Science and Symphor!a— LaFayette Students Collaborate with the Symphony

This past winter, science students in Mr. Amidon's class spent time working with Symphor!a on a project connecting science with music. Symphor!a (experiencsymphoria. org) is the not-for-profit orchestra made up of professional musicians who make Central New York their home. The theme for their Young Person's concert this spring was Sound of Nature, and they were working with professors from SUNY ESF to film some video to enhance the nature-inspired pieces for their performance and create a local connection. Here is a summary of the program:

Summer: Beethoven, Symphony No.6, "Pastoral" Mvt. 1, and Mvt. 6, (Storm). Evokes the joy of the countryside in spring, and the power of a summer thunderstorm

Winter: Vivaldi, The Four Seasons, Mvt. 1 (Winter). Evocative of our Central New York winters, Vivaldi's opening movement captures the brittleness of our chilled environment as a gale ushers in the full force of winter.

Watersheds - The Great Lakes:

Smetana, Die Moldau. Die Moldau describes in music the formation of the longest river in the Czech Republic, which we'll transpose to CNY to reference the Great Lakes, Niagara Falls and the St. Lawrence Seaway.

Ocean: Debussy, La Mer, Mvt. 2 (Play the Waves). The beginning and end of the natural water cycle is the sea, celebrated in this famous piece of music.

Modern Environmental Concerns:

Charles Ives, the Ruined River, from Set No. 1 for Chamber Orchestra. We are the stewards of the planet, and this piece explores the impact of human disregard for our natural environment.

Through this collaboration, LaFayette science students were invited to work with music students from Liverpool Middle School and create some additional programming for the concert.

There were many moving pieces for this project. First and foremost, the Onondaga Lake Projects our 8th graders completed in December were presented in the lobby of the concert to be viewed by concert-goers. In addition, students and staff provided themed images that ... continued on page 8

Sponsored by F.O.C.U.S. Greater Syracuse, the event included live entertainment, a video tribute to Faithkeeper Lyons, and lots of networking with new and old friends. Also included was the participation of students and staff of the Onondaga Nation School.

Kindergarten through Grade 8 students from ONS created the centerpieces for each of the tables, which were later sold to attendees. The pieces were created in the technology and art classes taught by Jeff and Chris Capella. All were beautiful and all sold very quickly! Part of the proceeds are being returned to the school for their use.

Chief Lyon's message was a simple one: Each of us has a responsibility to take care of this planet for future generations. The tough part is sharing this message with seven billion people, and having them understand it. The Onondaga Nation is committed to this vision and has worked with Swecorp Citizenship Stockholm AB to create Plantagon. From their website, Plantagon's Business Concept states:

"We develop innovative solutions to meet the rising demand for locally grown food in cities all around the world. We minimize the use of transportation, land, energy and water – using waste products in the process but leaving no waste behind."

SCHOOL BOARD PRESIDENT INPUT

Hello LaFavette.

This month I am going to focus on "The Big Picture School". I have not yet mentioned BPS in my monthly discussions, as you all have the opportunity to visit their website and see the wonderful educational activities that take place there. I am writing about the BPS because of a challenge made recently concerning the integrity of the program and one of the program's teachers. This challenge resulted in an investigation of one of our BPS teachers by the New York State Department of Education, "Test Security and Educator Integrity Unit".

The investigator visited the LCSD and interviewed administrators, teachers, students and parents in an effort to gain enough information to justify making a charge of "cheating on a Regents Exam". (The actual claim was "inappropriate assistance") After the investigator had reviewed all of the information obtained, she made her determination. That determination was that there was "no cause shown to file charges". This finding provided the accused teacher a bit of solace and affirmation that what they are doing to help our kids learn is within the guidelines determined by the State Education Department.

During the investigation, numerous allegations of failure to follow proper procedures per the State Education Law were made by interviewees. Since these allegations were outside of the investigator's purvey, she recommended that the district further investigate these allegations to determine their validity. Subsequently, the district hired the former Executive Officer and District Superintendent of the Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES. This position is the regional extension of the State Department of Education and the Liaison for 23 public school districts in the aforementioned counties. After retiring from her position, having served nine years in this capacity and an additional 29 years in public education, Jessica Cohen became a consultant with "Castallo & Silky Educational Consultants". Jessica was recommended to us by the current BOCES Superintendent, Jody Manning.

