Fantastic Beginning for the Big Picture School



Big Picture has had a great start to the school year. The staff works hard every year to design our first few days as a perfect model of how we "do school." We are intentional with our practices and our conversations in order to set the stage for the rest of the school year.

On the first day, the staff prepares a large breakfast for our students. We spend the first hour, eating and getting to know each other. We then take a group photo outside. Students spend the rest of the day as an Advisory group. They reconnected with each other, set goals, and connected with other advisors and staff. The activities were low risk and required group work and individual participation. These activities set the stage for our time and expectations for Advisory, as well as taking individual responsibility.

On our second day, students were assigned to mixed level groups to complete our first Design Challenge. The design challenge is set up so there is no one right way to complete the task with the main goal being teamwork.



In our debrief of the exercise, students shared that it was hard to start working in groups when they did not know each other well. Our second challenge of the day was to create the longest paper link chain using only 10 pieces of paper and tape. Students were in the same groups. This challenge went much smoother and faster. In the debrief, students concluded that because they had learned to work with their group members in the morning, they were better able to complete the task in the afternoon. PERFECT! This is exactly why we did this. We need to build relationships and work together to find success!

Message from the SUPERINTENDENT



During the September 13, 2018 Board of Education Meeting, our capital project team presented a newly proposed project which will focus on improving the safety and security of our school campuses. A capital referendum will be held on Thursday, December 13, 2018 for consideration by the public. Voting will take place at the LaFayette Jr/Sr High School from 1:00 PM - 9:00 PM. This new capital project will provide the following improvements at all school buildings:

- Additional Security Cameras
- Campus Notification System
- Door Replacements
- Window Hardening
- Compartmentalization of Buildings Using Corridor Door Lock-Downs
- · Masonry Repointing and Stair Replacement

The total cost of these enhancements comes to \$3.1 million dollars; however, this project is eligible for building aid through the New York State Education Department. We can make these enhancements to our campus at no additional cost to our local community.

LaFayette has been very progressive in making security improvements. The district recently contracted with Armoured One, a school security firm, to conduct a security audit of our school campuses. While the audit revealed that we have several things in place to protect guests on our campus, there is still more work to be done. This new capital project includes items from the audit needed to help improve the security of our schools.

The newly proposed Campus Notification System will improve communication for building announcements and during emergency events. The new notification system can be controlled remotely and can send out announcements through audio, text message, or email.

We have also requested the same improvements to be made at the Onondaga Nation School, which is a state-owned building. Improvements to the Onondaga Nation School are made through allocations in the New York State budget process and subject to approval by the New York State Education Department Office of Facilities Management. NYSED has prioritized approval for building enhancements at ONS related to improving the health and safety of the facility.

We will be keeping the public informed through our website, articles in the Green Sheet, and public presentations. We look forward to hearing your feedback on these improvements to our school facilities. Message from the Commissioner

I am always excited and energized by the start of another school year. I hope this school year is off to a smooth start for you and your children.

Today, the New York State Education Department (NYSED) proposed changes to regulations to implement the federal Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). The proposed changes reflect stakeholder input and public feedback and will be presented to the Board of Regents at its meeting on Monday, September 17. If the Board acts on the proposed changes at its meeting on Monday, the public comment period on the proposed changes will begin October 3.

Paramount to any good public policy is engagement with stakeholders. Following a thoughtful and productive discussion and considering the comments received, I am confident these changes will benefit students across the state. ESSA fosters educational equity by providing support to districts and schools as they work to ensure that every student succeeds. When paired with the work we have already put in, these amendments will move us even closer to meeting that goal.

Teachers are the number one in-school factor for student success, and I have made lifting up the teaching profession a priority. To that end, NYSED awarded \$2 million annually in grants to 25 recipients to implement Mentor Teacher Internship Programs (MTIP). These programs enable experienced teachers in a district or BOCES to provide guidance and support to beginning teachers in their first or second year of teaching. The mentor and new teacher relationship will engage teachers in a productive experience designed to enhance educators' skills and increase the likelihood of their remaining in the teaching profession. Funding for this initiative was approved by the Governor and Legislature in the 2017-2018 State budget. NYSED will award the grants beginning in the 2018-19 school year.

Teaching, more so than any other profession, determines our future--and we will not rest until we get it exactly right. This program helps prepare and support our teachers, who then take that strong foundation into the classroom, and are able to put their students on the road to success.

