BOE Petitions Now Available

On May 20, 2025, LaFayette Central School District voters will choose two district residents to serve on the LaFayette Board of Education from July 1, 2025 to June 30, 2028.

A school board member takes on one of the most important citizen responsibilities: overseeing the education of the community's youth. In these challenging times for public education, school boards are seeking individuals who find excitement and satisfaction in confronting tough challenges and working collegially to rise above them and help students in their communities succeed, according to the New York State Schools Boards Association's (NYSSBA) website.

The board of education is a uniquely American institution, according to NYSSBA. It ensures the public schools are flexible and responsive to the needs of the community. School boards are composed of volunteers within the community who dedicate their time to better public education. Board members are elected into their position, except for those in Yonkers and New York City.

With school children always their ultimate focus, school board members act officially at the board table, working with other board members to serve students and accomplish many tasks including creating a shared vision for the future of education, setting the direction of the school district to achieve the highest student performance, adopting and maintaining current policies, maintaining district facilities, establishing an annual budget, and setting a tax levy.

Board members benefit from having the following attributes:

Effective Communicator: Can describe what he or she wants and describe what others want; a good listener.

Consensus Builder: Capable of working toward decisions that all can support and willing to compromise to achieve goals.

Community Participant: Enjoys meeting a variety of people, can identify the community's key communicators and reaches out to the community.

Decision Maker: Is comfortable making decisions and can support group decision-making.

Information Processor: Can organize priorities and schedules to handle large amounts of verbal and written information.

Leader: Willing to take risks, be supportive of board colleagues, district staff and community

Team Player: Helps promote the board's vision and goals.

elected to a three-year term. Board members are not financially compensated. According to New York State Public Officers Law § 3 and New York State Education Law § 2102 candidates for the school board must meet the following qualifications:

- 1. Must be able to read and write:
- 2. Must be a qualified district voter;
- 3. Must be, and have been, a district resident for at least one year prior to the election, but need not be a taxpayer;
- 4. May be the only member of his/her household on the board;
- 5. May not be an employee of the board;
- 6. May not simultaneously hold another public office, which has been determined by law, court ruling, or Commissioner's decision to be incompatible.

In order to have their name placed on the ballot, each interested resident must collect 25 signatures from qualified school district voters. The signatures must be on nominating petitions that must be filed by 4:30 p.m. on April 21, 2025, in the District Clerk's office, 5955 Route 20, LaFayette.

Mental Health Awareness and Connection: A Workshop with Christa

One of the standout moments came on Monday, November 28th, when Christa from Community Contact Services led an impactful workshop titled "It's Real: Teens and Mental Health." They provided us with an in-depth look at the world of electrical work, from the essential skills required to the diverse career opportunities in the field. The hands-on activity where students were challenged to design a circuit with light switches was an exciting opportunity to put theory into practice. It was clear that many students found the experience both engaging and inspiring, and several expressed an interest in learning more about apprenticeship programs in the electrical trade.

Exhibition Week: A Celebration of Creativity and Growth

As Exhibition Week unfolded, it was evident that our students had been hard at work. We achieved an impressive 92%

on-time exhibition rate, and the energy in the school was palpable. Parents and community members were welcomed into the space, where they had the chance to view the incredible projects our students had been working on. For many, it was a first opportunity to showcase their progress and achievements.

The 101s held their inaugural exhibitions, presenting their "Who Am I?" projects with impressive poise, thanks to Carolyn Bice's public speaking minilesson. Our older students in the 201s and 301s also demonstrated significant growth, transitioning into their new learning plans with confidence. The 401s reported on the progress of their Senior Thesis Projects, sharing the innovative work they've been doing.

Several students had standout moments during their exhibitions. Céra shared her almost-completed shelf/bench, proudly detailing the tools and techniques she used to bring her vision to life. Roy presented his ambitious dog house project, overcoming challenges with determination, while Colton demonstrated his skill on the lathe, creating a miniature baseball bat. Even though he hadn't finished by the time of his exhibition, he used this as an opportunity to engage his panel, walking them through the process.

In addition, Kyla led the creation of a Lego League game table for the Grimshaw Robotics Club, a project that showcased her leadership and planning skills. The table was a hit with the robotics students, and Kyla's attention to detail in ensuring easy transportation and storage made the project all the more impressive.



Exploring Nature and Science

In Empirical Reasoning (ER), students have been diving deep into their second research module, examining the goldenrod stems for parasitic activity. This hands-on exploration is providing valuable data that will be used to draw conclusions about the ecosystems we're studying. Students are eagerly looking forward to what they will discover next.

We also took a group of students to plant our garlic crop at the Apple Festival Grounds, a rite of passage for our 101s. While some students are already engaged in internships or running the coffee shop, we are excited to bring together a mixed-level group to plant the crop. This will be a perfect opportunity for the older students to pass on their knowledge to the younger ones.



Senior Thesis Projects: A Reflection of Passion and Ambition

Our 401s continue to make significant strides in their Senior Thesis Projects (STPs). Several students have secured dates, locations, and guest speakers for their projects. For example, Lucian is organizing a multi-school GSA Summit, Ryan is assessing small engines for his repair drive, and Gabby is making beautiful handmade items like bracelets, beaded rings, and wooden dolls to sell at craft fairs in support of Every Child Matters. It's inspiring to see how these projects are not only helping students grow in their chosen fields but are also making meaningful contributions to the community.
