
### TGIF from Greg

Over the past month, the 301s have been expanding their world view. They have been exploring different countries, their governments, and lifestyles as a means to meet their participation in government requirements. In the beginning of the year, we looked at North Korea under Kim Jong-un as an authoritarian government system. Since then, we looked at the United Kingdom under Queen Elizabeth II as a constitutional monarchy, Idriss Deby's rule over Chad as a dictatorship, and Nicolas Maduro's rule over Venezuela as a totalitarian system of government. The students have all been interested to learn about the government, laws, economy/jobs, education system, and the food, clothing, and housing in each country. They have been surprised to see what life looks like for people outside of America, to learn about their social norms, and to imagine what their life would be like if they lived there. Before the end of the year, we will look at 6 other government systems in 6 different countries around the world.
