Making Work Public

When I was in high school I loved Shop Class. Our shop classes were made up almost entirely of boys; the airls were doing something else, which I assume was cooking, or sewing, or some other stereotyped learning experience. I am so glad that those days of separating students by sex are over, it seems so silly now.

Anyway, as I mentioned, I loved Shop Class and as a Senior I decided to make my dad a birthday present. Dad was a politician and was very interested in the incumbent President Richard Nixon vs. South Dakota Senator George McGovern race in 1972. In a magazine, I happened to see a company that made chess sets of political races. It was really neat, little elephants and donkeys, and life-like renditions of the politicians. I got enough money together to purchase the playing pieces only, and decided to make the playing board. It was a labor of love.

Not every project can have life importance, but this one did for me. It's true that when students know that their finished work will be displayed, presented and possibly judged, whether by the class, their parents, or their community, their work takes on a different meaning. When students know their finished work will be displayed, you give them a reason to care.

LaFayette Central Schools have always had teachers who involve students in project work. Now there is a new, revitalized interest, nationwide, in Project Based Learning (PBL). Several of our faculty have attended workshops on PBL, more will be doing so in the future. The Common Core and Project Based Learning are a natural fit.

Today, I still use the skills I learned in my high school Shop Class; but, I also have had to learn to cook and sew over the years. I enjoy all three!

CURRICULUM CONVERSATIONS

Paula Cowling, Director of Curriculum and Instruction

In his book, HOW CHILDREN SUCCEED, Grit, Curiosity, and the Hidden Power of Character, Paul Tough, author and journalist, examines the non-cognitive skills that enable children, regardless of socio-economic status, to persevere both in school and in life. Tough investigates how the lack of certain undeveloped character traits of affluent students can challenge their ability to overcome adversity, as well as the link between childhood stress and life success, predominately children growing up in poverty.

Tough refers to 'the cognitive hypothesis', the belief that IQ, SAT scores, and other standardized testing directly correlates with success. Tough argues this assumption replacing it with 'the character hypothesis'—"The notion that non-cognitive skills, like persistence, self-control, curiosity, conscientiousness, grit and self-confidence are more crucial than sheer brainpower to achieving success." (A. Murphy Paul, NYTIMES, August 23, 2012).

While we may not have put a label on it, teachers have always been aware of the impact of character on student success. We have seen thousands of students with, at best, mediocre scores on standardized tests who far surpass the performance of their 'gifted' classmates. We have seen students whose parents have advanced degrees, who have been afforded every advantage money can buy, fail to achieve. We have seen students from unimaginably sad home and family circumstances overcome the adversity and become stellar students and school leaders. How can this be?

Tough sums it up in one sentence: "Character is created by encountering and overcoming failure." Affluent parents will often insulate their children from adversity—sometimes becoming those 'helicopter parents' who swoop in whenever their child encounters even minor challenges. Children in poverty may 'encounter failure', but have few resources to 'overcome' it.

As parents, teachers, coaches, mentors of any kind, it is our responsibility to prepare all of our children for adulthood. We need to recognize the power of failure while we foster the grit students need to overcome it. Tough refers to the 'social safety net' which would enable all students the opportunity to succeed.

Lastly, have you ever heard of "The Marshmallow Test"? In the 1960's and 70's, Stanford psychologist Walter Mischel conducted an experiment on self-control, one of Tough's 'have to have' character traits, aka delayed gratification. Children ages 4-6 were placed in a room consisting of a chair and a table on which was a plate with one marshmallow. The child was told that they could eat the marshmallow, but if they waited for 15 minutes, until the facilitator returned, they could get 2 marshmallows. Results? Of the 600 children, one third deferred gratification long enough to get the second marshmallow! I refer you to a very entertaining video, just Google "The Marshmallow Test" for the YouTube video. I promise, it will entertain you as we wait for our much needed Spring to arrive!

