There is no shortage of obstacles, challenges and disappointments when describing educating during a pandemic quarantine. My intention is not to dismiss them, but rather to use them as a lens through which to view many successes.

The 401's have continued to hold advisory using google meet 4 times a week. We spend some time chatting, catching up and just being social. The topic often turns to COVID-19 but I try to limit that. We check in on goals, take care of requirements and read together. So far we have read a book and two short stories during quarantine. I love that my 401s still volunteer to read and a generally engaged in the stories. That has not been lost.

After advisory ends, the one on ones begin. Erin and I field questions and reach out to students throughout the day to question, assist, trouble shoot, facilitate and sometimes just listen. The school day is no longer defined as the time spent in a building. Honestly, it never really was though.

I am pleased to hear how some of our 401s are spending their time and internalizing this bizarre situation. Some, like Alyssa are involved in helping others. Alyssa is helping her family provide meals to essential medical staff. Some 401s are spending more time outside to break up the monotony of their days and fulfilling PE requirements in the process. Many report that they are spending more time with family. As a result, they have demonstrated empathy for the struggles their parents face with job loss and the economic consequences. And finally, as they have been thrust into a new level of academic independence, many have demonstrated that they <u>do</u> have motivation, drive, and time management skills. And though this isn't true for all 401s, it is very clear which students need more support from staff.

Earlier in the week I set up eight, 15 min blocks of time for 401s to join a google meet throughout the day. We were conducting learning plan and STP meetings to adjust to the new reality. Six out of eight were in the space on time ready to go. Not perfect, but a good start. Is this what they will need to do in the fall for college classes, job interviews or even jobs? There are many questions like this and although we don't know the answers, we know we need to prepare.

I was working with my Better Lesson coach earlier and she pointed out that everything our students are doing now is essentially an artifact, a record of this unique moment in the history of education. What an opportunity this presents for students and educators. There are many things that I miss about teaching in person, but I will continue to look for the opportunities that are presented during this time. Stay safe and stay positive.

Distance learning has been challenging for staff and students alike, but I feel like we are starting to get the hang of things. I have also been working with individual students and whole advisories on various projects and writing prompts. Scotty let take his advisory on a virtual tour of the catacombs one day, and April has had me push in to her advisory for ELA instruction. One of the things that I enjoy about distance learning is that I have more time to work with students one on one. I have been working with a few of the 401s on senior projects and autobiography writing. Even though we are working from home, there is never a dull moment during the school day.


# **TGIF** from Jessica

Distance Learning couldn't have come at a better time. We had just finished trimester 2 exhibitions, the students were able to show off their work and we were about to start the making of new learning plan projects. The 301s had some great exhibitions, I hope you enjoy the photos of some of their work.

Before distance learning our advisory started reading To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee. At this time, students were given various reading jobs that tied to group work jobs. The summarizer, recorder, historian, and predictor had the job of writing a news article. The artist and geographer worked together to draw a town map. The analyst, fact finder, and clarifier made a timeline of events. The infer-er and applicast established a list of the town social norms. The last group consisted of the data tracker, vocabulist, elemental explorer, and caricaturist who worked to make character webs. This system worked well, it gave the students a reading skill to focus on while reading the book and it encouraged engagement. The students were then able to view each of the other group's work and cross examine for accuracy. Once they mastered their job's skill, we shifted roles and they were given a new skill to master.

Since we have started distance learning, among many other things, we had to create and shift to a new system. We are reading the book in google meets and independently. We






have also done gallery walks and historical walks in relation to the history of the book. One area the 301s are strong in is understanding social norms and discussing different perspectives.

Another thing we shifted was our spring break plans. Over the break, Christine and I hosted a Big Picture Scavengerhunt! Students looked for and made items inside and outside. Then they posted videos and pictures of their findings on flipgrid. As a school, it was fun to learn how to use new programs and watch everyone's videos.
