Dear Families and Staff Members:



Did You Know?

An estimated 50,000 motor vehicles illegally pass NYS school buses everyday.
THE LAW SAYS: It is illegal - and very dangerous - to pass a stopped school bus when the large red lights located on top of the bus are flashing. Flashing lights mean the bus is picking up or discharging students. You must stop whether you are approaching the school bus from the front or overtaking it from the rear. You must always stop for flashing red lights, even on divided and multilane highways and on school grounds.

The first-time fine for illegally passing a school bus is a \$250 to \$400 fine, 5 points on your license, and/or possibly 30 days in jail. Worse yet, the memory of hitting or killing a child may be one you carry for the rest of your life.

Spring at Big Picture



It has been an amazing few weeks sharing our school, our stories and our students with visitors from across New York State. We were honored to be asked to host the New York Internship Pathways spring convening again. We hosted 25 or so visitors for two days. The staff took the visitors into the community to visit our students at their internship sites and then the visitors were able to meet with a panel of our students to discuss the development of project work. Our guests learned what our students think about their internships, their projects, how they view the work and assessment. On the second day of the convening, guests were able to visit advisories and workshops and had more face time with our kids. The feedback was very positive and I was so proud of our students. They showed so much pride in their work. We were also visited by New York State Education Department Deputy Commissioner Angelique Johnson-Dingle, Assistant Commissioner David Frank, Assistant Commissioner Santosha Oliver, Diane Wynne from NYSED EI Office, Clarissa Jacobs-Roraback from NYSED Office of Indigenous Education and Colleen Viggiano, OCM BOCES Assistant Superintendent. We were able to share the success of Big Picture Learning, its impact on our students, our district and our community. We had the amazing opportunity to discuss what New York State policies interfere with the work that we are doing and what we want to do. It was incredible to share my thoughts on what our school could do and focus on if the measurements of success were adjusted. It felt almost unreal to sit at the table with policy makers and share what we as a school would do if the measurement tool was not a Regents Exam or a Carnegie Credit. It was an honor to have our students share with the State Education Department members on what they experience by attending the LaFayette Big Picture School.

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Student and Project Highlights:



In the garden, Evan volunteered his time to do some weeding, watering, and planting. He exhibited great initiative and it was awesome to see him get involved! With the help of Evan, Lyra, and Walt, we planted about 25 total plants of tomatoes, peppers, and eggplants. We also planted some corn seeds, cucumber seeds, and butternut squash seeds. Braxtin, Ollie, Lucas B, and Evan also put down a biodegradable weed barrier and covered the vegetable plot with compost. While a lot of work and effort, it'll pay great dividends over the growing season. The space is really coming along and we're excited to offer a summer enrichment course about gardening and horticulture this summer.



Lexi designed an STP intended to provide a luncheon for elders where the food is predominately traditional. She researched native corn and traditional methods of preparation. She practiced preparing the meals throughout the year and gathered expertise from members of our school and the Onondaga Nation community. With help from Meg, Shauna, Rhea, Walt, and the culinary crew, Lexi conducted her event last week offering a menu of wild leek soup, roasted venison, roasted root vegetables, applesauce, succotash, cornbread and strawberry drink. The traditional cornbread was especially difficult to make due to the processing of the corn, but Kat took on the challenge and did an amazing job. We are hoping to do more of these luncheons in the future. It was a true team effort by the advisors and culinary students! The food was delicious and there were many smiles and connections made.

Lucas A. and Mya are interning at United Radio. They are working on taking apart various pieces of equipment, fixing and replacing parts, soldering, and reassembling the pieces of equipment to a repaired condition. Their mentors spoke highly of both Lucas's

and Mya's work ethic, kindness, and attention to detail. They were given a new opportunity to meet and work with a gentleman who uses a 3D printer to design and create items that promote efficiency and accuracy. After learning about the 3D printer, they worked together to assemble boards with all of their components. Kanieñ Tahawi is learning how to sew her own ribbon skirt for her exhibition. She combined her interest in photography with her project. She asked Shawna if she would be willing to bring her ribbon skirts in so she could use them for

first photo shoot. It was impressive to see and hear her naturally direct her models to places and positions with ease. This was a big transition from her traditional photos of nature, but she may have a knack for portraits. The results are beautiful, Kanieñ Tahawi has several shots and a variety of perspectives to include in her exhibition. Ribbon skirts are pictured on the back page.

Jade is interested in raising chickens, so she bought chicks, and this week she stained and built a chicken coop for them. It was a fun project, and the chickens are very happy with their new living situation. We are especially happy to see that Jade is not only interested in culinary, but also in self-sustainability. Hopefully we will have a good source of eggs for next year.

Billy is interested in graphic design and custom t-shirt making, and we are impressed with the progress he has been making. His goal is to make custom shirts for students, and he is starting with the 101 class. He made a design based on feedback from others, learned photoshop skills, learned vinyl printing skills and has actively been making shirts to a high standard. We are very excited to see his exhibition next week.