SCHOOL BOARD PRESIDENT INPUT

Hello LaFayette,

On January 30, I had the opportunity to observe and actually take part in an oral final examination for Mr. Joe Fox's SUPA Psychology Course. For those of you who are not familiar with the acronym SUPA, it stands for Syracuse University Project Advance, and it is a credit bearing course for which students who successfully complete the course receive three credits that will be accepted at Syracuse University and as transfer credits to one hundred and fifty schools. The faculty teaching the course is made up of Mr. Joe Fox and Dr. Michelle Storie, our school psychologist. The focus of the oral presentations was the 'Original Research' that the students had completed during the first semester of the school year. Via information gained from the course syllabus, each team of students developed a hypothesis that was based on research published by leading researchers in the field. The students, working in teams of 2 and 3, then developed their own process that included questionnaires. observations and quantifying formulae. They surveyed other LCS students to provide the data which enabled them to qualify their respective hypothesis. From this information the students developed a white paper based on the rubric for "Scientific Method".

Scientific Method requires a systematic approach to prove a hypothesis that includes: an Abstract (a synopsis of the findings of the study); Introduction (that states the hypothesis); the Methods used and Participants (that outlines the process and study targets); the Results (break the study down into findings by various subsets of the study targets); and, the Discussion (that relates the study findings to other studies of a similar nature).

The two teachers, the sponsoring professor from Syracuse University and I, made up the panel the students had to present to. The students performed as if there were no pressure at all on them, or at least it appeared that way to me. Each group of students utilized a "Power Point Presentation" to communicate the key elements of their research. The presentations were remarkable. Each student was well prepared, knew their role in the presentation, was familiar with the information they were presenting and delivered their part of the presentation exquisitely. Each student spoke to the audience, they maintained appropriate eye contact engaging each of the panel members to make them feel as though they were part of the presentation. When questioned, their responses were timely and accurate.

I spent 30 years in sales and marketing, 27 of which were in the Pharmaceutical business. Sales in that business happen because representatives are able to present scientific studies to the physicians and related health care providers effectively so that the providers

would understand why their products would help their patients deal with the maladies that they are faced with. While observing our students presenting their findings, I couldn't stop myself from reflecting on the many hours I had spent listening to highly educated people attempting to present within the confines of this process. I have to say, the students in Mr. Fox's class did a great job. In a world where the ability to utilize scientific method as a means of making a point is becoming more and more valuable, the students in this class are ahead of the their contemporaries.

To accentuate my point, Professor Larry Lewandowski, PhD, the sponsoring professor from Syracuse University, said that research papers, such as the ones our students had done, were very rarely found in an introductory Psychology course. The college credit being received for this course is well deserved.

Please join me in recognizing the cast in this demonstration of how education is occurring in the LaFayette Jr./Sr. High School.

Governor's Proposed Executive Budget

The Governor proposed his Executive Budget for 2014-15 on January 21st. The budget once again includes the Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA), which has been a cut to state aid for schools to help fill the states revenue shortfall. Below is the history of this cut in state aid for our district, as well as a summary of how the Governor's 2014 Executive Budget would impact us without restorations in aid from our legislators.

Background:

- 1. Since the inception of the Gap Elimination Adjustment (GEA), LaFayette Central Schools has lost \$5,731,253 in state aid over the past four years.
- 2. In 2013-14 we are receiving \$1,103,738 less in state aid than what we received in the 2009-10 school year.
- 3. To preserve academic programs, it was necessary to use fund balance to offset the loss of state aid due to the GEA. During the last four years, our fund balance has decreased by \$1,987,479 and this amount is estimated to grow to \$2,383,936 at the end of the current school year. We will not have enough fund balance to continue this practice in the future.

2014 Executive Budget:

- 1. The Gap Elimination Adjustment would decrease by \$67,684, but would still amount to a \$1,047,546 cut in state aid in 2014-15.
- 2. The total state aid increase for our District from last vear is \$1.727.
- 3. With increases in retirement costs, health insurance costs, and other contractual areas, we estimate our budget gap (revenue shortfall) to be approximately \$600,000.

