The 8th graders at the Jr/Sr High School culminated their Harlem Renaissance module in ELA by putting on a Museum Exhibit Walk Through. Students were required to choose a theme pertaining to the unit of study, choose literature and art from the time period of the Harlem Renaissance to showcase as well as choose or make a modern day piece that portrayed the same theme. For example, Amanda Johnson selected the theme "A group of voices is stronger than one", and connected it to the current day movement of Every Child Matters. All of the students created a website or Canva poster to display their museum exhibit with a curator's statement and labels for their pieces. They practiced their presentations, received feedback and then had to present for a grade in front of their classmates. Finally, they split up into four different themed rooms, decorated the doors and their work area and shared their knowledge of the Harlem Renaissance with the community members who visited the walk through. Dear LaFayette Central School District:

Welcome to 2023! I hope this new year finds you, your family, and friends healthy and well. 2022 was a great year to be a Lancer. Here are some highlights from the past year:

- ◆ Our students and staff kept a consistent focus on academics. This focus resulted in growth on both state and local assessments. We implemented new ELA learning materials and completed an audit of our math curriculum. Having students actively engaged in learning throughout the pandemic resulted in students showing improvement in both ELA and Math.
- ◆ We have continued to address the social, emotional, and mental health needs of our students. We added student support service staff to help assist students and families. We welcomed a new social worker, and LaFayette alumni, Renee Pierce at Grimshaw Elementary. The district implemented social and emotional learning programs for students at the elementary and middle school levels.
- ◆ Our district used the infusion of federal and state funds to address a variety of academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of our students. We also used federal funds to replace furniture in most of our classrooms and purchase replacement filters for classroom air filtration units.
- ◆ We began construction on the capital project approved by voters in December 2020. We are excited to open the new library at Grimshaw Elementary in 2023, the Hall of Excellence in the Auditorium Lobby at the High School and renovate the Technology classrooms at the High School this summer.

Here are some ways that 2023 promises to be another great year for our students, families, and staff members:

- ◆ We will continue to refine instructional practices to ensure that learning is a priority. Our educators are dedicated and committed to the success of all students. Our students have so many great opportunities waiting for them after graduation. We are working with area employers to highlight careers of interest, provide internship opportunities, and partner with Onondaga Community College to offer college credit courses in high school to help save our students thousands of dollars on college expenses.
- ◆ We are committed to being fiscally responsible and presenting budgets that accurately reflect the cost of preparing our students for a bright future. Thank you to our new business official, Laurie Holtsberg, for her leadership with our new business office team. Thank you to Kim Reppi, our only returning member of the business office team, for assisting the district even in retirement, as a part-time payroll clerk.
- ◆ Our district will continue to focus on addressing the social, emotional, and mental health needs of our students. We continue to build partnerships with county agencies to support students and families so that they have additional support in facing all of life's challenges. If you or someone you know is struggling, don't hesitate to reach out to our building principals or me so that we can connect students and families with help.
- ◆ Our district is finalizing our building condition survey for submission to the New York State Office of Facilities Planning. We will use this information to help inform future capital projects to make sure that our facilities are safe, modern, and address the learning needs of our students.
- ◆ We will continue to advocate for adequate funding to address the capital needs at the Onondaga Nation School, which is a state-owned building. We are grateful to our elected officials who are finally dedicating the necessary resources to address the facility needs at ONS. Thank you to our community members who have written letters or called elected officials to advocate for adequate capital funding for the Onondaga Nation School.

I look forward to our work together throughout the coming year to make 2023 another great year to be a Lancer!

The 401 advisory demonstrated fantastic leadership and modeled the behaviors we value in our community.

There was a great deal of action on internship days and interest based projects. Coleby was running his Power Sports Internship. Ryan was leading welding and used the opportunity to weld his wind turbine. Roy has been working with Jessica to design a small brick water feature for the Peace Garden. He had planned it out and even dry-stacked the bricks. Roy was a natural. He picked up the techniques needed to lay brick quickly and worked steadily throughout the day. Kanien Tahawi worked with her mentor Chad this week and made her full size bat on the lathe! The 201s had a fantastic round of exhibitions to start the school year. Roy built his water fountain, helped put in a stone pathway, and finished his ping pong table. Lucas A researched and designed a hydrogen fuel source and intends to build a hydrogen motor next trimester. Raelyn researched women's rights throughout history. Ryan has made substantial progress on refinishing his truck and repairing any necessary body work. Maddy has learned about homes and designed a model home she is working to construct next trimester. She also hosted a fundraiser for the Salvation Army that raised \$133! Mykala researched cosmetology focusing on doing hair and the value of hair in different cultures. In addition to making the bats, Kanien Tahawi researched baseball history, the math behind how bats are made, and woodburning. Lucian made his own oil paints and worked on oil painting as well as researching the life of Frida Kahlo. Cusin completed his personalized Who Am I project. Lyra conducted a study on how to make the best patch and stencil as well as designing a crown for the Nutcracker Twist by CirqueOvation. Jadyn researched art therapy and did activities with students at her internship and Big Picture.

Those familiar with Big Picture know that exhibition week can be a stressful time for students and staff. Knowing this, we tried to create a different mindset well in advance of exhibitions. The 401s were tasked with making their presentations exciting and engaging. This intention was designed to ensure that exhibitions informed the panel, demonstrated learning and celebrated the student's growth. I firmly believe we succeeded in this collectively as an advisory. The presentations all centered around the presenters' interests and in some way linked to their STP. Faith took us through the research and production of some skin care products she is working on. She even demonstrated how to give a facial. Bug taught us about native pollinators, bee keeping and demonstrated how to make a scented beeswax candle. Jace brought us into his internship by sharing all the responsibilities he has and skills he has gained working at the Power Play Cafe' on the Nation. Lexi made traditional corn mush and shared the delicious and comforting dish with the panel. Olivia not only demonstrated how to make the PERFECT espresso, but had panelists come up and make their own (or hot chocolate). Ricky showed many of the tools that he uses at his internship, school maintenance and STP. He even demonstrated using the nail gun which got all of our attention. Phoenix made California Rolls and a modified Philadelphia Roll right before our eyes and shared with the panel as he talked through the process and skills needed. Elijah held his exhibition in the main room to accommodate a hide and seek type activity that he runs with elementary PE classes at his internship. Coleby was also in the main room so his tool cart and motocross bike could be displayed and utilized. He even had one of his students, Wes, demonstrate new skills on bike maintenance. Jacob had various cameras and lenses and he taught us the inner workings of ISO, F-stop and shutter speed. Not only were the presenters prepared and engaging, but the peer panelists were excellent. They were respectful and participatory during the presentations and gave relevant feedback at the end.

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