There was concern about hiring Jessica for two reasons. The first was that Jessica had worked closely with one of the educational consultants involved with the launch of the original Big Picture School in Providence, RI. At that time she had questioned the philosophy of BPS. The second was that when LaFayette started the BPS, the students that populated the program were students that LaFayette had previously sent to BOCES (for which we paid BOCES tuition). It is one thing to bring in an outside consultant to review your programs, it's another to bring someone in that doesn't like what you are doing from the very beginning. After interviewing Jessica, we determined that she would provide us with a fair and objective analysis of the program. It was extremely important to us to know that Jessica would bring any and all deficiencies in the program to our attention.

When reviewing the allegations made, and there were many, it became apparent that the real challenge was whether or not all aspects of Education Law were being adhered to at the Big Picture School. Subsequently, the Board of Educa-

tion charged Jessica Cohen with reviewing all activities at the Big Picture School to test their compliance with Section 100 of the New York State Education Law. Section 100 defines what school districts are required to do to prepare a student to graduate with a New York State diploma.

The reviewer spent three weeks reviewing files (in some cases, going back to the beginning of the program), interviewing the BPS administrators, teachers, students, parents, members of the JR/SR high school administration, and members of the LaFavette Teachers Union. The reviewer's finding was that "The LaFayette Big Picture School provides academic credits in a way that is consistent with the regulations".

Yes, there were deficiencies and recommendations for actions to be taken to correct the deficiencies. The greatest deficiency was the interpretation of the Law pertaining to teachers teaching subjects outside of their certification. According to the law, teachers are allowed to teach one subject outside of their certification. Where BPS was out of compliance was that the district had not filed all of the necessary paper work with the state. That problem was corrected immediately after the report was given to the district. At this point, all paperwork has been filed and approved.

The Big Picture School at LaFayette follows the guidelines of the National Big Picture School that is located in 44 states and 66 schools in 4 countries. Since the LCSD has started this program. Big Picture School programs have been developed in the Oswego City School District, at the Cattaraugus-Allegany BOCES, and the Kenmore Tonawanda School District near Buffalo. After five and one half years of existence in LaFayette, the BPS school has withstood the test of time.

This is my fourth year on the board and I can't remember a time when someone in our educational community wasn't challenging the program. The first assault was on the cost to the district. The fact is that we receive state aid on students who attend school. If they don't attend, we don't get paid. LaFayette prides itself on having small classes. If these students drop out, (before the BPS we were losing 8 to 15 students per year), we don't have enough money to keep our classes small. Finding space for the program has been another challenge. The teachers and students have survived under very strenuous conditions. Now we have had reviews by the state Test Security and Educator Integrity Unit and an independent firm and their findings affirm that the program, and its participants, are following sound educational procedures that are within the rules defined by section 100 of the NYS Education Law.

I can't write this volume without lauding the successes of the program. The Big Picture School students have moved on to fulfill their major requirement for graduation. Big Picture School goes one step farther than New York State. A Big Picture requisite states that before they can graduate, students must either have been accepted into an accredited college or have obtained a job in their chosen area of study.

So here it is: Of the 27 students that have graduated, six are attending Onondaga Community College, one is attending Syracuse University, one is attending SUNY Fredonia; one is attending Earl-

ham College (with a substantial scholarship), one is attending The College of St Rose, one is attending Mohawk Valley Community College, and one is attending Monroe Community College. Twelve students are employed. There are three graduates for whom no information is currently available. Currently, there are seven students attending Big Picture that are enrolled in classes at Morrisville State College.

This program is working and is just another example of what is possible when people believe it is possible. I have been to the BPS graduation and heard the sincerity in the students' voices when they express their gratitude to the teachers at BPS. These students have been able to achieve their goals because our district has provided them with a solid educational experience.

