

In November the LaFayette Science Club was represented by three teams at the annual "Central New York Build 'em and Bust 'em" bridge competition, hosted by the MOST. Students used engineering design principles to create ideas for bridges. Once they decided on a design, students used balsa wood, glue, and a ton of patience to construct their bridges. Bridges were delivered to the MOST where they were tested to the point of failure.

The bridges were scored based on efficiency, which is determined by how much force it takes to break the bridge divided by how much the bridge weighs. This year the MOST tested bridges through a live stream.

In the middle school division Lucas Aldrich & Caroline Davidson placed 8th, Harlie Walker placed 5th, and Isabella Kremers placed 1st! Congratulations to all of the students for their dedicated and creative work!

Dear LaFayette School Community:

2020! What a year! As a school community, we not only survived, but adapted, changed, and grew together. Throughout the past year, we have ventured into a world of digital learning and welcomed a new level of parent and family engagement that has served to enhance our connections and increased our ability to work together. When schools switched from in-person to digital learning in March, families welcomed our staff members (digitally) into their homes while we continued learning together. LaFayette students, families, and educators have faced many challenges in the past year and I am incredibly proud and grateful that it has made us grow closer as a school community.

As we approach the month of December, please be sure to weigh in on our capital improvement referendum on Thursday December 10, 2020 from 1:00-9:00 PM in the Jr/Sr High School Main Lobby. Voting will take place in person; however, eligible voters can also contact Paula Hibbert, District Clerk, to request an absentee ballot by calling the district office at 315-677-9728 or emailing phibbert@lafayetteschools.org. This \$8.6 million capital project will address all of the high priority infrastructure items on our last building condition survey, provide enhancements to STEM programming spaces, renovate the Grimshaw Library Media Center, create an Academic Hall of Fame in the HS Auditorium Lobby, enhance indoor air quality and filtration, and add air conditioning in second floor classrooms and certain common areas at Grimshaw, the High School, and Big Picture. This project is projected to have no local impact to school taxes using available building aid and capital reserve funds.

We will continue to lobby New York State to make necessary improvements at the Onondaga Nation School, which is a state-owned facility. We were successful with a roof replacement project at ONS this past summer and we will continue to press NYS to make promised improvements to the fire alarm system, exterior doors, camera system, and other building improvements and facility enhancements.

As we head into 2021, we will be reaching out to families to ask for feedback through our annual school climate survey. This year we will be looking for feedback on our reopening efforts. We are asking students, families, and staff to share experiences with digital learning. We plan to use this information to enhance the school experience for our stakeholders and help inform future professional development for staff. Be on the lookout for the digital survey during the months of December and January.

Thank you to our Jr/Sr High and Big Picture students and staff for adjusting rather quickly during our two-day switch to remote learning back in November. Please continue to keep in touch throughout the coming months and be ready to switch gears quickly to remote learning as circumstances change. Please be mindful of public health guidelines by staying home when you are sick, limiting the size of indoor gatherings during the winter months, washing your hands, and wearing a face covering when you are in public. I hope that everyone stays healthy and safe as we head through the winter months.

Announcements

Donation: The LaFayette Community Council Board would like to thank the LaFayette Coed Softball League, which plays games on Friday evenings during the summer and Sundays in the Fall, for its very generous donation to LCC. These funds will help support the many youth and adult programs LCC offers.

Community Council Board: All current members of the Board of Directors will be stepping down as of December 31, 2020 and need to be replaced. Ideally, these positions need to be filled as soon as possible to assure a smooth transition – current board members will be available to direct the new board members through the end of the year. In addition, the recreation clerk will be available to the new Board to assure continuity of programs. Whether we will be able to conduct these programs beginning in January will depend on state mandates, as well as the school district policies.

As of this writing, The LaFayette Public Library continues to be open for limited in house use by appointment.

RETURNING ITEMS:

Whether or not you plan on coming in the building, please place all returns in the outside book drop. As things come into the library via the book-drop, they will be quarantined before they are checked in. At that time, the check in date will be backdated to when they were put into the bookdrop, so it looks they were returned on the drop off date. This way both the staff and the patrons can rest assured that the items that are being handled for check out or put into delivery to other libraries are safe from contamination. All notifications regarding overdues, etc. have been adjusted accordingly.

*PICKING UP ITEMS:

We continue to have visits at 15 minutes intervals for patrons to get items, except instead of curbside pickup, you will schedule a time to come into the library to pick up items and browse. This also includes other services like making copies, faxing, etc. For now, we'll do 3 patrons per 15 minutes to better insure social distancing.

*Please note: to maintain health protocols during the pandemic, no one will be allowed in the building without face covering. We also ask that you sanitize your hands upon entering the library, with sanitizer we will provide.

DON'T HAVE ACCESS TO THE INTERNET AT HOME?

Reminding you that we now circulate 7 Chrome Books with a Verizon hotspot. They go out for 3 weeks. You can place holds, but no renewals. They must be returned to the lending library and need to be checked in at the circulation desk. It must be verified that all parts are returned before the kit can be returned. Come take advantage of this. This is the courtesy of our county legislators (County Legislature Chair Dave Knapp and County Executive Ryan McMahon in particular). Please thank them if you get a chance!

Reminder: the library has **three Empire passes** that allow access to any of the New York State parks, and two passes to the Onondaga county parks. For the county passes, please call the facility you plan to visit beforehand to make sure they are accepting the passes at this time (for example, right now the zoo is not accepting the passes for financial reasons). The Empire passes and the Onondaga County park passes can be checked out for a three day loan period, only one per family at a time and no holds or renewals. These passes are good throughout the year. Enjoy!
