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

FROM THE DESK OF THE SUPERINTENDENT

Timothy G. Kremer is the New York State School Board's Executive Director. In a recent commentary he stated the following:

"After the state's highest court ruled in the Campaign for Fiscal Equity (CFE) case that New York State has a constitutional duty to fulfill every student's right to a sound basic education, the state Legislature in 2007 committed to increase education funding statewide by approximately \$7 billion over four years."

"But if you look around at schools today, you wouldn't know it. Basic state aid for schools is now nearly \$4 billion below the amount that the state Legislature said was necessary to fund a sound basic education for students. That's because two years into that four-year commitment, state lawmakers reneged on their promise. They froze basic foundation aid to school districts and imposed what is now known as the "Gap Elimination Adjustment" (GEA), which has shortchanged school districts ever since. Add a state aid cap, a local property tax cap, a supermajority vote requirement, a no-growth contingency budget, and now a convoluted tax freeze/regional cost cutting proposal. Enough!"

Tim, I couldn't agree more! In the March Greensheet, Page 4 detailed the financial difficulties we face if the Governor's proposed budget moves forward unchanged. If this were to happen, we face a \$600,000 shortfall for next year. Obviously, cutting further than we have already will hurt. LaFayette needs and deserves much better from Albany.

If you haven't yet contacted either State Senator David Valesky (315 478-8745, valesky@nysenate. gov) or Assemblyman Gary Finch (315 255-3045, finchg@assembly.state.ny.us) please consider doing this today. I do believe they will listen to you.

CURRICULUM CONVERSATIONS

"If we can, should we?" " What sustains us?" "Is freedom ever free?" "Does age matter?" "Which is worse, failing or never trying?" "Can you buy your way to happiness?" "What is race and does it matter?"

These are just a few of the school-wide essential questions that have been posed to students at a San Diego High School. Students vote on which question to address each quarter using the Elements of Essential Questions offered by Grant Wiggins and Jay McTighe and shared by Nancy Frey and Douglas Fisher in their Principal Leadership article, "Using School-wide Essential Questions to Drive Learning." Essential questions must be **HOT**, that is they must contain Higher Order Thinking skills. HOT skills include evaluation, prediction, inference and analysis. Essential questions should launch deep discussion, controversy and debate. Essential questions are not answered, they are open-ended, revisited, and probed again and again.

Why offer essential questions? 21st Century learning demands critical thinking, creativity, communication and collaboration. Essential questions require all of these skills. Teachers in this high school began to imbed essential questions into their curriculum. For example, an essential question about the importance of beauty inspired an English teacher to have students read related texts such as Kafka's. The Metamorphosis and Hawthorne's, *The Birthmark*, while a Global History teacher examined it during a unit on The Enlightenment. The essential questions are rotated among all the disciplines thus providing a wealth of perspectives while ensuring that the discussions are not unnecessarily repeated.

Essential questions should guide unit planning. In the Project Based Learning world, they are similar to driving questions which are provocative, challenging, open-ended with no simple yes or no answer. Unit planning begins 'with the end in mind'. Essential and driving questions need to be linked to the core content you want students to learn. LaFayette teachers continue to add these skills to their repertoire of rigorous and relevant content and delivery to ensure the success of our 21st Century learners. The work continues.

SCHOOL BOARD PRESIDENT INPUT

Hello LaFavette.

With the coming of spring comes the school budget season. This is when the Administration and the Board of Education look at the expenditures from the 2013-2014 school year and then look ahead to the 2014-2015 school year costs. This is always a challenging time, but for the past five years it has been exceptionally tough. When Governor Paterson was in office, he introduced the Gap Elimination Adjustment. The Gap Elimination Adjustment was his way of attempting to balance the State budget by taking money away from public education. When Governor Andrew Cuomo came to office, he continued the practice. As a consequence of the actions of these men, LaFayette has had to eliminate many teaching positions, as well as cut back on programs for our students. We are again faced with the Governor taking \$1,047,546 out of the money administered by the State Education Department that was allocated to the LaFayette Central School District.

What most people are not aware of is where this money comes from in the first place. The school taxes in LaFayette originate with all of you and cover about \$5,563,000 dollars of our \$16,726,870 budget. The remaining dollars necessary to support our budget are allocated by the State Education Department. That money comes from revenues that are generated by New York State Sales Tax, the New York State Lottery, and federally-funded programs administered through the State. These dollars come from across the state, not only from the merchants, businesses and purchases made in Onondaga County. The school budget that we will be voting to approve this coming May 20th will be for the \$5,563,000 that is levied through the School Taxes we pay in September. The \$1,047,546 amount comes out of the State Education Department's \$11,163,870 portion of our school budget. That means the Governor is cutting our promised revenue from the State Education Department by 9.4%. They have done this for the past five years. It is in this environment that we in LaFayette must manage our schools. Every day I am amazed at the grit that our teachers and administrators exhibit in doing their jobs of bringing education to our children.

The situation is further aggravated by the distribution formula that the State uses to calculate how much money each school district will be allocated. The formula favors school districts that have a high revenue tax base with many different types of property that generate taxes. The districts that are mostly residential, especially rural school districts, receive a lower allocation than the other districts. There are other districts in upstate, as well as downstate and Long Island where the state formula does not provide the less affluent school districts with the same money provided the more affluent. What is really maddening is that the more affluent districts receive additional money because their taxes are so high. The taxes in many of these districts are high because they offer so many more opportunities for their students. Examples of this might be that there are five and six foreign languages taught in some schools, or field trips for elementary students are done on a luxury bus and include a trip into NYC that includes a trip to the theater and dinner. The best one I have heard is the school district where their football team goes to football camp in another state. If you are confused by these inequities, you are certainly not alone.

