


TGIF from Jessica


Tessellations are coming! Quantitative reasoning students finished both their abstract and geometric tessellations. Students were challenged to break the code of order and logic with the task of creating abstract symmetric 'square' tiles. They had to create translated, reflected, or rotated lines as borders for their tiles in order to insure their tiles would fit together without gaps. Some students even had to pull in their knowledge of slopes from Algebra. As more tessellations come in I will be sure to share. I am very impressed with their work, creativity, and imagination.

Internships are getting started, even though it has been a challenge, we are expanding to virtual internships along with in person internships. Tierra is pictured virtually attending her photography internship with her mentor Carol. Photography started out this year as both an in person and virtual internship. On Tuesdays, students have met virtually to learn about photography and on Thursdays students have met in person to attend outdoor trips to take photos. management. Along with her morning internship, Dawsun participates in a virtual afternoon internship with Roe Bartolomeo, our school's occupational therapist. Last year Dawsun learned about occupational therapy from Roe and they began the process of developing a sensory motor pathway. Dawsun had just learned last Thursday that she was tasked with creating a temporary, trial, outdoor pathway. Roe provided her with resources of an OT teacher from another district who has created a similar pathway and our elementary art teacher. With the resources, a little aid from Christine and I, and one more planning meeting with Roe, Dawsun was able to create a sensory motor pathway outside at Grimshaw on Thursday this week! She created large stencils and used spray paint to create the pathway. The pathway is composed of 7 parts with a beautiful sun, flower, apple tree, and more. After making the pathway, she taught Simon, a first grader, how to utilize the pathway. Within 15 minutes she was able to take him through the course multiple times and then film him at each part! She plans to use these videos as a means of training for staff so other students will have the opportunity to develop and work on OT movements and increase their focus.


