TGIF from David

My son's favorite movie is Moana. We limit the amount of screen time he experiences, but Moana is a good way to unwind. If you have never seen Moana, it is an animated movie by the Walt Disney Company. It tells the story of an adventurous teenager on a mission to save her people. Along the way, she meets a demigod, and discovers her identity. I bring up Moana because it is a great metaphor for our 101s this past week. No one harnessed the power of the ocean like Moana, but they did dig deep to inch closer towards discovering their identity.

The 101s have spent the past few weeks working on their Who Am I project. This serves to discover their interests by exploring their family, past, and potential future. It also gives us staff some insight into who they are as a person, what skills they possess, and areas they can improve. Walt and I recognized that we have a good number of students who want to work with their hands, and have a natural instinct for hands-on projects. Jacoby and Lucas both created a game board that detailed their past and desired future. This required time spent in the workshop to cut, and manipulate wood. Then, they personalized the wood to create a playable game board. Bruce also used the workshop to wood burn his family tree, and built an interactive past map using circuitry and lights. Cody built a model of a veterinary hospital to represent his future self. Charlie expanded on the idea of using a song to find a personal connection (one of the requirements), and built a past and future map of individual songs marking important moments in her life. She used fake vinyl records for these maps, and students kept asking her about the CDs.

I was surprised they even knew what CDs were. We learned that Dayton wants to explore painting and Emily is going to pursue cartoon drawing. Hands on projects definitely seems like the avenue to pursue with these 101s.

As much as the Who Am I projects are a guide for the students, they are a guide for Walt and I. They are also a guide for parents. Our follow up meetings with parents went very well, and to hear parents pleasantly surprised with the work their students completed feels like a compliment for all of us. So, I shall take those compliments. I also have to boost my confidence. The next step for the 101s is generating their first Learning Plan. We have a good lead on what to include in those Learning Plans. It is now time to start connecting these 101s with some mentors.

Speaking of mentors, the process for internships is moving slow, but I have heard back from a number of mentors that can provide limited assistance. Guidelines make it tough for sites to host a student. Although, virtual internship has yielded a positive result with SUNY Morrisville's Nursing Program. Assisting students virtually is an option that will work instead of an in-person internship. In-person opportunities were not a viable option in the past. We are adjusting and learning from this moment.

Before the weekend is out, I am sure Moana will be on the TV for my son. As Monday begins, all of our 101 Moanas will begin the process of continuing that journey of self-discovery.
