Message from the SUPERINTENDENT

The month of February flew by. We had an exciting conclusion to our winter sports season with several teams and athletes qualifying for sectionals. Our men's and women's varsity basketball

teams had many outstanding games this season. It was exciting to see both basketball teams work together on both offense and defense. Congratulations to all of our winter athletes and coaches on a great season. Thank you to our fans for coming out to support our teams.

The high school musical was held on Friday March 8, 2019 at 7:00 PM. Our students performed "The Little Mermaid". Our students worked very hard and the performance was amazing.

During the month of March, we will finalize our school district budget for 2019-2020. Thank you to community member Lisa Kurtz-Shenandoah, staff member Eliza Bailey, and our administrators and supervisors for their input during our community budget meetings. We will have budget updates at both board meetings during the month of March and we are looking forward to the public voting on our proposed expenditure plan on May 21, 2019 from 1:00-9:00 PM at the Jr/Sr High. Regular updates will be posted on the budget webpage located on our website.

Our proposed 2019-2020 school district budget includes all of our current opportunities for students including access to many college credit courses, great programs in the fine and performing arts, and engineering/robotics courses. For 2019-20, we are proposing the following enhancements for our students; additional sections at the elementary level to keep class sizes low and additional hours for school security staff. We now have the equivalent of one full-time security guard at each of our schools. Our proposed spending plan will provide all of these great opportunities for students while keeping our school property tax rate one of the lowest in Onondaga County while remaining compliant with the property tax cap limit.

One of the challenges with our budget process is the minimal increases that we have been seeing from New York

State when it comes to school aid. LaFayette CSD board members and I have been meeting with our state representatives to share with them the success of our students and to inform them of our needs. Our school district relies on 60% of our revenues from state sources. The governor's executive budget proposal provided a meager 1.3% increase in foundation aid for LaFayette. Last year, LaFayette received a 3% increase in funding and we planned on receiving at least a 2.5% increase each year from New York State. If you have the opportunity, please consider reaching out to our state representatives to let them know that we appreciate and need their continued support for students in LaFayette. Our state representatives are: Assembly Members Gary Finch and Pamela Hunter, and State Senators Rachel May and Bob Antonacci.

Thank you to our students, staff, and school community for your continued support!

We have used all six of our emergency closing days this school year. We are looking to recover some of the lost instructional time due to snow days and we will postpone our staff development day to minimize disruptions to instructional time.

Health Office News



"In the spring, I have counted 136 different kinds of weather inside of 24 hours." - Mark Twain

Mr. Twain must have been in CNY when he witnessed this phenomenon because I think we can all relate. Hopefully, with spring on the horizon, we can finally put an end to the illnesses that have plaqued us this winter. Please continue to notify us if your child is ill and will miss school, especially if your child has a confirmed case of the flu, strep, or conjunctivitis. It is very important to keep children home 24 hours after they vomit or start taking antibiotics. They should also be fever free for 24 hours, without the aid of medication, following any illness before returning to school. Please provide documentation from the medical provider for any injury your child sustains so that we may provide the necessary care during the school day. Certain injuries may require modifications to the student's classroom assignments, as well as refraining from physical activity.

It's never too early to plan for next school year, and with that in mind, please be aware of any immunizations your child will require. State law requires that all students have the necessary immunizations within 14 days of the start of the school year, or they will not be permitted to continue the school year. All children who are entering 6th grade and have turned 11 will need to have a Tdap vaccine before starting school in September. For those students entering 7th grade, one dose

of meningococcal vaccine is required. All 8th and 9th grade students who have not received the vaccination are required to have a dose as well. Students in 12th grade are required to have two doses of meningococcal vaccine, or one dose if the first dose is administered at 16 years of age or older. Letters will be sent home detailing all immunization requirements.

ONS pre-K and kindergarten screenings are being conducted June 4th, 5th, and 6th. Grimshaw pre-K and kindergarten screenings are being conducted May 28th, 29th, and 30th. Please call to make an appointment if your child will be starting school in September.

Vision screening will again be sponsored by the Lion's club, through a program called, "Lion's See." Check out their website at www.lionsseeny.org for more information. You will receive the results of the screening if it is recommended your child be seen by an eye care professional.

Sports physicals are conducted at the high school three times a year, usually in October, March, and June. These are intended for those students playing a sport, who haven't had a physical exam within the last year. Please provide a copy of your child's physical exam each time they receive it, otherwise it will not be on file.