The point of all of this is really to make you all aware of how hard everyone in the district works to bring an excellent education to our children while operating in an almost hostile political environment. In previous letters in the Green Sheet I have cited examples of LaFayette School graduates who have accomplished great things. The folks I have mentioned are just the tip of a very big iceberg. Our little school district is replete with success stories and our ability to do more with less is a tribute the employees and students of the LaFayette Central School District. I ask that you show your support of these efforts with a Yes Vote in May.

Thank you all for your support of our children. The efforts of volunteer organizations, such as The Optimists and Community Council, provide many opportunities for our children to grow in ways that support the efforts of our educational professionals and play a big role in the success of our students. Success is never easy, but in a community like LaFayette, it will always be achievable.

Board Petitions Available

Any qualified LaFayette Central School District resident interested in running for a seat on the Board of Education is reminded that the deadline for filing a petition for the post is Monday, April 21, 2014 at 4:00 p.m. in the District Office. Three 3-year terms will be available. Currently held by Ronda Akl, Michael LaCava, and Patricia Sofranko, these terms will expire as of June 30, 2014.

To qualify for membership on the school board, an individual:

- Must be able to read and write.
- Must be a qualified voter of the district, that is a citizen of the United States, at least 18 years of age, or older, and not adjudged to be incompetent.
- Must be and have been a resident (but need not be a taxpayer) of the district for a continuous and uninterrupted period of at least one year immediately before the election.
- May not have been removed from any school district office within the preceding year.
- May not reside with another member of the same school board as a member of the same family.
- May not be a current employee of the school board.
- May not simultaneously hold another incompatible public office.

Private and Parochial Transportation

The school you are considering should have forms for this purpose. The deadline date is set by the State of New York. Requests received after this deadline may be denied.



Odyssey of the Mind

This year, 21 fourth and fifth grade students participated in a special after school enrichment program called Odyssey of the Mind. These students were divided into three teams and they were charged with developing a creative solution to a specific problem. These teams began working in October and they presented their solution at a competition in Binghamton. Odyssey of the Mind helps students learn problem-solving methods while having fun in the process. Below is the official synopsis for each problem as well as a listing of the members of our teams:

The Stackable Structure – Teams will design and build a structure made up of separate components stacked on top of one another. The structure components will be made of only balsa wood and glue, and will be tested by balancing and supporting weights after they are stacked. Teams will be scored for the number of components they use in their final structure. Before they are stacked, the separate components will be integrated into an artistic representation of Earth. The team will include the stacking of the components, placement of the weights, and Earth into the theme of its performance.

The Not-So-Haunted House – The team's problem is to create and present an original performance that includes a "pop-up-style" not-so-haunted "house" where four special effects take place. The intent of the special effects will be to scare others, but they will produce a different result instead. The performance will include at least one character that experiences the special effects and a narrator who relays the experiences to the audience. It will also include a surprise ending. The special effects will be scored for originality and engineering.

Driver's Test - For this problem, teams will design, build, and drive a vehicle that will travel a course where a student driver attempts to complete tasks in order to pass a driver's test. The vehicle will travel using one propulsion system and then travel in reverse using a different propulsion system. The vehicle will encounter a directional signal and have a Global Positioning System (GPS) that talks to the driver. The team will create a theme for the presentation that incorporates the vehicle, a driver's test, a student, and the talking GPS.

Dear Parents.

Welcome to Spring! I know we're all anxious to get some fresh air, sunshine and warm weather!

Hopefully, the fresh air both inside and out will help everyone get healthy again.

In March we had URI's, strep throat, some stomach virus and a virus with a fever and body aches. Please continue to keep your child home when they would clearly be contagious to others (i.e., productive cough, discharge from the nose/eyes, vomiting, rash of unknown origin, fever). A child with a fever should stay home until their temperature returns to normal without the aid of medication for 24 hours. Children should also stay home 24 hours after vomiting or being diagnosed with a bacterial infection treated with antibiotics (i.e., strep throat/conjunctivitis). Please notify me directly when your child is absent for any reason (illness, injury, surgery, vacation, etc.). You may leave a voicemail or send an e-mail if that is more convenient for you, or if school's not open.

Speaking of fresh air and sunshine, the bees and the pollen will also be here! If your child has asthma/allergies requiring an inhaler or Epipen/Benadryl, please be sure we have the medication at school to care for your child in an emergency. Remember, all medicines require a doctor's note and should be brought in by the parent for safety reasons.

All children in grades PreK-6 have their vision and hearing checked every year and I will notify you if I have any concerns. If I sent home a vision referral, I would appreciate a follow up report from the doctor when your child is examined. If you have any questions or concerns regarding these screenings, please call me.

I will also be screening 5th/6th Grade students for Scoliosis (curvature of the spine) during April/May. If your child is being followed for this condition, please send in a copy of their annual check-up.

If your child is one of the few students still needing a required physical this year, please send that paperwork to me as soon as possible. Please keep in mind 6th Graders will need a physical entering 7th Grade. Also, 5th Grade parents please remember to schedule your child's required Tdap vaccine before September if they've turned 11 by then.

As mentioned last month, Kindergarten Screening will be held May 12th through May 14th here at Grimshaw. Please call the main office to schedule an appointment for your child if you haven't already done so. We look forward to meeting all our new students! Please bring a copy of your child's immunizations to date as well as any physical done after 1/1/14. If your child has any serious medical issues or will require medication at school, please call me or stop in to see me.

If anyone is doing Spring cleaning, we could use sweatpants at school. Please keep extra clothes for your little one in their lockers/cubbies at all times.

Keep updating any emergency information and have a great Spring Break! As always, feel free to call me with any questions/ concerns and thanks for your cooperation on all of the above!