Observations:

The Executive Budget includes funding for universal full day Pre-K, as well as a bond act to provide funding for schools to install high-speed broadband, purchase tablets and update technology. While universal full day Pre-K is a good initiative and improving computer technology in schools is important, we must first focus our attention upon eliminating the GEA as soon as possible. The GEA continues to cause dramatic harm to school districts across the state. If we do not see additional GEA restoration in the \$600,000 range, we will be faced with making reductions to programs.

Another observation has to do with the equity issue on how state aid funding is distributed. Below is a chart that summarizes the state aid increases (without building aid) by county for select counties in New York State.

State aid increases in the Executive Budget Proposal are significantly down from the current year. Also, downstate counties appear to be getting the lion's share of state aid increases, and even when the percentage increase is high in upstate counties, the dollar amount increases are a small fraction of what downstate counties receive. The total state aid for Suffolk County Schools is currently \$1.4 Billion. Onondaga County receives \$533 Million. One obvious reason for this disparity is the number of school districts and their enrollment. However, there is also a significant difference in wealth and property tax base as well, which may not be reflected in the equitable distribution of state aid.

We will continue to have discussions with our legislators and work towards a budget that maintains programs and keeps tax increases under the tax cap. You can help by contacting our legislators and discussing the impact of the Gap Elimination Adjustment to our schools.


SUPA Students Present Research

NCAA - ATTENTION JUNIORS

Now is the time for college-bound student-athletes in the Junior Class to register with the NCAA Eligibility Center if they plan on participating in college athletics. Early registration promotes positive planning and involvement, bypasses the last-minute rush and helps college-bound student-athletes avoid issues that may delay their academic and amateur certifications. The registration process is easy and can be done by logging on to the Eligibility Center's new Web site at www.eligibilitycenter.org.

College-bound student-athletes need to apply to the college or university they are interested in attending in their senior year. Some student-athletes think that because they are being recruited or because they have registered with the Eligibility Center, they do not need to apply for admission. Athletics eligibility and admission to a college or university are two separate processes, and both need to be completed.

as we are. The team quickly began planning and designing their game. They decided to create a 2D platform adventure game.



I hope everyone enjoyed February break with their families! By the time you read this we may be seeing signs of Spring! As many of you know, we hold Kindergarten Screening each year in the Spring here at Grimshaw. This year, it's going to be held from Monday, May 12th, through Wednesday, May 14th. You may call the main office (677-3152) to make an appointment for your child if he/she will be starting school in September. Please bring a copy of your child's immunizations with you to their appointment. Your child will also need a physical (done after 1/1/2014) before starting school. You may mail or fax (677-3154) it in or drop it off at school anytime between now and September. If your child will require medication at school, or has a medical condition I should be aware of, please contact me before school starts in the Fall to discuss it. At the time of the K-screening I will be doing a hearing screen and a very basic vision screen. The children (almost) always have a great time!

As most of you are aware, last month we had many children sick with strep throat as well as a lingering stomach virus and the usual array of URI's we see this time of year. Please continue to notify me if your child has a specific contagious disease such as strep-throat or conjunctivitis. It is very important to keep children home 24 hours after they vomit or start on antibiotics. They should also be fever-free for 24 hours, without the aid of medication, before returning to school following any illness. Please call or send a note in whenever your child is sick so they will receive a legal absence. It would be best to call me directly or e-mail me.

You may leave a message on my voice-mail the night before as well as in the morning.

All children entering 6th Grade and have turned 11 will need to have a Tdap vaccine

before starting school in September. Fifth graders will be bringing home a letter several times during the year with detailed information regarding this immunization. They should have had one in their backpack the Friday before February break. Please discuss this with your physician and plan to have it done as soon as possible after their 11th birthday. Call me if you have any questions regarding this.

We're making progress on the 2nd and 4th Grade physicals-- only 8 left! Please turn the paperwork into me as soon as they're done.

All children at Grimshaw have their vision/hearing checked each year and I will notify you if I have any concerns after you child's testing. If you have any concerns/ questions about your child's vision/hearing don't hesitate to call me.

Please keep updating emergency information and be sure to have extra clothes available at school for your child in case they need them.

As always, I appreciate your support and cooperation. Please feel free to call me with any questions or concerns.