LaFayette residents, be proud to be part of a community that has such a diverse public school system.

Budget Update

The State's budget was passed on March 31, 2014. What does that mean for the LaFayette Central School District? Our school district is anticipating an additional \$231,151 in state aid when compared to the Governor's preliminary budget that was presented in January. Although this is good news, the Gap Elimination Adjustment remains in the State budget and took back \$900,983 this vear.

The District received an administrator's retirement notice since the Governor's preliminary budget. This position will not be filled. Still, the District needed to find another \$142,000 to get us within a 2% tax levy increase.

The District has re-negotiated its printer agreements through BOCES, quoted its insurance premiums, and continues to use cooperative purchasing through BOCES to save money. However, with this being said, the District is still looking at reductions for next school year. Most reductions will be made through attrition (retirement). There will be reductions of 3.5 teacher assistant positions, 2 teacher positions, and the 1 administrative position mentioned earlier. In addition, there will also be 2 cafeteria positions reduced from the cafeteria budget. These reductions will get the district to a 1.98% tax levy increase and maintains programs for students.

The Board will review and adopt a final budget at the April 24, 2014 Board Meeting.

CURRICULUM CONVERSATIONS Director of Curriculum and Instruction

What do you want to know from your child's report card? This has been a recurring discussion point for years yet the report cards look pretty much the same: A,B C, D, F, Excellent, Satisfactory, Unsatisfactory, Needs Improvement and Plays Well With Others continue to dominate the report. But, are they LEARNING?? WHAT are they learning? Are they ON GRADE LEVEL? If they are above grade level, are they still LEARNING?? Where did they begin the year? How did they end the year? Was it 180 days of continuous improvement? And not to minimize the soft skills, are they leaders or followers? Do they participate in everything every day? Do other students sit with them at lunch? How do they interact with adults? Are they in the top 3? Are they creative? Innovative? A free thinker? The next Bill Gates or the next Nobel Peace Prize winner?

This is a complicated issue because it begins in the classroom. We have a variety of ways to assess students, from paper and pencil tests to performance exams. But for the most part, teachers have held on tight to letter and numerical grading. partly because it is easier to justify, partly because parents can relate to it, partly because colleges expect it, on a high school level it is partly because teachers can have over 100 students on their rosters, and partly because we are not entirely comfortable with alternatives.

We could create a rubric, base it on 1-4, 1 being well below proficient, 2 below proficient, 3 proficient and 4 excels, similar to State assessments. The drawback—what does that tell us? How does one measure the difference between well below proficient and below proficient? What does it take to get from proficient to excel? This is inadequate on multiple levels, and it is still a number. We could write a narrative for each student, strengths and challenges, and this would provide more information. But to what degree is teacher subjectivity imbedded in this process? Where is the data that proves what the teacher writes is accurate? Averaging on a 100 point scale appears much more objective and credible and "I have the test right here to prove it."

Relying on any test or an average of multiple tests has

inherent problems when we are working with children. In his article, "It's Time to Stop Averaging Grades", Rick Wormelli poses the following: "Consider a student taking a test on a particular topic in a particular format. The student ate breakfast, or he did not. He slept well, or he did not. His parents are divorcing, or they are not. He has a girlfriend, or he does not. He studied for this test, or he did not. He is competing in a high stakes drama/music/ sports competition later this afternoon, or he is not. Whatever the combination, all these factors conspire to create this student's specific performance on this test on this day at this time of day."

As educators and parents we are striving for growth, so what is the best way to show growth if not a test? Any assessment should provide for a re-do, an opportunity to persevere rather than to move on without mastering the content. My youngest daughter took her driving test three times before she passed it. After each of the first two, the feedback provided improved her performance. She practiced the parallel parking more, and learned the difference between a rolling stop and a stop. "As Wormelli points out, LSAT, MCAT, Praxis, SAT, bar exams, CPA exams, pilot licensure and mechanic certificate exams are high stakes, adult level, working world assessments that may be redone for full credit. If we want our students to engage more fully in our school's mission, we must give them hope and reason to persevere. Second chances may just be the way to reach our young people." (Just for the Asking by Bruce Oliver, February 2012, Volume 1X, Issue 2).

