We are pleased to announce that our proposed 2023-2024 school district budget is one that maximizes school district tax dollars for the benefit of our students. Here are a few examples of your past tax dollars at work:

- 97% graduation for June 2022 graduates from the LaFayette Jr/Sr High and Big Picture (92% district-wide graduation rate for students in all programs).
- ♦ Several students in grades 8-12 received awards from the CNY Scholastic Arts Awards
- ◆ The High School Musical in March was a stellar performance that showcased the talent of our students
- ◆ Lancer fans had the chance to experience several great performances by our student athletes and coaches
- ◆ Increased participation in career and technical education courses at OCM BOCES with over 20 juniors and seniors pursuing CTE training
- ◆ Personalized learning and internships for students enrolled at the Big Picture School

STAR School Tax Exemption

You may be eligible for the following tax exemptions resulting in a reduction of your 2023/24 school tax bill. Contact your Town Assessor's office for more information. Estimates are based on a home assessed at \$100,000.

Basic Exemption: \$529 Est. Tax Savings

- · Available for owner-occupied, primary residences;
- The income limit for the Basic STAR credit is \$500,000 (the income limit for the Basic STAR exemption is \$250,000);
- · Based on the first \$30,000 of the full value of a home

Enhanced Senior Exemption: \$1,202 Est. Tax Savings

- Available on primary residence for 65+ years of age
- · Household income of less than \$93,200 per year
- All Enhanced STAR recipients are required to participate in the Enhanced STAR Income Verification Program (IVP).
 In the first year that you apply for the Enhanced STAR exemption, your assessor will verify your eligibility based on the income information you provide. In the following years, NYS will verify your income eligibility. You will not need to reapply for the exemption or provide copies of your tax returns to your local assessor

Program Component

This budget category is the largest of the three budget components, representing 69.9% of the total components. It includes all expenditures directly related to the student educational program. Also included are student services such as health, guidance, social worker, psychologist, library, co-curricular, athletics, transportation, census and the employee benefits for those programs.

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BIG PICTURE SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS

- ◆ Internship opportunities at Big Picture are back to pre-pandemic levels and our students are learning alongside adult mentors.
- We participated in the School Exchange again. Students from Big Picture, Henninger and Liverpool met to dialogue about culture and race. Three Big Picture students took the role of peer facilitator in the exchange.
- ◆ Big Picture continues to partner with OCC in the Early College Program. Several of our students participated, earning college credits in Biology, Photography, ASL, Drawing and Hospitality Management.
- Our Sugar Shack produced several bottles of syrup this spring and our community garden produced beautiful flowers this summer and fall. We are tending to the garden now in preparation for another successful year.



Administrative Component

As defined by NYS Education Department, this budget category includes monies for the majority of the instruction support services in the District. It is comprised of a general support section, an instructional supervision section and a section for employee benefits for personnel in associated areas. This component represents 8.6% of the components. The categories marked with * and ** represent 78% and 65%, respectively, of the amount needed to operate these services; the balance is charged to the State for administering and maintaining financial records for the Onondaga Nation School.

2023/2024 Propositions

Proposition I - Budget

Shall the proposed budget of \$23,721,781 for the LaFayette Central School District as recommended by the Board of Education for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2023, be adopted and shall the Board of Education be authorized to levy the necessary taxes therefore.

Proposition II - Transportation

Shall the Board of Education be authorized to purchase two (2) replacement student transportation vehicles, including related furnishings and equipment incidental thereto, expend, therefore a total sum not to exceed \$334,000 which is estimated to be the total maximum cost thereof, and pay for such vehicles by the levy of a tax which is hereby voted and approved in the amount of \$334,000 which shall be levied and collected in annual installments in such years and in such amounts as may be determined by the Board of Education and in anticipation of the collection of such tax, bonds, and notes of the District are hereby authorized to be issued at one time, or from time to time, in the principal amount not to exceed \$334,000, and a tax is hereby voted to pay the interest on said obligations when due.

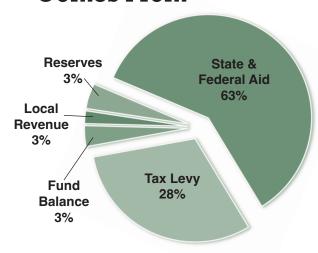
Capital Outlay

Capital outlay projects are currently allowed for just one building each year up to \$100,000. All of the proper paperwork must be filed with the State Education Department in advance and be approved before the work can be done. The advantage is that the aid is received in full for this project in the following year, whereas with all other capital projects, the project aid is spread out over 15, 20 or 30 years depending upon the type of construction involved.

This year's capital outlay project will consist of converting the remainder of the lighting at the Jr/Sr High School to LED. This will provide cost savings as well as enhancing the lighting within the school. This project will complete the LED lighting conversion at the Jr/Sr High School.
