



We Are Busy Here at Big Picture!









I will start by asking for help! Here are some of the fields that we are looking for additional internship opportunities: culinary, baking, electrical engineering, masonry, and more. If you have any possible connections, please give us a call!

In both sections of Empirical Reasoning (ER) we have been exploring how magnets and electricity work. Students were asked to choose from a number of 'challenges' and build one. Options included a simple circuit, electromagnet, levitation (electric or magnetic), the buzz-wire game or a magnetic projectile. Students approached these challenges with widely varying skill levels so it's been fascinating to see how the products have evolved. Lenny was deliberate in leaving enough room for the students to innovate during the design and build, and some really cool things happened. Maddy easily made a circuit that lit up a small lightbulb. When he challenged her to take it farther she suggested that she could use the same circuit to provide lights in the model house she is building for her Interest Based Project (IBP). Brilliant! When Lucas A. saw that we were having a hard time cutting styrofoam board for custom parts he decided to help. He built a foam board cutter that uses a heated wire (due to resistance) to neatly slice the foam. We are excited to test it! Ryan used an old box to house a light and a switch and is trying to power it using a solar panel instead of a battery. Mya was struggling in her attempt to levitate an object using magnets (it's harder than it sounds). So we dismantled one of my levitation devices to see how it works, then refined the approach for the new build. There are many more examples of this type of problem solving. Lenny challenged Bruce to control his electromagnet with a switch. Kat and Elijah both used wood from the workshop to customize their device. And Dayton is creating a light that will be both functional and aesthetically pleasing. We are really impressed with how both groups of students are using the space and resources for this project cycle.

Applied Math students have started their financial unit. We have covered the ins and outs of banking so far. Students learned how to open and manage bank accounts through Everfi, which is an online program. They learned how to shop around for a bank; looking at bank and account features. They completed a bank account project and presented their account type to their peers. We also looked at banking safely and securely as well as filling out bank slips. As we move forward in the unit, students are learning about employment and taxes. They discovered there are many more benefits to having a job beyond the paycheck.

INTERNSHIP SPOTLIGHTS

Elijah at Grimshaw Elementary: Students were being greeted by Elijah with smiles on both sides. The moment those second graders and preschoolers entered they began running laps with delight. Over the course of the next 30 minutes, I saw Elijah demonstrate skills, instruct, assist and encourage. It was a phenomenal environment for those little ones and I am so grateful that Elijah has the opportunity to learn from and assist such skilled educators. Thank you Mrs. Meaney and Mr. LaRose.

Clearpath for Veterans: We brought a group of culinary students to Clearpath for Veterans to help with meal prep for their Friday night bonfire event. We made wing sauce, pizza sauce, prepared celery and baked three dozen cookies. It was a fun cooking experience, and we were happy to be able to help.

Exploratory: On Wednesday and Friday, Big Picture students have about 35 minutes to explore an activity of their choice. The growth of chess as an exploratory has been fun to watch. We had 10 students attend this week — and I can sense a genuine interest from the attendees. Students are excited to learn, develop their skills, and challenge their classmates! Chess is a great game to develop critical thinking skills and I've seen students even start to play during break times and other down times throughout the day. We are looking for a few more chess games. If you have one to donate we would appreciate it.
