Notice of Availability: Asbestos Management Plans

As provided under the Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act, (AHERA - EPA 40 CFR 763), LaFayette Central School District hereby makes known the steps it has undertaken to comply with AHERA and the availability of asbestos management plans.

- 1. Beginning in 1989, all district owned facilities were inspected for asbestos and management plans were developed for each building according to the requirements of AHERA. Triennial reinspections are conducted every three years. Onondaga-Cortland-Madison BOCES of Syracuse, NY completed the 2007 AHERA Triennial inspection and update to the asbestos management plans.
- 2. Periodic surveillance of asbestos containing building materials is conducted every six months.
- 3. Custodial and maintenance staff have undergone 2 hour Asbestos Awareness Training.
- 4. All response actions taken are within federal and state guidelines.

Primary Strategy - Check the Picture

Beginning readers should look at the pictures when stuck, so they can make an educated guess as to what a word may be. Language to promote this behavior: "Look at the picture".

Intermediate/Secondary Strategy - Key Word

As students read non-fiction text and textbooks, the "key word strategy" is helpful in determining the main idea of each section. Students read one to two paragraphs, then decide which three words summarize the section. Key word(s) can be jotted down on Post-it notes and adhered to the text, or written in a notebook, or on a Word or Google Doc.

Building Condition Survey

New York State Education Law requires a building condition survey (BCS) for all occupied school buildings to be conducted and submitted every five years (beginning in 2000).

The BCS is a report that is to be completed by a licensed architect, engineer or both, identifying the results of the inspection of each occupied district building. Districts are then required to submit to New York State SED a BCS for each occupied district building. The BCS must be conducted by November 15, 2015, and the data submission should be completed by January 15, 2016.

LaFayette Central Schools has been working with Ashley McGraw Architects and IPD engineering to complete and submit the BCS.

Open House was held on October 1st. Attending it provided you an opportunity to learn about course curricula and teachers' expectations. When you read this, five-week academic progress reports will have arrived in homes. Should you have questions or concerns with regard to your child's school progress, please contact our Counseling office at 677-7849.

I would like to offer a number of suggestions for how your child can improve his/her grades.

First, to be successful in any arena it is important to believe in yourself and your abilities. If we believe we can do something, or believe we cannot, we will be correct.

Second, it is important to be organized. Use the student planner provided at the start of the year. Use pocket folders for graded work and assignments related to each class. It is important to have what you need when you need it.

Third, ask for help when needed. Don't let guestions or concerns about a class go unaddressed. When uncertain, ask the teacher if there is time after school or during the day for you to meet with him/her.

Fourth, use your time effectively and efficiently. This applies to class time and study halls, as well as time at home.

Fifth, maintaining a positive attendance record is critical to achieving and maintaining classroom success. It is very hard to be successful when too much school is missed.

Parent interest in and involvement with your child's school progress is important. Your child needs to know that his/her success in the classroom is important to you. Take some time to discuss the suggestions offered above with your child and have follow up conversations from time to time.

COLLEGE NEWS

Up through November, college representatives visited the counseling center almost daily. We advised juniors and seniors to check the schedule and pick at least two presentations to attend. Students signed up by visiting the Guidance webpage and clicking on Naviance.

SENIORS

Applications should be out to 4-year colleges prior to Thanksgiving break! Seniors should have asked their teachers for recommendation letter(s), written at least one college essay (corrected by an English teacher), and completed their college applications.

All seniors began the common application in September. Most four-year colleges will accept the common application.

JUNIORS

Juniors will receive their PSAT results in late December/ early January. We will begin the college search process once we review their scores.

Additionally, the 11th grade class went on Naviance in October. This web-based planning and advising system allows parents to have access to critical information about their child's interests and post-high school plans. Juniors created a resume in 9th grade and each year they are encouraged to update it. They will begin a college search in February using this system. ONS Physical Education

It is hard to believe that school has been in session for eight weeks. During this time, our students have worked on soccer and archery (grades 6-8) skills. As curriculum for various sports is introduced to students, science and math are brought into the learning process.

In sports, the laws of science and mathematical formulas are part of an ever growing need to help participants become better faster. Equipment is continuing to change to meet the demands of a better athlete. As the class works on archery skills, angles and energy are addressed. In order to gain distance, the angle of the arrow must increase. Potential energy is converted into kinetic energy as the string is released. The draw weight also determines not only the speed of the arrow but also the distance it can go. Wheels on the bows work as pulleys to decrease the pull weight of the draw string.

Soccer is also being changed by science. Soccer balls have evolved to meet the faster pace of today's sport. Up until 2006, the soccer ball was made of 34 individual pieces put together. Now only 14 pieces are used. This change increased the speed and response of the ball upon being kicked.

Health Office News

Dear Parents.

I hope everyone enjoyed the Apple Festival last month with your children. It's always a fun weekend! October certainly flew by!

I have a few reminders for you:

All children in grades PK,K,2 and 4 as well as all new students to the district need a physical exam as soon as possible if not already done. Please send or fax (315-677-3154) them to me as soon as they're completed. There is a copy of the physical form we currently use printed in this newsletter for your convenience if needed.

All PK, K and new entrants should already have their immunizations on file in my office. If you received a notice regarding any missing immunizations please address it promptly.

All 6th graders need to show proof of having had chickenpox disease or vaccine(Varicella) as well as the Tdap vaccine. Please notify me with your child's appointment date and send in the paperwork as soon as completed.

Also, some children in grades 1-5 may need a Dtap or IPV booster this year due to the new state requirements. If your child received a notice regarding this please complete and send in the documentation as soon as possible.

We've had a fairly healthy year so far but there has been a few cases of a stomach bug (mainly in the primary grades) along with the colds/allergies we usually see this time of year. We also had a few cases of Coxsackie virus ("Hand, Foot and Mouth") in the primary grades. We are starting to see a few cases of strep-throat as well. Please notify me if your child is diagnosed with a specific illness (strep throat, conjunctivitis,etc.) so I can track "what's going around" and notify other parents if necessary.

Please call me in the morning if your child will be absent or late for any reason. I also check my e-mail each morning if you prefer to send in the information via e-mail.

We have a policy here at Grimshaw to keep children home with a fever >100 until fever free for a period of 24 hours without the aid of medication and for 24 hours after vomiting. In light of the flu season approaching as well as other viral illnesses, I can't stress enough how important it is to follow this rule-of-thumb. It really helps reduce the sharing of contagious diseases among the students.

Remind your children how important it is to wash their hands frequently!

You may want to discuss with your doctor getting your child a flu shot this year if you haven't done so already.

Please have a plan to keep your sick child at home and as always be sure your emergency numbers are up to date so we can reach you quickly if needed.

Regarding Physical Education excuses, please remember if a physician excuses your child from P.E. we must have a physician's excuse before they can participate again. Also if a child is excused from PE this restriction applies to the playground as well.

All children in PK through 2nd grade should have a spare set of play clothes at school in case of an "emergency".

If your child requires any medication at school please bring it in the original prescription container with the physician's instructions. Remember all meds need to be renewed each school year. They do not carry over from year to year. I can't administer any OTC meds without a doctor's note as well as a parents.

If you have any questions on the above or any other concerns please don't hesitate to call me. Thank you for your cooperation on all of the above - it is much appreciated.
