

As soon as we came back to school, we jumped right into regents review zone. The 301s have been working on vocabulary terms frequently used on tests. We are using the English regents and newsELA to go over the author's purpose,

reading styles, and annotating skills. Monday we spend reviewing US History, Wednesday we reviewed Algebra, and Friday we reviewed graphing in the Living Environments regents. The 301s will continue this structure and review additional skills into next week to prepare for the regents which are the following week.

Algebra students taking the January regents are reviewing key concepts in class, such as solving functions, the quadratic formula, and systems of equations. I am also offering additional review opportunities during exploratory on Wednesdays and Fridays. So far, we have covered graphing functions and inequalities along with graphing concepts in exploratory. The students were all working hard this week, they are taking reviewing for their exams seriously.

After reflecting on the new year, one thing we added to the 301 advisory was mindfulness activities to promote mental health. On Monday, we welcomed our advisory back with our own 301 mini-meeting and we talked about having the freedom to choose. Wednesday we listened to music for 5 minutes as we mentally cleaned out our thoughts, letting out the bad and letting in the good. On Friday we colored postcards with inspirational quotes on them. We perform better when we have good mental health. I have already seen some growth and we will continue these activities throughout the trimester.