Back to the guestion, what do we want to see on a report card? We want to see our children approach a challenge and achieve success. We want to see that they master content to the best of their ability before they move on. There is no simple solution here. Project Based Learning (PBL) opens a door to explore some possibilities. In the next issue of the Greensheet, we will present more information about PBL, what it is, how we assess it, and what a PBL report card would look like. Stay tuned, this is exciting stuff!

Classes will be held July 7- Aug 5 8-9:30am Monday-Thursday.


In-car driving will be scheduled weekdays during non-in classroom time as well as on Fridays and possibly Saturdays, and may be scheduled through mid-August.

No One Can Say LaFayette **Isn't Cutting Edge!!**

LaFayette has always been on the cutting edge. Long before Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) was being pushed by politicians like George W. Bush and Barack Obama, LaFayette Schools offered the Project Lead The Way Engineering (PLTW) courses. When project-based learning (PBL) was only an intriguing idea yet to be pushed by Governor Cuomo through the Common Core Learning Standards (CCLS), LaFayette redirected its resources to start the Big Picture Program. When students taking college courses in high school was limited in most schools (again, before Governor Cuomo's "college and career ready" push), LaFayette has gradually expanded its college course offerings in Engineering, English Language Arts (ELA), History, Math, and Science through schools like The College Board (AP), Onondaga Community College (OCC), Tompkins-Cortland Community College (TC3), Syracuse University, SUNY Morrisville, and Rochester Institute of Technology (RIT). We have even had students pursue AP exams and online courses on their own accord.

Tired of all the acronyms and political hype? Me, too. My students in 11th Grade US History & Government complete a research presentation in my class, while writing up a research paper that is turned in to Lisa Morgan-Phelan in English class. The unique twist: The students must research something that is an alternative history, or simply put: a "what if?" What if George Washington had been shot in battle during the Revolution? What if the Confederates had won the Battle of Gettysburg? What if President Lincoln (or Presidents McKinley or Kennedy, for that matter) had never been assassinated? What if the events of 09/11/01 had never happened, or if the terrorists had been thwarted before completion of their horrific acts?

Why am I telling you all this? Because I'm proud to be a part of yet another cutting edge development here in La-Fayette. Apparently this idea, the brainchild of my students who simply wanted something "cool" to write about, is called "inquiry-based learning" (IBL). Yes, I'm ashamed to admit it: I've fallen into line with the political hype..... I'm teaching in acronyms.

All sarcasm aside, there was a great article in the New York Times, written by journalists Jonathan Olsen and Sarah Gross titled "Skills Practice: Alternative History as Narrative" (many thanks to Paula Cowling, Director of Curriculum, for forwarding me the article). It raves about the ability to teach history through inquiry-based alternative history research and writing.

What did I think the minute I read it? "It's just another example of why LaFayette is cutting edge."

connected with one of the musical pieces and were displayed behind the orchestra during their performance. We also put together a pre-concert trivia show based on information from our Onondaga Lake websites. Our student groups connected online with groups from Liverpool and shared their findings about the Onondaga Lake Watershed, while their partners shared their efforts to film musical pieces that they themselves composed. We were also able to attend the concert on March 5th and were invited backstage afterwards for a short reception with our new friends from Liverpool.

This incredible experience was enhanced by visits from the musicians to our school. On February 12th, a small group of musicians came and presented to our 7th and 8th grade students. They introduced musical techniques they employ to create natural sounds with their instruments, including bird songs and water moving. They also introduced the science of soundscapes, which analyze the changing background sounds from various locations. They connected this idea with

our investigation of ecosystems and the human impact on the environment, and shared the work of Bernie Krause, a leading author on this topic.

On Friday March 31st, our Symphor!a trio of Sonya Williams (violin), Kit Dodd (viola) and Allan Kolsky (clarinet) came back to LaFayette to play for our Junior High Band students in Mrs. Pethybridge's class. They once again touched upon how musical instruments can imitate the sounds of nature. Additionally, they talked about how music can tell a story. To demonstrate this, they performed "La Folia" by Corelli, which is a piece meant to imitate a clown.

