
TGIF from David

INSTEAD I was enamored with the brutal honesty, and ultimate reconciliation that occurred with very little interaction from me-I simply sat at the table with them. It gave me real hope that If I can get the 101s on board with communicating about the bad behaviors with each other, the behaviors will change and then I can focus on giving them only POSTIVE feedback for good behaviors!

This week the 101s were finally able to finish sewing their pillows. It was a challenge for some especially when I refused to 'thread their needle' or make a knot for them. I and told them they had to show some grit and keep trying that they would feel



accomplished! It was so thrilling when they would yell: "I did it!" with a big grin and give me a high five! I asked how they felt at that moment and they were SO proud of themselves for not giving up! Sometimes we adults want to step in and 'fix something' or 'help' them by doing it for them. Students often get frustrated with me when I say "I can help you, but I am not going to do it for you, because that is not helping you in the long run." They think I am being so mean, but in the end, when they accomplish 'it' (whatever 'it' is) themselves the pride I see them display well trumps their anger towards me for 'not helping them' 😇.

This week Jordyn and Olivia were able to fully partake in their internship with Carol DiSalvo Photography. Kara was able to observe a scientific lab test while at SUNY Morrisville. Carlos P. Assistant Director of CSTEP was conducting lab testing of taurine (an organic compound believed to play a role in development and maintenance of muscle and the nervous system) on planarians (flat worms). The study is intriguing. Kara wants to become a surgeon so this was a great experience for her. She said she learned that the worms, when cut in half can regrow the other end back again (head or tail) in only 7-8 days.
