This year I am developing my instruction to be more engaging. As I venture down this path, I have shared with all of my students my golden rule: "The more you participate, the more you learn." Thus far, the students have been on board with this and I have experienced great participation across my classes.

In 301 advisory we are reading There There by Tommy Orange. Tommy Orange is visiting our area in November and we have the opportunity to see him talk about his book! Before we began the book, I provided the students with background information on Alcatraz and the year 1969. Only 50 years ago did we land on the moon for the first time! I had the students work in small groups and read to each other, Taking Back the Rock by David Stack. Through these activities, the students have begun to see historical events through a Native perspective. They have started to understand how Native American lives were impacted by the adversities they faced. As we dived into the book this week, the students

were reading aloud in class, interpreting quotes from the author, and building vocabulary. As we continue through the book this week, we will work on characterization. My aim for the students, is to build upon our work on social norms from last year, to understand how society impacts a culture, and to show empathy for all perspectives.

We ended the week with our overnight camping trip. This is the third camping