Students enjoyed the experience of having live musicians visit their classroom. Cheyenne Bush was "Inspired by their sounds and how beautiful the music was." 

Dear Parents.

I hope everyone enjoyed Spring break with your children! Hopefully, you all got some fresh air and exercise and are coming back to school healthy!

There were still some cases of strep throat last month but mainly viral illnesses including colds, upset stomachs and some 5th's Disease in PK+K, but overall we had a healthier month at school.

Please remember to keep any child with a fever home for 24 hours after their temperature returns to normal without the aid of medicine and for a full day after vomiting, also.

We sometimes see a spike in cases of lice in the spring as children are sharing ballcaps, batting helmets, etc.. This would be a good time to remind your child not to share anything with other children that goes on their head/hair such as hats, hair-ties, combs and brushes. I would suggest your child use his/her own pillow and blanket if they sleep over at a friend's house. It is a good idea for girls with long hair to keep it pulled back or up at school. Please try to check your child's hair at home a couple of times per week, especially if they are scratching their heads more than normal, as the main sign of lice is an itchy scalp.

All students in Grades K-4 have now had their vision and hearing checked. You would have been notified by phone or letter if I had any concerns but please contact me if you have any questions regarding your child's vision or hearing.

All children entering PK/K/2nd and 4th grades in the fall will need to have a physical exam. Please send in a copy of the exam as soon as your child's is completed. The state is also requesting that a dental exam be done and a form be filled out by your dentist and sent into school the same years that physicals are done. The dental forms will be attached to the physical forms that will be sent home with your child at the end of the month for your convenience.

I'm planning on offering physicals this year for 6th graders entering 7th at Grimshaw as usual. However as of press time I didn't have a definite date yet. I'm aiming for the first week in June. The paperwork regarding these physicals with the date will be sent home with your child on or about May 23rd. A parent must sign and send back the form to school by the deadline in the letter if you want the exam done here.

Please send in any medicine your child may need for asthma/allergies/bee stings as this is the season for asthma, pollen, and bees.

Many children are suffering from allergies this time of year and sometimes it's hard to tell the difference between allergies and a cold. I can offer a few guidelines that may be helpful: Colds usually start with body aches, low-grade fever and scratchy throat followed by a cough and runny nose with yellow mucous. Allergies, on the other hand, do not present with a fever and body aches but with itchy, watery eyes, cough and runny nose with clear mucous. A cold usually runs its course in 3-14 days, where an allergy can last weeks or even months.

Kindergarten screening was held this month and I enjoyed meeting all your little ones that will be joining us next year. Please remember to bring or send in a copy of your child's immunization record if you didn't bring it to your child's screening. We will also need a copy of any immunizations received over the summer, as well as a copy of their Kindergarten physical done after 1/1/14.

All students entering 6th grade are required to have a Tdap vaccine before entering school in September, if they've turned 11 years old. You should have received a letter before the April Break with detailed information about this. All 6th grade students will be required to have had 2 doses of Varicella (chickenpox) to enter 6th grade, also. Please discuss this with your child's doctor so you can have this taken care of before school starts in the fall.

In addition to the 6th grade requirements, the NYS-DOH has changed or added immunization requirements at each elementary grade level. Kindergarten students will now need 2 Varicella vaccinations and only 1 MMR to enter Kindergarten. However, they will need a 2nd MMR by the age of 7. In Pre-K, plus grades 1-5, the vaccines required are the same but some children may need another dose. Please discuss these changes with your doctor. I'm putting a chart in this newsletter to help you understand these changes plus each student should have had a grade level specific letter sent home with their report card. I'm sure many of you will have questions as we go through these changes together. Feel free to call me!

Please keep updating emergency numbers right through the end of the year and thank-you for your cooperation on all of the above. As always if you have any concerns or questions please contact me.


Paige's Butterfly Run


ONS Needs Used Books