Student health and safety are also of the highest importance. If you have a child who relies on epinephrine, please reach out to your child's school to ensure they have all the information they need. Guidance was issued to health care, school health, and child day care providers outlining steps that families can take to ensure they have access to epinephrine products.

It's so important that there is open, effective communication about medical policies and protocols in our school communities. When every second counts, parents, students, administrators, and school health officials all need to know who is trained to administer epinephrine and where this life-saving medicine is stocked and stored. Please be sure you know the protocols at your child's school.

Finally, September is National Campus Safety Awareness Month, and NYSED and the Board of Regents will continue to underscore the importance of standing by our students and defending their rights. Regents Chancellor Betty A. Rosa and I recently released a statement rejecting any changes by the U.S. Department of Education on sexual misconduct on college and university campuses. This is the latest in a line of misguided and ill-conceived proposals by USDE.

New York has one of the strongest laws in the nation protecting students from sexual assault. The New York State Office of Campus Safety provides guidance to enhance the safety of college campuses. If you have a college student, I encourage you to become familiar with the guidance and resources.

I hope the new school year is off to a great start. Have a wonderful year.

LaFayette Central Schools Water Reporting

As required by County & State regulations, the water testing of District potable wells were conducted on August 8, 2018. Don Warnow, Safety Officer of OCM BOCES, Jim Kesler & Ron Cooper of LaFayette Schools collected the samples and they were delivered to Microbac labs for analysis.

Reports indicate that all water supplies are of a sanitary quality for all locations. However, C.Grant Grimshaw schools water supplies tested higher than 270 mgl of sodium. Although there is not a set maximum level for sodium, it is recommended that people on moderately restricted sodium diets should be made aware.

Therefore, for those that may be on a moderately restricted sodium diet, it is recommended that caution be used when consuming water from the C.Grant Grimshaw school as well as the District offices.

We had an amazing start to the 2018-2019 school year. At this point, we have had all of our class meetings and selected our class officers for the upcoming school year. We had a very successful 9th grade orientation at Orenda Springs. Students learned about the importance of teamwork and collaboration by participating in a variety of challenges. In addition, we began our Liberty Partnership Program with a kickoff in the high school auditorium. The Liberty Partnership Program is an agreement

through Onondaga Community College that provides our students with additional academic support as well as a variety of college and career opportunities. During the kickoff, the instructors of the program talked about the upcoming afterschool support and provide each student with a hooded sweatshirt from Onondaga Community College. Academically, we are beginning to see a payoff from all of the hard work our teachers put in over the summer. A critical part of any child's success is open lines of communication between our parents/guardians and the school. We encourage you to continually monitor your child's academic success through the use of our parent portal. The parent portal gives you real-time access to your child's grades as well as other information. If you currently do not have access to the parent portal, please contact the counseling office at 315-677-7849 to get your account activated.

Health Office News

LaFayette is pleased to welcome Ashley Brown as the new school nurse at Grimshaw. Please stop in and say hello, if you have not already done so!

We have a few reminders to start off the new school year: all students in Pre-K, K, 1st, 3rd, 5th, 7th, 9th, and 11th grades, as well as all new students, will need to have a physical on file at the health office. If you have not done so already, please do so as soon as possible or notify me of the date your child's physical is scheduled for and send it in when done. Those students requesting working papers, or participating in a sport, will also have to have a physical on file.

A new school health examination form went into effect July 1st. The previous form will be accepted for this school year. However, starting next school year, only the new form will be accepted. Please check with your pediatrician to be sure they are ready to implement these changes.

All new students, including Pre-K and K, should have a copy of their immunizations on file at school before school starts. Also, all students in 6th grade who are 11 years old should have sent in documentation of receiving their Tdap vaccination. One dose of the meningococcal vaccine is required for students entering 7th grade, with a catch-up dose in 8th or 9th grade if the student didn't get it in 7th grade. Two doses of the meningococcal vaccine are required for 12th grade, unless the first dose was given after 16 years of age. Please get this information to us as soon as possible, if you haven't already done so. Please be aware that for those without insurance, the Onondaga County Health Department offers all vaccines needed for school entrance.

If your child needs any medication at school, please remember it needs to be renewed each school year. We do require the medicine to be in the original container with a prescription label or note from the doctor and ask that you bring the medicine to school. It is especially important to have any emergency meds your child may need, such as an epi-pen for a severe allergic reaction.

