could also strikethrough brainstorming with the President of the United States of America, if she had it listed.

This fall, Kyla, a senior at LaFayette Junior/Senior High School and Onondaga Nation resident, joined nearly 100 student-leaders for the second annual Generation Indigenous (Gen-I) conference,

an initiative launched in 2014 by President Barrack Obama that focuses on removing barriers between Native youth and their opportunities to succeed.

The Gen-I conference is part of the annual White House Tribal Nations Conference (WHTNC), which is a summit that brings together tribal leaders from the 567 federally recognized tribes and provides them with the opportunity to interact directly with high-level federal government officials and members of the White House Council on Native American Affairs.

President Obama launched Gen-I as part of the annual conference after visiting Standing Rock Sioux Indian Nation in North Dakota.

"The young people of Standing Rock could not have been more poised and they could not have been more thoughtful,"

President Obama said during his 2014 WHTNC address. "They talked about their families and friends, and their dreams for the future. But they also talked about the pain in their hearts, and the obstacles they had to overcome, and the problems they had seen with loved ones who had been brought down by drugs or alcohol or violence or poverty."

The Gen-I conference is designed to connect, support and cultivate the next generation of Native leaders, according to President Obama's 2014 WHTNC address.

During the conference, Kyla participated alongside tribal and federal leaders in various breakout sessions and panel discussions. She discussed with other conference attendees some of the most pressing issues facing her community and together they brainstormed how these challenges can be met.

"It was a great learning experience and it took me out of my comfort zone – which is a good thing," Kyla said of the conference. "It was very eye-opening and taught me a lot about what's going on in other communities."

Kyla, who plans to study sports management after she graduates from high school, was selected to attend the conference following an application process. She said her favorite parts of the conference were learning how she can help her community and getting to see the "human side" of President Obama, who she said became emotional when he discussed how this year's conference was his last.

"He just seemed so human, it was refreshing," Kyla said. "Listening to President Obama and seeing his emotional side were the best parts of the conference."

### Big Picture Visits OCC

This fall the 101 Advisory from LaFayette Big Picture had the unique opportunity to collaborate with students from Onondaga Community College. Over the course of September, October and November our students visited OCC and worked with Professor Blankenship's Writing Composition class. Big Picture students and OCC students had similar writing and reading assignments that they shared, edited and discussed together at our meetings.

We traveled to OCC seven times and they paid us a visit where they were treated to a short tour and a mini-presentation from our students. We shared projects that our students were involved in and gave them an overview of our learning goals. Our students learned a great deal from Professor Blankenship's diverse group of students. They shared stories of growing up in different countries and many trials that they endured in life. We also shared our stories and found many common interests and experiences.

We are thankful to OCC and Professor Blankenship for making this meaningful collaboration possible. We are looking forward to working with OCC students again in the future.

### Cooperative Learning and Team Activities

At ONS, as part of the Physical Education curriculum, students participate in activities that will develop cooperation among peers. The goal is to help students appreciate the abilities of others and to use respectful communication to successfully complete an activity. One such activity is to raise and move the "nuclear waste" bottle from point A to point B. Students must work together to be successful. Another activity is to have four people "ski" across the gym. Both activities take patience and communication to succeed. Thinking outside the box is encouraged and ideas are often generated by individuals who normally are reserved and shy.

### From the Desk of the SUPERINTENDENT

Happy New Year to you and yours. I hope that this will be a healthy and prosperous year for all of you.

This is the time of year when school districts begin to formulate their budgets for the next school year. It is a process that varies from district to district and ranges from seeking little or no feedback from the community to fully involving the community.

You might recall that two years ago, in an effort to be as transparent as possible, we began involving the community in the development of the budget for the next school year. We repeated the process last year and are continuing it this year.

We believe that this community involvement will help to formulate a carefully considered budget for our students.

The meetings are scheduled for January 17th, January 24th and January 31st. All meetings will begin at 4:30p and take place in the High School library.

I hope everyone had a wonderful holiday break. Please be sure your child is dressed for the cold weather with hats, gloves and boots as well as a warm jacket. Classes are allowed to have outdoor recess if the temperature is 25\* F inclusive of the wind chill factor.

As for illnesses, we were mainly seeing a variety of upper respiratory infections before the break in all grade levels. No doubt flu season will be here soon and may be by the time you read this. Please notify me if your child is absent for any reason and please keep them home for 24 hours after a fever, vomiting or starting on antibiotics. It would be best if you call me directly (677-5501) even if you let the teacher/office know. You may leave a message on my voicemail if I'm not available or send me an email.

Every year each student at Grimshaw has a vision and hearing screening done. You will be notified if I feel that your

child needs further evaluation. Please don't hesitate to call me if you have any concerns regarding your child's vision or hearing. If your child has a professional exam, please send a copy to me for their record.