We would strongly suggest all children in grades Pre-K through 3rd have a spare set of clothes in their lockers/cubbies in case they need them.

Please notify us if your child is absent for any reason during the year so we can keep their attendance records correct. The only legal absences are for sickness, doctor appointments, road tests, impassable roads, religious observance, court appearance, college visit, or sickness or death in the family.

If your child is excused from gym class by a doctor they will need a doctor's note to return to gym.

If you have any questions on any of the above, or any other concerns, please don't hesitate to call us. We hope your child has a great school year!

Letter to Parents for School Meal Programs

Dear Parent/Guardian:

Children need healthy meals to learn. LaFayette CSD offers healthy meals every school day. Breakfast costs \$1.25; lunch costs PK-6 \$2.55, 7-12 \$2.65. Your children may qualify for free meals or for reduced price meals. Reduced price is \$0.25 for breakfast and \$0.25 for lunch.

- 1. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT AN APPLICATION FOR EACH CHILD? No. Complete the application to apply for free or reduced price meals. *Use one Free and Reduced Price School Meals Application for all students in your household.* We cannot approve an application that is not complete, so be sure to fill out all required information. Return the completed application to your students school.
- 2. WHO CAN GET FREE MEALS? All children in households receiving benefits from SNAP, the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations or TANF, can get free meals regardless of your income. Categorical eligibility for free meal benefits is extended to all children in a household when the application lists an Assistance Program's case number for any household member. Also, your children can get free meals if your household's gross income is within the free limits on the Federal Income Eligibility Guidelines. Households with children who are categorically eligible through an Other Source Categorically Eligible designation, as defined by law, may be eligible for free benefits and should contact the SFA for assistance in receiving benefits.
- 3. CAN FOSTER CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, foster children that are under the legal responsibility of a foster care agency or court, are eligible for free meals. Any foster child in the household is eligible for free meals regardless of income. Foster children may also be included as a member of the foster family if the foster family chooses to also apply for benefits for other children. If non-foster children in a foster family are not eligible for free or reduced price meal benefits, an eligible foster child will still receive free benefits.
- 4. CAN HOMELESS, RUNAWAY, AND MIGRANT CHILDREN GET FREE MEALS? Yes, children who meet the definition of homeless, runaway, or migrant qualify for free meals. If you haven't been told your children will get free meals, please call or e-mail your student's building Principal to see if they qualify.
- 5. WHO CAN GET REDUCED PRICE MEALS? Your children can get low cost meals if your household income is within the reduced price limits on the Federal Eligibility Income Chart, shown on this application.
- 6. SHOULD I FILL OUT AN APPLICATION IF I RECEIVED A LETTER THIS SCHOOL YEAR SAYING MY CHILDREN ARE APPROVED FOR FREE MEALS? Please read the letter you got carefully and follow the instructions. Call the school at (315)677-9510 if you have guestions.
- 7. MY CHILD'S APPLICATION WAS APPROVED LAST YEAR. DO I NEED TO FILL OUT ANOTHER ONE? Yes. Your child's application is only good for that school year and for the first 30 operating days of this school year. You must send in a new application unless the school told you that your child is eligible for the new school year.
- 8. I GET WIC. CAN MY CHILD(REN) GET FREE MEALS? Children in households participating in WIC <u>may</u> be eligible for free or reduced price meals. Please fill out a FREE/REDUCED PRICE MEAL application.
- 9. WILL THE INFORMATION I GIVE BE CHECKED? Yes and we may also ask you to send written proof.
- 10. IF I DON'T QUALIFY NOW, MAY I APPLY LATER? Yes, you may apply at any time during the school year. For example, children with a parent or guardian who becomes unemployed may become eligible for free and reduced price meals if the household income drops below the income limit.

You must include yourself and all children living with you. If you live with other people who are economically independent (for example, people who you do not support, who do not share income with you or your children, and who pay a pro-rated share of expenses), do not include them.

How to Apply: To get free or reduced price meals for your children carefully complete one application following the instructions for your household and return it to the designated office listed on the application. If you now receive SNAP, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) for any children, or participate in the Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR), the application must include the children's names, the household SNAP, TANF or FDPIR case number and the signature of an adult household member. All children should be listed on the same application.
